



2022 Budget Maintains Service Levels, Supports Firefighting Initiative

The Board of Supervisors approved the 2022 budget at their December 2, 2021 meeting. The budget maintains the current level of Township services while supporting a new initiative in the Lower Providence Fire Department. Additionally, the existing structural deficit was cut in half. A copy of the 2022 budget is available on the Township website.

The 2022 budget will increase the General Fund mill rate by .16, decrease the Emergency Services Fund mill rate by .2358, and establish a new Fire Fund with a mill rate of .3558 which nets out to a total of a .28 mill rate increase. Using an average property assessment of \$168,518, a taxpayer will see an average tax increase of \$47.18 or less than \$4 per month.

2022 BUDGET



The majority of expenditures in the 2022 budget remain consistent from last year with the exception of the normal annual personnel increases including salaries, pension and benefits. These represent a large portion of the General Fund, yet the Township is at a point where it is difficult to make cuts in this area without compromising services.

The Township's finances are on solid footing and anticipated to close 2021 in the black. Progress was made on traditional areas of concern such as the deficit and pension funding. The high returns in our pension fund afforded us

the opportunity to update the mortality tables to more realistic assumptions.

The Supervisors have positioned the Township to effectively deal with the deficit going forward. Long-term financial planning will be a critical part in achieving an ongoing stable budget. Planning will identify the sources and amount of revenue needed to support current and future operations.

The new Fire Department initiative will help address the national issue of declining volunteerism in the fire service. The program will pay firefighters to be on call at certain times to guarantee a response when the alarm sounds. This is crucial to ensure adequate fire protection throughout the Township.

TOWNSHIP-WIDE TRASH CONTRACT AWARDED

Following a competitive bidding process, the contract for the Township's residential trash and recycling collection was awarded to J.P. Mascaro & Sons. The Board approved the award at its December 16, 2021 meeting in a 4-1 vote pending a staff review of the bid documentation.

The Board previously had authorized the issuance of a bid for trash and recycling services since the current contract expires at the end of February 2022. The bid was issued in November and a mandatory prebid meeting was held on November 30, 2021. Representatives from three firms were in attendance. The companies were J.P. Mascaro, Republic Services, and Whitetail Disposal.

Bids were received from Mascaro and Republic and were opened on December 13, 2021 at a public bid opening.

Several options were included in the bid, including two options which would allow homeowners to choose either once or

twice a week pickup. Only one bidder submitted a bid for these options and the pricing was the same for once or twice a week pickup. Since no savings would be realized by a homeowner selecting once a week pickup, there was no value in considering these options.

The Board selected bid option #4 which includes twice per week trash and once per week recycling collection. Mascaro's bid for the five-year contract totaled \$18,026,640 and was the lowest bidder. In the initial year of the contract, from March 1, 2022 to February 28, 2023, the annual cost per household will be \$479.76 with residents billed four times per year.

In selecting this option, Supervisors wanted to maintain the same service level the residents are used to. Although savings could have been realized by reducing to a single trash pickup per week, there was a concern that this would have been a burden to many families.

The new contract continues to include year-round yard waste collection on Wednesdays and bulk pickup with the following modifications. Yard waste will be limited to 10 bags per collection and bulk pickup will be limited to one item per month, with the option to schedule more for \$50 per item. Tires will no longer be collected.

Annual household costs for the remainder of the contract are: \$551.76 in year two, \$601.32 in year three, \$655.44 in year four, and \$716.16 in year five. The contract includes an option for two additional years with annual household costs of \$734.04 and \$756. The Board will make a decision on the option years when the five year award nears its end.



COMMUNITY STRONG

Unprecedented Storm, Extraordinary Response

Last September, the remnants of Hurricane Ida brought unthinkable devastation to our township and across the region. We want to take this opportunity to thank our first responders and all those who reached out to help those in need during and after the storm.

The storm produced historic flooding levels of local waterways, with the Perkiomen Creek and Schuylkill River surpassing all-time records. Homes, businesses and infrastructure were severely damaged by the rising flood waters and wind.

For law enforcement officers, firefighters, EMS and Public Works crews, the storm demanded an unprecedented response. These courageous and dedicated public servants not only met the challenge but placed themselves in great danger in order to provide assistance to the residents and businesses of Lower Providence and the surrounding area.

