



From the Chair

We are fortunate to live in Lower Providence!

It is a diverse community with great schools and varied housing options.

We are the nexus of many parks including Valley Forge National Park, Evansburg State Park, and John James Audubon Center at Mill Grove, as well as trails such as the Schuylkill River Trail and Perkiomen Trail. Few people know that the 1300-mile-long September 11th National Memorial Trail linking the World Trade Center, Pentagon, and Flight 93 Memorial passes right through our municipality.

Despite these advantages of living in our community, we face similar challenges to those of other growing communities. Our police station is aging. Large rainfalls are damaging homes and infrastructure. Power outages occur during severe storms. Pedestrians and bikers cannot safely get to nearby multi-purpose trails that interconnect for thousands of miles. Traffic can be heavy at times. Electric vehicle infrastructure is needed for charging the increasing number of electric vehicles.

Meeting these challenges can make the community stronger through:

- * Modern, accredited police station, ideally with off-grid power
- * Green spaces when FEMA donates flood lands to the township
- * Safer routes for bikers and pedestrians to get around the township and to nearby parks and trails
- Road improvements like a new bridge into Collegeville and improved Crawford Road intersection

This year we will release our 10+ year Comprehensive Plan which lays out a vision for the township. Our new Township Manager, E.J. Mentry is building an organization to efficiently deliver high quality services to the community.

Looking ahead to 2023, the future is bright in Lower Providence!

September 11th Memorial Trail

The September 11th National Memorial Trail is a

1,300-mile multi-use trail connecting the Flight 93 memorial, the Pentagon and New York City's Ground Zero that passes right through Lower Providence Township.

The route includes Pennsylvania, New York, Maryland, Delaware, West Virginia, Virginia and the District of Columbia. Its creation was spearheaded by the September 11th National Memorial Trail Alliance as a journey of remembrance of the fallen of 9/11 and a tribute to first responders. It can be traveled by foot, bike, motorcycle or car.

The first leg of the trail runs northwest from the Pentagon Memorial, following the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal National Historical Park to the Great Allegheny Passage at Cumberland, MD. It links to the Flight 93 memorial via a rail right-of-way from Garrett, PA. The second leg extends east from the Flight 93 memorial to New York City's

National September 11 Memorial, piggybacking along manyrail-trails and community trails in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. The third leg, from New York City to the Pentagon Memorial, follows the East Coast Greenway south through five states.

Hundreds of partners both big and small, public and private made the vast triangle trail connectivity possible.

Property Tax Rebate Program

On May 24, 2022, the Methacton School Board voted to approve Resolution 22-02. This resolution provides tax relief for qualifying individuals based on Chapter 13 (Senior Citizens Property Tax and Rent Rebate Assistance) of the Taxpayer Relief Act, Act 1 of Special Session 2006, 53 P.S. §6926.1301, et seq.

Who is eligible?

A person who files a claim for property tax rebate or rent rebate in lieu of property taxes under the Act and, during the 2021 calendar year

- was at least sixty-five (65) years of age, or whose spouse (if a member of the household) was at least sixtyfive (65) years of age,
- was a widow or widower and was at least fifty (50) years of age, or
- was a permanently disabled person eighteen (18) years of age or older.

How do I apply for the rebate? Individuals must complete and be approved for the Pennsylvania State Rebate Program. Once you have been approved under the state program, complete the Methacton School District application.

DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Development Projects: Underway & Under Review

ON-GOING CONSTRUCTION / RECENT COMPLETION

Enclaves at Evansburg

DeLuca Homes of Bucks County is underway with this project, which is to include 24 small-lot single homes in a tract connecting Evansburg Road and Ridge Pike. The homes have been completed and some site work details remain to be completed.

Crawford Estates 37 Crawford Road

There are to be eight lots, six of them being new. This project adjoins the intersection of Park Ave./Crawford Rd./Eagleville Rd., site of proposed intersection improvements. Most of the homes have been completed and are occupied.

306 Level Road /Creekview Estates

This project for seven new single-family homes on a cul-de-sac, in between Arrowhead Elementary School and the Woods at Providence (Stella's Way) has begun. All the lots have been sold and built. Few items to be completed before final paving.

Arrowhead Elementary

Methacton School District has constructed a new Arrowhead Elementary School building on the site of the old school, 232 Level Road. The new building features enhanced traffic circulation, stormwater management and modernized construction systems.

Eagleville Elementary School

Eagleville recently completed their extensive entrance, façade and heating/cooling system renovations.

Moscariello at Crosskeys

This is a mixed-use project consisting of three buildings along Ridge Pike that will combine retail and office space with townhouse living above. There will also be 30 townhouses constructed interior to the site near Crosskeys Road. Townhouse construction by D.R. Horton has begun as has work on the mixed-use buildings along Ridge Pike. Several of the townhomes have been sold.

