



#### **Emergency Services Committee Looks for Solutions**


The volunteer fire company is a long and cherished tradition in our community and in Pennsylvania, dating back to 1736 when Ben Franklin founded the nation's first allvolunteer force in Philadelphia. Our state has more volunteer fire companies than any other in the nation. Today, this volunteer model is in jeopardy and local fire companies are struggling. Volunteers in the state have dropped from 300,000 strong in the 1960s and '70s to below 50,000 today. In addition to dwindling volunteer numbers, costs are soaring and training requirements have intensified.

The Township's Board of Supervisors recognized this looming public safety crisis as they formulated their goals for 2018 and created an Emergency Services Committee. The committee was formed to analyze the Township's volunteer fire company. The committee is exploring viable solutions to ensure that the department has the workforce and funding to continue to provide excellent services to the Lower Providence community.

Meanwhile, township officials from all across Pennsylvania passed a resolution at the 96<sup>th</sup> Annual

Educational Conference of the PA State Association of Township Supervisors (PSATS) calling for Gov. Tom Wolf to hold a special legislative session to address the volunteer crisis facing local fire and emergency management services. PSATS and its members are urging the state legislature to enact real and feasible solutions, such as allowing variable training standards for rural, suburban, and urban areas; granting a tax incentive for employers who permit employees to respond to calls while at work; and providing a fix for rising insurance rates at the State Workers Insurance Fund (SWIF).

Local leaders are doing their best to keep this volunteer model alive, but they need help from Harrisburg, said

#### Grant Awarded for **Business Park Sidewalks**



Lower Providence Township has received a 2018 Montco 2040 Implementation Grant for a project to install sidewalk connections in its Park Pointe business park. The \$100,000 grant, aimed at implementing the county comprehensive plan, Montco 2040: A Shared Vision, is one of fourteen recently awarded by the Montgomery County Commissioners.

The project will include installation of sidewalks to complete gaps in the Park Pointe business park along Eisenhower, Adams, and Jefferson Avenues. A crosswalk also will be installed to improve pedestrian access to an existing pathway that connects the business park to nearby retail development including a Wawa and several restaurants.

Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2019.

The project, which was included in the master plan for the business park, will improve pedestrian safety, encourage healthy lifestyles, and improve connections to surrounding developments and destinations.

The Montco 2040 grant program is intended to assist municipalities in making targeted physical improvements that achieve real progress toward the goals of Montco 2040 and its themes of Connected Communities, Sustainable Places, and Vibrant Economy. The grant awards account for over \$1.5 million and since the program's inception in 2016, over \$3.7 million has been awarded to

#### **Development Projects: Underway & Under Review**

#### **ON-GOING CONSTRUCTION**

**Manors at Brynwood** - Construction continues on 12 single-family homes to the easterly side of Cross Keys Road, just south of Vincent Drive.

**Courts at Brynwood** - Construction is underway on the first phase of a 139-townhome community along Germantown Pike just west of Superior Tube.



The first phase of The Courts at Brynwood is underway.

**Providence Place** - Work is well underway on the assisted care facility that is reusing and expanding the former Collegeville Inn site.

**Landis Mill Estates** - Sales continue at the nine singlefamily home subdivision along a new cul-de-sac coming off Landis Mill Road.

Montgomery County and the John J. Audubon Center at Mill Grove, 1201 Pawlings Road - Work continues on the \$12-million project to construct a museum and education center and enhance existing facilities. (See related article on Page 6.)

**Streamlight, 30 Eagleville Road** - Construction is underway on an 84,000-square foot addition.

**Audubon Square V** - Hilton and Audubon Land Development broke ground recently on a new Tru by Hilton property. The 121-room, five-story hotel will be located at 825 Forge Ave. adjacent to Firehouse Subs, Starbucks and Sprint.

**Classic Coachworks** - 3949 Ridge Pike - A 6,560-square foot addition is underway.

**1418 Gertrude Avenue** - David James Real Estate is constructing two single-family homes.

#### PLANS THAT HAVE COMPLETED FINAL REVIEW:

**Lidl US** - This is the redevelopment of the former Norristown Ford site at Ridge Pike and Trooper Road by the German discount grocery store chain.