Some 106 households reported water damage through emergency response and a number of residents were completely displaced from their homes. Nine Township residents have chosen to participate in the buyout program offered by the Hazard Mitigation grant program offered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) working with the Township to buy

out homes in the flood plain and maintain the properties as undevelopable open space.

In the days and weeks following the storm, there have been extraordinary efforts by community groups and individuals to help neighbors in need and those efforts are continuing.



COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE

Lower Providence 2040

A Comprehensive Plan for Lower Providence Township

Lower Providence Township is continuing the process of updating its Comprehensive Plan that will lay the foundation for our community for the next 10+ years. The plan will describe a long-range vision for the Township and provide direction for implementation of that vision. A committee made up of Township officials and community members is working with professional planners from the Montgomery County Planning Commission on the update.

A public meeting will be held in May for the community to review the proposed plan and provide input. Look for details on the Township website and Facebook page. It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will vote on the final adoption of the updated Comprehensive Plan in the fall of 2022.

In December, the committee went out into the Township's various neighborhoods to document what is working well and to determine what opportunities exist for specific recommendations to include in the final plan.

The committee is using data gathered and survey results to make policy recommendations and set priorities in these key areas:

- Employment and business development
- Commercial character
- Natural environment
- Road safety, traffic and transit
- Walking and biking
- Housing and Neighborhoods
- Community identity

The Lower Providence Township Board of Supervisors recognized the outstanding contributions of individuals and businesses as they presented the annual Community Awards. The 2021 recipients are: Citizen of the Year, Lisa Yanak; Volunteer of the Year, Lisa Furman Lampe; and Business of the Year, Evansburg Vineyards. A special recognition award was presented to the Outreach House of St. James Episcopal Church.

Citizen of the Year - Lisa Yanak

Through her 37-year career as an elementary school teacher in the Methacton School District and now in her many roles with community organizations, Lisa Yanak has made a difference in Lower Providence Township. Lisa devotes much time and effort on behalf of the Lower Providence Community Library. She served two terms on the Board of Trustees and continues to serve as president of the Friends of the Library. In this role, she is instrumental in ensuring the long-term success of the library through community fund-raising events.

Many in the township may remember the Halloween Haunted Garden she hosted at her home for 12 years. The event featured story time, snacks and interactive exhibits and though it was free, donations from visitors helped contribute over \$3500 to the library. In addition, Lisa has a leadership role in Lower Providence Community Action Partners which raised over \$3,000 for uniforms for the Lower Providence volunteer fire department. She also volunteers her time with the Patrician Society's local food pantry and Theater Horizon.

Volunteer of the Year -Dina Furman Lampe

Dina uses her contagious compassion to rally the Lower Providence community to help those in need, gathering muchneeded supplies for those most in need. She fields requests either in person or over the phone, reaches out to the community for resources, and often personally delivers the items. Utilizing her background in social services and public administration, Dina provided social service assistance with paperwork and referrals at the Haws Avenue Soup Kitchen in Norristown, holding office hours every other Sunday and serving dozens people in a day.

Dina sets an example for all, viewing those in need not as lesser, but as neighbors deserving respect and kindness.

Business of the Year - Evansburg Vineyards

Special Recognition Award - Outreach House




SEWER AUTHORITY NEWS

How Can Overloaded Sanitary Sewers Cause Flooding In Your Home?

The water in an overloaded sewer flows at a higher level than normal. If the home has sanitary fixtures or floor drains that are below the higher overload level, water can flow backwards through the sanitary sewer lines into the basement or other low-lying areas of the home.

Section 715.1 of IPC (International Plumbing Code) states that any plumbing fixtures that are installed on a floor with an



elevation below the elevation of the manhole cover of the next upstream manhole in the public sewer, such fixture shall be protected by a backflow preventer in the building drain or horizontal branch serving such fixture.

Such fixture connections might include washer hookups, water softener, backflushing lines, toilets, shower stalls, sinks and illegally connected sump pumps and floor drains.

If you feel that your fixture connections fall in this category, contact your sewer authority to see if they will come out and

Inflow is water that is entering the system through downspouts, floor drains and sump pumps.

Infiltration occurs when groundwater seeps into sewer pipes through cracks, leaky pipe joints and/or deteriorated manholes which may cause sewage volumes to exceed design capacity.


Low Income Housing Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

The Sewer Authority is now a vendor for LIHWAP. This is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water & sewage bills. Find out who is eligible and how to apply at www.lowerprovidence.org/sewerauthority.