Montgomery County EOC Development

This is the construction of a new 21,950 SF building for the County Coroner and a new 22,200 SF Archives Building. Construction has been progressing rapidly.

Gambone Family Development

This is a nine-lot single family home development on Woodland Avenue, near the ball fields and Woodland Elementary School. Slavi Builders has purchased the development and has begun demolition of the existing structures. Site work will begin shortly.

Bud's Bar

The long-awaited work on the former Bud's Bar at Egypt Road and Park Avenue is underway. Initially, the new owner is restoring the top two floors into four apartments. The ground floor is to be renovated into a commercial use once a tenant has been obtained.

Nudy's Diner

Nudyⁱs Diner is converting the former TD Bank, at the corner of Egypt and Pawlings Road, into a local branch of the successful regional chain. There is outdoor sitting planned. Work is proceeding quickly, and anticipated opening is early fall.

Chipotle

The former Qdoba's on South Trooper Road is becoming a new Chipotle's. This location will use a model for expedited pick up.

Pat's Pizza

Another regional chain is moving into the former Bertucci's next door to Chipotle in Audubon Square. This restaurant will also include outdoor seating.

Eagleville Taphouse

The former Eagleville Tavern at Ridge Pike and Eagleville Road has a new owner who has spruced up the tavern and just started operating.

Wame Mediterranean

Near the Collegeville bridge, Wame Mediterranean restaurant has completed their conversion of the former pizza restaurant and features outdoor dining.

PLANS UNDER REVIEW:

Branca 420 Church Road

A subdivision plan has been submitted for review after an appeal was granted by Common Pleas Court. Presently, the plan shows 25 lots and has been reviewed by the Township Planning Commission, prior to consideration by the Board of Supervisors in August and September.

Shannondell Phase III

The next series of buildings for the residential portion of Shannondell have been submitted for review. Phases I, II, and the Meadows from the original five phases of the approved master plan have been constructed. The Board of Supervisors will be considering in September.

BrightView Landscaping

BrightView Landscaping is proposing to use their Lower Providence location on North Park Avenue as a model for innovative sustainable energy design for their 300 locations across the country. The proposal involves construction of solar arrays to generate the energy for their trucks, estimating vehicles, and equipment. They are also proposing to reconstruct buildings on the site to make it more efficient and attractive. BrightView was scheduled to go to the Zoning Hearing Board in August and tentatively the Planning Commission in September.

Tidal Wave Car Wash

Tidal Wave Car Wash is proposing a new facility just west of Lidl Supermarket in the 2600 block of Ridge Pike. The proposal has received conditional use and Zoning Hearing Board approval. Plans are being further developed and then will proceed through land development this fall.

For 13 years, Bob distinguished himself as a tactical sniper, first for the Lower Providence Township Police Special Operations Unit and then with the consolidated regional tactical team, the Central Montgomery County Emergency Response Team.

A recipient of six Distinguished Unit Citations for the performance of his duties, Bob was also awarded several Letters of Commendation and received numerous letters of appreciation from citizens throughout his career.

Officer Reginald (Reggie) Nealy retired from the Lower Providence Township Police Department after 31 years of dedicated service.

Officer Nealy was sworn in as a police officer with the Lower Providence Township Police Department on April 8, 1991. He graduated from Daniel Boone High School and attended West Chester University where he obtained his degree. Officer Melanie Faddis was born and raised in Coatesville. While in high school, she moved to Downingtown and graduated from Henderson High School in 2013. After high school, she attended West Chester University where she studied education. On June 8, 2016, Officer Faddis graduated from the Delaware County Municipal Police Academy and took a position as a Correctional Officer with the Chester County Prison. In 2018, she was hired as a part-time police officer with Valley Township. POLICE DEPARMENT NEWS

Preparation & Preparedness

LPPD officers receive a variety of training throughout the year that may be elected or mandatory. This year, one of their mandatory trainings involved de-escalation tactics and active shooter response training that was held at the Chester County Public Safety Training Campus. Our department recognizes the need for this essential training and understands the importance of preparation and preparedness. Each officer completed several scenarios with tactical skills they learned and exercised de-escalation approaches.

In July, the LPPD Command Staff met with Methacton School District administrators, members of the Pennsylvania State Police, and Cardinal Point Security Group to collaborate and develop an active shooter response/critical incident management guide. This guide will be used as a tool for increased preparation and preparedness, should such an unfortunate event ever take place.