**St. James Episcopal Church** - The Church plans to construct a new Outreach Center across Evansburg Road from the main church.

**109 River Road** - Friends and Family Holdings plans to renovate the former residence to include office space and exterior improvements.

**Eagleville Hospital, 100 Eagleville Road** - The campus is being modernized as part of an overall master plan.

**Iroy Gym & Track, 3444-50 Germantown Pike** - Plans call for the conversion of the former Bridaltown building into an approximately 47,000- square foot indoor gym and track facility, relocating from a neighboring community.

Anderko Custom Homes, 37 Crawford Road - The project is to be constructed in two phases. There are to be eight lots, six of them being new. This project adjoins the intersection of Park Ave./Crawford Rd./Eagleville Rd., site of proposed intersection improvements.

**Gambone Family Development** - This is a nine-lot single family home development on Woodland Avenue, near the new ball fields and Woodland Elementary School.


**Evansburg Road Tract** - Gambone Development is proposing 24 small-lot single homes in a tract connecting Evansburg Road and Ridge Pike.

**306 Level Road** - This plan proposes seven new single-family homes on a cul-de-sac, in between Arrowhead Elementary and the Woods at Providence - Stella's Way.

**141 Appledale Road** - HTC Construction is planning to build an additional single family home behind their newly constructed home at 141 Appledale Road.

**3837 Landis Mill Road** - HTC Construction is planning to build a single-family home behind an existing residence.

#### New Museum Taking Shape at John James Audubon Center

Construction is progressing on the new museum located at the John James Audubon Center at Mill Grove, 1201 Pawlings Road, with a projected opening in Summer 2019. The new building celebrates the amazing world of birds, providing hands-on learning opportunities for visitors of all ages.

The John James Audubon Art Gallery will contain original Audubon prints as well as a life-size digital version of the *Birds of America* that will allow for hands-on learning about each species featured. A short movie depicting the life and journey of John James Audubon will be played throughout the day. Other short conservation films will be shown at various intervals.

Additional exhibits will focus bird banding, feathers, eggs, nests, and flight. In a sound forest exhibit, visitors will be able to experience bird songs in different habitats including forests, coastal areas, wetlands, grasslands, and cities.

Outdoor attractions will include the Pawlings Porch, where visitors can bird watch over a wildflower meadow, and the Fledgling Trail, which will engage children of all ages in mimicking the life stages of a young bird from egg to first flight. There will be a sensory garden, water features, accessible play apparatus, and benches to relax and enjoy nature.

Partner organization Valley Forge Audubon Society is at work organizing new programs and birdwalks for next spring and summer to align with the opening of the new center. 

#### Park Restoration Effort Making Progress

Under the direction of Township resident John Zollers, an ecological restoration project is underway in Eagleville Park. John and other volunteers have been gathering on Saturday mornings since last April. They're determined to eliminate exotic-invasive plant species from the park (and in turn reduce the presence of exotic-invasive animal species that feed on them), reintroduce native species, and repair erosion damage to the park's stream.

Native species are those found in southeastern Pennsylvania prior to European colonization. Exotic plant species are those not native to southeast Pennsylvania, while invasive species are those that aggressively displace or otherwise cause harm to native species. Both disrupt the ecological landscape. Eagleville Park, along with much of southeastern Pennsylvania, has seen an influx of these exotic-invasive plant species in recent years.

Initially, the group has focused on an area of woods at the bottom of the walking trail, removing tree of heaven, Amur honeysuckle, and garlic mustard. The exotic-invasive plants had comprised more than half of the existing plant cover in the

area. Zollers said the plan is to replant the area with native species and cage them to provide winter protection from deer. They'll finish this year's work in October, focusing on cleaning up and preparing the site for winter.

"It will take years to clean up the whole park," said Zollers, "but we're off to a meaningful start."

If you're interested in taking part in the restoration effort, the group meets on the third Saturday of each month at 10 a.m., April through October. Volunteers receive instruction on properly identifying both targeted exotic-invasive species and desirable native species and the significance of each. Tools are provided.