Other Information:

LATE FEE: If payment is not received by LPTSA by the due date printed on the sewer bill, a 10% penalty is added on the current amount due only. The aggregate amount thereof shall bear interest from the penalty date at the rate of .5 % per month (1.5% quarterly). Failure to receive your bill does not relieve you of your obligation to pay, nor waive customer of paying penalty.

Be Proactive and **Protect Your Pipes**



Before the Freezing Temperatures Set In

- Know where your main water shut-off valve is located.
- Turn off your irrigation system.
- Eliminate sources of cold air near water pipes by fixing windows or insulating walls.
- Protect exposed pipes by wrapping them with insulation, fabric or newspaper.

When Temperatures Stay Below Freezing

- Let the snow cover your water meter. Snow acts as insulation, so don't disturb
- Allow a small trickle of water to run over night to keep pipes from freezing.
- Open cabinet doors to let warm air in your home reach the pipes.

If Your Pipes Freeze

- Shut off the water immediately.
- Warm the air around the frozen pipe. Avoid kerosene heaters or open flames.
- Turn the water back on slowly once pipes have thawed and check for cracks and leaks. -Source: PA American Water

DELINQUENCY: Delinquent sewer bills will

result in water shut off and/or property liens. Water turn off/on and property liens will result in additional fees charged to your account.

PAPERLESS BILLING:

Get your bill sooner! Sign up to receive your monthly sewer bill by email. If you haven't already signed up go to http://www.lowerprovidence.org/sewer.htm to complete the form. Past due and/or shut off notices will not be emailed. They will be mailed to you in paper form. Emailed bill(s) will come from "sewerbill@lptsa.org".

Reminder: Please do not flush masks, gloves or wipes into the sanitary sewer system. This can cause the pumps to clog and damage to equipment at our Pumping Stations. Also, please don't flush disinfecting wipes down the toilet.

The Sewer Authority wants our customers to know that our employees are always available during regular business hours by calling 610-539-6161 to address emergency situations. After hours emergencies, please call 1-888-831-7818. If you should have a backup in your outside line, contact us so that we can verify that it is not being caused by a blockage in our main line before you call your plumber.

Sewer Line Replacement Work

In the Sewer Authority's continued efforts to remove I/I* from the sanitary sewer system, construction is being completed on the section of Walker Lane from East Mount Kirk to Church Road including Jamestown & Roanoke Circle, and from Church Road halfway to the cul-de-sac. Construction will continue through spring 2022 to replace the main sanitary sewer lines and laterals serving the properties on the following streets, in no particular order:

- Summit Avenue
- Amy Drive, Alexandra Drive, Jennifer Lane
- Second Street
- Sunnyside Avenue (Note: Sunnyside Avenue will be detoured during the construction work. All residents will have access to their homes at all times.)

HWAD may be able to assist you with overdue water and wastewater bills.

What is LIHWAP?

The Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help lowincome families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant. You do not have to repay it.

To receive help...

- Apply starting January 4, 2022.
- · You don't have to be on public assistance.
- · You need to have an unpaid water bill.
- · You can either rent or own your home.

How does LIHWAP work?

LIHWAP Crisis grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one Crisis grant for your drinking water service and one Crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each.

Crisis situations include:

- Past-due water bills.
- Termination of utility service.
- · Danger of having utility service terminated (received a notice that service will be shut off within the next 60 days).

How do I apply?

- Apply online at www.compass.state.pa.us.
- Request an application by calling the Statewide Customer Service Center at 877-395-8930 or call PA Relay at 711 for the hearing impaired.
- Applications are available at your local county assistance office.

To apply, you will need:

- · Names of people in your household;
- Dates of birth for all household members;
- Social Security numbers for all household members:
- Proof of income for all household members; and
- A recent water bill.

Thefts from Motor Vehicles

Development Projects: Underway & Under Review

ON-GOING CONSTRUCTION / **NEARING COMPLETION**

Courts at Brynwood

Within this 139-townhome community along Germantown Pike, the units have completely sold out withconstruction nearing completion.

Eagleville Hospital

Phase 2 of the on-going rebuilding has begun. Several of the older buildings are being taken down in anticipation of new buildings replacing them in the next couple of years.