Improving Bus Safety

Due to unforeseeable circumstances, BusPatrol's start date was delayed, but the program will begin this fall. BusPatrol partnered up with Methacton School District to reduce bus violations from occurring and increase safety within our community. The buses will be equipped with cameras inside and outside the school bus. These cameras will be able to capture illegal passing of school buses, along with other violations and decrease bullying that may occur while students are on the bus.







See Something, Say Something

If you see something suspicious, citizens should always call their local law enforcement or 9-1-1 immediately. Don't wait, time is of the essence! When you call to report suspicious activity, it is helpful to report the following...

- Provide a brief description of the suspicious activity
- Date, time, and location of the suspicious activity
- Physical identifiers of anyone you observed
- Description of vehicles and license plates
- Information about individuals or vehicles last direction of travel
- Your name and contact information (optional)

By reporting suspicious activity to your local law enforcement, you help protect yourself, your neighbors, and your community. If you see something, say something.

PUBLIC WORKS REMINDERS

Fall Cleanup Reminder

Leaves, lawn clippings and small branches are collected by J.P. Mascaro & Sons every Wednesday, year-round.

Please note that there is a 10 bag or bundle limit per collection.

Place yard waste in containers with lids or compostable paper bags (available at local home improvement stores). Do not use plastic bags or tape. Twigs and tree branches should be cut to three-foot lengths and tied in bundles weighing no more than 50 lbs. Tree roots and tree stumps cannot be collected; branches can be no more than three inches in diameter. Christmas trees are permitted; please make sure all decorations are removed.

Looking Ahead To Winter Weather

The Public Works Department is dedicated to the safety of all of our residents. Snow removal is a tedious and time-consuming job and your patience during a snow/ice event is appreciated. Our crews are responsible for over 90 miles of roads within the Township and they work many hours under very difficult conditions to keep motorists safe. The top priority is keeping main roads open.As soon as all major roads are clear, equipment is moved immediately to residential areas with those streets carrying the lowest volume - cul-desacs and dead-end streets being the last plowed.

It is almost impossible to keep snow from being deposited at driveways during plowing, so, if possible, wait to shovel until the Township is finished plowing. If you do clear your driveway before the street is completed, put snow to the right so the plow can push the snow away from your driveway. Also, clearing an area on the side of the driveway from which the plow approaches will provide an area for the snow to unload before it reaches your driveway. **Fire Hydrants** - You can perform a valuable public service by clearing any fire hydrants near your home during and after a snowstorm. In an emergency, every second matters. Fire hydrants that are blocked, concealed or difficult to access can impede emergency response. Thank you!



When a Mailbox Is Damaged...

It's possible that some residential mailboxes will be damaged during a snowstorm. If damage is caused by snow or ice hitting the mailbox or due to deteriorated materials, repair or replacement is the responsibility of the resident.

If it is believed that the damage is the result of direct contact with a plow truck, please call the Public Works Department (610-635-3525) after the storm has subsided and within 48 hours and we will evaluate the damage to determine responsibility.

Sidewalks - Township ordinance requires that a pathway at least 30 inches wide be cleared on the sidewalk within 48 hours after it stops snowing. In the event of ice or sleet, sidewalks should be covered with salt or similar materials. Please do not shovel or blow snow into the street.

What's The Difference Between Sanitary Sewers And Storm Sewers?

SANITARY SEWER: Sanitary sewer systems carry sewage from bathrooms, sinks, kitchens, and other plumbing components through underground pipes to a wastewater treatment plant where it is filtered, treated and discharged. Please notify the Sewer Authority immediately if you see that the lid is raised or it is overflowing. It is illegal to tie your sump pump, floor drains, gutters and down spouts into the sanitary sewer system. Please contact the Sewer Authority if any of these are items are connected at your home so we can help you correct the problem.



STORM SEWER: A storm drain is a system designed for the purpose of carrying rainwater or melting snow. They can often be found built into roadside curbs, alleys, or basements floors. Storm drains often carry rainwater and melted snow through an underground system that ends up in nearby rivers, creeks, or the ocean. Any problems or concerns regarding them should be directed to the Township Public Works Department.



Sanitary Sewer Line Replacement Work

The most recent Sewer Authority project that was done on the following streets has proven to be very successful in removing I/I* from the Sanitary Sewer System.

- Amy, Alexandra and Jennifer Lane (all)
- Section of Second Street from Hillside Avenue to dead end
- Section of Walker Lane from East Mount Kirk to Church Road including Jamestown & Roanoke Circle, and section of Walker Lane from Church Road halfway to dead end
- Summit Avenue (all)
- Section of Sunnyside Avenue from Second Street (paper road) to intersection of Farmhouse Drive

The next project will start by the end of September 2022, which will include the following streets:

- Right of way from Second Street through the woods to West Mount Kirk Avenue
- Farmhouse Road from Sunnyside Avenue to dead end
- From cul-de-sac of Regency Drive through right of way behind houses crossing Midland Avenue
- Right of way behind houses off Linnet Road

*Inflow and infiltration

(I/I) is clear water that enters the sewer system from a variety of sources.