#### **Fall Cleanup Reminders**

Leaves, yard waste, lawn clippings and branches are collected by J.P. Mascaro & Sons every Wednesday year-round. Yard waste should be placed out for pickup in open-top containers or compostable paper bags. Plastic bags cannot be accepted. Twigs and small branches (no more than 3" in diameter) should be cut to 3-foot lengths and tied in bundles weighing no more than 50 pounds.




## Maintaining Your Yard This Fall

Fall is the time for raking leaves and fertilizing your lawn. Here are some tips for keeping your lawn healthy while still preventing stormwater pollution:

- 1) Dispose of leaf litter and yard waste in a compost pile, never in the street or stream! You can shred yard waste to use as mulch or fertilizer for your yard and garden. Or, check with you municipality for yard waste collection opportunities.
- 2) Do not use fertilizers immediately before a rainstorm, and do not apply them in excess. Always follow the directions on the bottle for safe application and disposal whenever you use a chemical product. Reduce outdoor and household chemical use as much as possible.
- **3) Add native plants to your yard.** Now through Thanksgiving can be the best time to put native plants in the ground. Many plants go dormant in the fall and winter and will not require much maintenance to survive until spring. Native plants aid in the infiltration of stormwater and provide important food and habitat for wildlife.

#### **Eagle Scout Honored**




Township resident Jack Ralph was recognized by the Board of Supervisors for attaining the rank of Eagle Scout, Scouting's highest honor.

#### Police Department Keeps Pace With Technology

Policing in the age of technology means that departments must keep pace with updates and changes. Let's take a look at the Township police fleet's current technology.

that was seven years old. The new version includes a more rugged laptop, a handheld bar code scanner and printers.

Cadets at the Township's Junior Police Academy learn how the technologies in our vehicles work. The ALPR system is mounted to the rear roof area.

The department updated its Motorola vehicle and portable radios in 2015. This was done as Montgomery County communications moved forward with replacing its countywide radio network. In 2016, each patrol vehicle was updated with a Dell laptop, replacing a system

In 2017, the department received a grant from the Southeast Joint Terrorism Task Force to add an automated license plate reader or ALPR to our fleet. ALPR systems automatically capture an image of a vehicle's license plate, transform that image into alphanumeric


characters using optical character recognition or similar software, compare the plate number acquired to one or more databases of vehicles of interest to law enforcement and other agencies, and alert the officer when a vehicle of interest has been observed. Our system is linked to PennDOT and other databases and

will alert us to stolen vehicles, wanted vehicles and vehicles with expired or suspended registrations.

And in 2018 we completed an upgrade to the in-car video systems (MVR) of the patrol fleet. The new system from Watchguard replaced cameras that were nearly 10 years old. This system improves audio and video clarity, enhances system storage and searchability, as well as adding panoramic front camera and prisoner security camera. The photograph below shows the MVR system and laptop.

#### **New Fireworks Law Raises Concerns**



This past July 4<sup>th</sup> was the first Independence Day that Pennsylvania residents could legally purchase and use consumer-grade aerial fireworks. Many took advantage of the new state law and these bigger, louder celebrations have led to safety and noise concerns. To address these concerns, the Board of Supervisors and Township Solicitor have begun work on a fireworks ordinance.

The goal of the ordinance will be to provide the Township with enforceable regulations that go beyond the state law, regulating the sale of fireworks in the Township by commercial entities and regulating the use of consumer-grade fireworks by the public. Once prepared by staff, the proposed ordinance will go through the appropriate review process before being present to the Board of Supervisors for consideration.

Lower Providence Township Fire Marshal encourages residents to leave fireworks to the professionals. If you do choose to use them, make sure you know what is and is not permitted. The questions and answers below, provided by the PA State Police, highlight the most noteworthy changes with Pennsylvania's new fireworks law.

Q: Which fireworks are Pennsylvania residents now allowed to purchase and use? Consumers can now purchase and use "Class C" or "consumer-grade" fireworks that include firecrackers, Roman Candles, bottle rockets, and similar fireworks that contain a maximum of 50 milligrams of explosive material. The expansion includes those fireworks that were previously only available to out-of-state residents.