Enclaves at Evansburg

DeLuca Homes of Bucks County is underway withthis project, which is to include 24 small-lot single homes in a tract connecting Evansburg Road and Ridge Pike. Most of the homes have been completed.

Crawford Estates. 37 Crawford Road

There are to be eight lots, six of them being new. This project adjoins the intersection of Park Ave./Crawford Rd./Eagleville Rd., site of proposed intersection improvements. Most of the homes have been completed and are occupied.

Arrowhead Elementary

Methacton School District is reconstructing the existing Arrowhead Elementary School building at 232 Level Road. The project involves continuous operation of the existing building while the new building is being constructed. The new building is adding a second story over part, enhanced traffic circulation, stormwater management, and modernized construction systems. Construction is underway, and the new school is on schedule to be opened in Fall 2022.

Eagleville Elementary

Methacton School District is adding an addition at the entryway to the existing school at 125 Summit Avenue. It will be a two-story addition; the area of the addition is 2,190 SF. Construction work is now completed.

Moscariello at Crosskeys

Snow Removal Reminders

How Are Roads Cleared?

Snow removal is a difficult and a timeconsuming job. Township crews need many hours to complete snow clearing operations. As snow begins to accumulate. the Township concentrates on the major roads. As long as snow is falling, the Township's first priority is to keep the main roads open and passable. In such instances, it is unlikely that residential roads will be reached immediately, because the main roads must be repeatedly plowed and kept open. As soon as all major streets are clear, equipment is immediately moved into residential areas.

Roads are brined in advance of a storm; salting operations begin on priority roads and continue until all roads are complete. All roads are monitored for icy spots that may need treatment.

When plowing operations begin, usually around the 2" benchmark, plows start opening up the roadways. Opening up refers to plowing two passes along each street and this may be completed multiple times before the storm ends. This process helps first responders get to any emergencies. In addition, it reduces the amount of snow needed to be cleared once the storm has ended. At that point, curbto-curb plowing operations will begin.

The most economic and timely way for crews to clear snow is to push it off typically with the plow angled right. Crews are instructed to safely plow the snow in the most suitable area to expedite the process.

If your driveway is cleared before the street is completed, here is a tip that will help minimize the amount of snow left in front of your driveway. Clear an area to the left of the driveway entrance (standing in the driveway facing the street). When your street is plowed, the snow from the plow can be unloaded in this area instead of your driveway.

Please limit driving during winter storms whenever possible. Remember: If you are stuck in traffic, so are we. Also, please do not shovel or blow snow from your driveway into the street.

How to reduce the possibility of getting a huge pile of snow in your driveway opening when snowplows clear your street:





When a Snow Emergency is Declared:

Parking is prohibited on the odd numbered side of the street unless there is no off-street parking available at or within 300 feet of the property.

Anyone driving a vehicle without chains or snow (all-weather) tires that becomes stalled, incapable of moving or left unattended is in violation of the snow emergency provisions.

Any vehicle parked, stalled, incapable of moving under its own power or left unattended upon any street or road of the Township may be remove or towed by the Police Department.

What About Mailboxes?

Help reduce the risk of your mailbox being damaged. Do a visual inspection prior to the winter season. Most damage occurs from either an old, rotted post, or if the entire mailbox was installed incorrectly. Please visit the USPS website for more details.

If damage is caused by snow or ice hitting the mailbox, or due to deteriorated materials, repair or replacement is the responsibility of the resident. If it is believed that the damage is the result of direct contact with a plow truck, please call the Public Works Department, 610-635-3525. after the storm has subsided and within 48 hours, and we will evaluate the damage to determine responsibility.

It's the Law

State law requires that vehicles be completely clear of snow and ice. Headlights must be on when windshield wipers are in use. Daylight running lights, a standard feature on most cars these days, are not enough. It is necessary for



drivers in vehicles with daytime running lights to turn on their headlights in order to activate their taillights.

Fire Hydrants

If you have a fire hydrant on your property, please clear the snow away from the area around it, leaving the markers intact. This will assist firefighters in the event of an emergency.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Deicing With Salt: What You Should Know



When rainwater or snowmelt dissolves deicing salts, they can be carried into groundwater or surface streams with a detrimental effect. Native freshwater organisms, including fish, shellfish, insects, and plants, are not tolerant of high levels of salt, and consequently die off or are weakened. By killing freshwater plants,

excess saltalso destabilizes streambanks. leads to increased erosion, and hinders the effectiveness of efforts to restore native freshwater ecosystems.