Inflow is water that that is entering the system through downspouts, floor drains and sump pumps.

Infiltration occurs when groundwater seeps into sewer pipes through cracks, leaky pipe joints and/or deteriorated manholes which may cause sewage volumes to exceed design capacity.

Other Information:

LATE FEE: If payment is not received by LPTSA by the due date printed on the sewer bill, a 10% penalty is added on the current amount due only. The aggregate amount thereof shall bear interest from the penalty date at the rate of .5 % per month (1.5% quarterly). Failure to receive your bill does not relieve you of your obligation to pay, nor waive customer of paying penalty.

DELINQUENCY: Delinquent sewer bills will result in water shut off and/or property liens. Water turn off/on and property liens will result in additional fees charged to your account.

PAPERLESS BILLING: Get your bill sooner! Sign up toreceive your monthly sewer bill by email. If you haven't already signed up go to http://www.lowerprovidence.org/sewer. htm to complete the form. Past due and/or shut off notices will not be emailed. They will be mailed to you in paper form. Emailed bill(s) will come from "sewerbill@lptsa.org".

REMINDER: Please do not flush masks, gloves or wipes into the sanitary sewer system. This can cause the pumps to clog and damage to equipment at our pumping stations. Also, please don't flush disinfecting wipes down the toilet.

The Sewer Authority wants our customers to know that our employees are always available during regular business hours by calling 610-539-6161 to address emergency situations. After hours emergencies, please call 1-888-831-7818.

If you should have a backup in your outside line, contact us so that we can verify that it is not being caused by a blockage in our main line before you call your plumber.

Conserving Water this Fall

What you can do to manage stormwater on you property this season:

Plant trees. Fall is a perfect time for planting trees and shrubs. Be sure to plant species native to PA

Prune your trees, shrubs and perennials. Fall is the best time to prune trees and other plants in your yard. Pruning allows them to jump-start their growth and utilize more stormwater.

Clear leaves and debris from gutters. After cleaning you gutters, install a rain barrel at the end of your downspout to reduce the amount of stormwater running off of your property.

Keep storm drains near your property clear of trash and debris. Since they flow directly into local waterways, it is important that only water enters storm drains.

LEGISLATOR NEWS

Dear Neighbors:

I hope you and your families had a wonderful Summer! It has been a busy year in SD44 and in Harrisburg and I wanted to update you on some of the issues that I have been working on.

In early July, the General Assembly enacted a \$45.2 billion state budget for 2022-23. The budget negotiations dragged on for more than a week past our June 30 deadline and unfortunately the influence of special interests again overpowered the needs of Pennsylvanians. There were, however, some positive components of the final budget, including an increase in basic education funding for school districts across SD44 \$7.8 million for Methacton School District, 9% more than last year. The budget included a \$1.8 billion increase in overall education funding, but without any regulation or reform, for-profit schools will continue to drain the budgets of our public schools. Our public schools educate 9 out of every 10 Pennsylvania students and we need to continue to fight to ensure that educators and staff have the resources they need to create an environment where every child can succeed.

I was excited that my legislation to increase the minimum daily pay for members of the Pennsylvania National Guard was signed into law as part of the 2022-23 state budget! The language of my SB1286 was included as part of the larger Fiscal Code bill and it increases the minimum daily special state duty and state active duty pay rate for members of the National Guard from \$100 per day rate to \$180 per day. This was a small but important measure in our budget and I am grateful for the support of my colleagues who helped ensure its inclusion in our budget negotiations.

I am also continuing to work to protect the retirement security of our teachers as a member of the PSERS Board of Trustees. Earlier this Spring, Commonwealth Court sided with transparency in government and unanimously overruled the baseless preliminary objections filed by PSERS in my

lawsuit to rightly access records and documents related to my duties as a Board member. Pennsylvania's current and retired public school employees deserve informed representation on the Board of Trustees and we should not continue to vote on hundreds of millions of dollars of investment proposals without full access to records, documents and research.

SAVE THE DATE: My team and I are excited to host our annual Veterans Expo for all veterans in SD44 on Friday, September 30 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Hall D of the Greater Philadelphia Expo Center in Oaks. This is a great opportunity for veterans of all ages to interact with dozens of local and statewide veterans'organizations and service providers to ensure they are accessing the services and benefits available to them. I look forward to getting back to session this Fall to continue to fight for a peoplecentered government and to work to