"Display fireworks" are still only to be used by professionals with a permit from the municipality where the display will take place. These are classified as including salutes that contain more than two grains or 130 milligrams of explosive materials, and professional-grade aerial shells containing more than 60 grams of pyrotechnic compositions.

**Q:** Who can purchase fireworks? Anyone 18 years of age or older can purchase them.

#### Q: What are the restrictions on where fireworks can be used?

- They cannot be discharged within 150 feet of an occupied structure, whether or not a person is actually present.
- They cannot be ignited or discharged on a public or private property without express permission of the property owner.
- They cannot be discharged from or within a motor vehicle or building.
- They cannot be discharged toward a motor vehicle or building.
- They cannot be discharged while the person is under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance, or another drug.

Q: Where can fireworks be purchased? They can be purchased at any licensed facility, including temporary ones. The licenses are issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture. Examples of temporary facilities include tents or other structures found in parking lots.

#### Fire Safety Campaign Stresses the Basics



Lower Providence Volunteer Fire Department is once again partnering with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to observe Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 7-13, 2018. Each year during Fire Prevention week, volunteers from the Township fire department visit day cares and schools to spread the work about fire prevention. The week ends with an open house at the Eagleville station.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere" works to educate people about basic but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire and how to escape safely in the event of one. Today's home fires burn faster than ever. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as

one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time wisely takes planning and practice.

"Although people feel safest in their home, it is also the place people are at greatest risk to fire," said Township Fire Marshal Charles DeFrangesco. Over-confidence contributes to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice. He stressed that paying attention to your surroundings, looking for available exits in the event of a fire or other emergency, and taking the smoke alarm seriously if it sounds can make a potentially life-saving difference in a fire or other emergency situation.

This year's campaign highlights three steps

people can take to help quickly and safely escape a fire:

- Look for places fire could start
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm
- Learn two ways out of every room

Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in our country. Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.

#### Sewer Authority: 'Disposable' Wipes Causing Problems

Wipes

Did you know that even if wipes are labeled "flushable" or "disposable" they still don't degrade in the system? Flushing them is like flushing a handkerchief or cloth items. We are seeing more of a problem with wipes being flushed and

causing issues with the pumps.

Our sewer systems and treatment plants were not designed to handle wipes. They gum up the system, clog pipes and pumps, and cost taxpayers and residents a lot of money in

additional maintenance costs. In addition, many homeowners have experienced plumbing problems because of wipes, so you may have expensive maintenance issues at home if you flush them.

If you must use wipes, please put them in the trash, not the toilet.



After hours emergencies, please call 1-800-379-5713. If you should have a backup in your outside line, contact us so that we can verify that it is not being caused by a blockage in our main line before you call your plumber.





#### **FOG**

No, we're not talking about the weather! FOG stands for the Fats, Oils and Grease from food preparation, packaged food and food scraps. How do you dispose of your FOGs? If you have been putting them down the drain, you need to know that fats, oils and grease stick to the insides of sewer pipes when washed down the kitchen plumbing system. This solidifies and can block pipes. Clogged pipes cause sewer backups and sewage spills on residential property and on the street, which ultimately leads to costly sewer backups and overflows, increased sewer rates and public health and environmental hazards as it washes down storm drains and into bays, water ways and creeks.

How should I dispose of my FOG materials? Glad you asked!

Follow these Dos and Don'ts to keep costs down and improve the environment:

#### DO! \

- ✓ Wipe down greasy pots and pans with a dry paper towel and dispose of it in your kitchen scrap recycling or garbage.
- ✓ Pour cooled oil, fats and grease into a can or other container with a tight lid (coffee can, glass jar or plastic container) and dispose of it in the garbage.
- ✓ Use baskets or strainers in sink drains to catch food scraps and other solids - and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ Talk with your friends and neighbors about the grease problem so the community is aware of the risk.

#### DON'T! X

XDo NOT pour FOG down the garbage disposal or sink drain.

X Do NOT use hot water to wash the grease down the drain.