Numerous alternatives to salt for deicing are available:

- Gritting materials (wood ash, sawdust, cinders, sand, kitty litter) create non-slip surfaces. They also accelerate natural melting by darkening the surface, retaining more solar heat. These will generally require sweeping in the spring.
- Small walkways and paved areas may be outfitted with heating elements to melt ice and snow.
- Pervious surfaces, including porous pavement, pavers laid in sand, and

similar features allow meltwater to quickly drain and prevent ice from forming in the first place.

Another anti-icing technique involves spraying dry roads with pre-mixed salt solutions referred to as brine. The result is a "non-stick" layer that helps prevent ice from forming in the first place. It requires significantly lower quantities of salt. It is important to be mindful that rain gardens, infiltration trenches, bioretention ponds and similar stormwater management facilities, if used to drain roads or parking areas that are regularly treated with deicing salts, also can create high salinity in groundwater.

How Trees Aid in Stormwater Management

Trees and forested areas play a critical role in preserving the ecological health, character, natural beauty, and historic heritage of our Township. Lower Providence is a largely built out community of wooded hillsides and curving roads. Many of the original drainage channels have been encroached upon by historical development which preceded existing stormwater, steep slope, and floodplain regulations. While the Township works on trying to mitigate the effects of some of this past development through stormwater remediation projects, restoration and protection of our existing natural landscape including maintaining current tree canopy levels is key to keeping our precious, native soils in place, mitigating stormwater flows, and recharging our groundwater.

Trees are important to stormwater because they capture and reuse large amounts of water. In particular, trees with trunk diameters of 30" or greater make the most significant contributions to runoff control. A single large, mature oak tree can capture 40,000 gallons of rainfall per year (source: https://www.usgs.gov/specialtopic/water-science-school/ science/evapotranspiration-and-watercycle). Conifers also intercept a lot of stormwater due to their year-round needle-leaf coverage.

Trees help reduce flooding through infiltration, interception, evaporation, and foliar (leaf) transpiration (see diagram). Interception and evapotranspiration also decrease runoff volume with larger trees providing exponentially more benefit than smaller trees. An average sized mature tree with a 25-foot diameter canopy can manage the 1-inch rainfall from 2,400 square feet of impervious surface, the footprint of a typical single-family home (EPA, Stormwater Trees Technical Report, 2017.) The absorption and interception of rainwater by large canopy trees as well as evergreens reduces volume and peak flow during storms. Many of us have

experienced rainfall slowly dripping from large trees during a downpour. Tree canopy reduces rainfall intensity by 20%, increasing lag time by up to three hours, reducing flooding by allowing both natural and township systems to manage and infiltrate stormwater more effectively. (Eric Kuehler, USDA Forest Service, "Give Me the Numbers: How Trees and Urban Forests Really Effect Stormwater Runoff")


Infiltration of stormwater recharges our underground aquifers which keeps our streams flowing during dry periods, helping to keep trees healthy, but also reducing flooding. Research has found that infiltration is on average 8X greater under tree canopies. (Eric Kuehler et al, USDA). This recharging of rainfall to groundwater is a natural form of stormwater control which trees do through their extensive root and leaf area systems. It helps maintain a more consistent base flow in streams during dry periods and helps reduce severe and rapid

"out of bank" flooding during downpours. Clearing even relatively small numbers of trees from a property can increase runoff to downstream neighbors, and aggravate downstream erosion. Once heavy rains are in direct contact with compacted lawn or eroded topsoil, the capacity of the soil to absorb and retain at least some of the stormwater is significantly impaired. Preservation of woodland remnants whenever possible is also important since native forest soils may have taken

hundreds of years to develop and are not readily replaced.

According to the Nature Conservancy "A Green Path to a Stable Climate", trees help moderate climate extremes and can help reduce the reoccurrence of extreme storms and cloudbursts, both locally and regionally. The evaporation and transpiration of moisture drawn up by trees from the ground restores moisture to the atmosphere where it can create a cooling effect and more gradual, regular rainfall, instead of violent cloudbursts.

In conclusion, preventing or slowing tree loss and replacing what is being lost whenever possible is one important tool the Township and residents can utilize to slow and offset future increases in stormwater flows while protecting our Township's natural heritage, beauty, and quality of life.
