# INTRODUCTION

# Study Purpose

The Comprehensive Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan will serve as a blueprint for parks, open space and natural resource protection and preservation for the next 10 to 20 years.

The Comprehensive Parks, Recreation and, Open Space Plan: examines greenways, trails and sidewalks and recommends enhancements to this connectivity infrastructure; recommends a methodology for open space preservation and acquisition; makes suggestions for improved park facilities, operations, maintenance, and staffing; and suggests options for potential new recreational programs and activities. This plan also provides an implementation and funding strategy.

Park and trail usage has expanded greatly after the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic as people sought an escape in outdoor recreation and open space while being quarantined at their homes. Parks act as outlets to connect with nature and reduce mental stress. Moreover, they improve physical wellness and promote healthy lifestyles; reduce time off from work due to health reasons; and can help lower health care costs for individuals. In addition to individual benefits, these facilities provide a variety of community benefits as well. Parks, trails and open space promote a sense of community through events and park usage. They also act as high priority items when families decide in which community to purchase a home as a municipality's park and recreation system is often the physical face, or identity, of the community. They also provide small children and teenagers opportunities to engage in after-school activities and organizations.

Along with these individual and community benefits, parks, trail and open space provide environmental and economic benefits. These benefits can also be quantified to show the value they provide to communities. The report, Return on Environment: The Economic Value of Protected Open Space in Southeastern Pennsylvania, released in 2011 and prepared for the GreenSpace Alliance and the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission, estimated the economic value created by the open space in Greater Philadelphia. The report found that protected open space in the 5-county Philadelphia region (Philadelphia, Bucks, Chester, Delaware and Montgomery Counties) reduces costs by avoiding \$133 million in expenditures for water supply, water quality, flood mitigation, wildlife habitat protection, air pollution removal and the capture of carbon by trees. In addition, the report found that the activity that occurs in parks and open space results in \$795 million in avoided annual medical expenses as people who are active enjoy a range of physical and mental health benefits.

The report also found that \$566 million is spent annually due to protected open space. This spending includes expenses for the management and maintenance of open space, spending for goods produced on preserved farms and tourism-related spending. Recreational activity on open space in the area also creates an estimated 6,900 jobs which generate about \$30 million in state and local taxes each year. In terms of residential property value, the report found that the total real estate premium credited to living within one mile of protected open space is \$16.3 billion.



#### Plan Vision

Enhance the quality, connectivity, and accessibility of the Township's abundant recreational and open space facilities and resources to meet current and future demands for infrastructure and programming and to benefit the health and welfare of the entire community.

#### Plan Goals

Create a sustainable plan for parks, recreation, and open space;

Provide equitable access and opportunities to all residents;

Preserve cherished Township characteristics and valued natural resources; and

Plan for safe multi-modal connections between various Township park, recreation, and open space resources.

# Plan Objectives

Survey area residents to determine current perceptions and needs regarding park, recreation, and open space facilities and programs in the Township;

Conduct public meetings to gather information, comments, and suggestions from residents, local organizations, and other stakeholders;

Inventory existing parks, recreational facilities, preserved open space, trails, schools, private sector recreation providers and other important recreation destinations within the Township;

Compare the existing inventory of park facilities with other similarly sized communities;

Analyze current active and passive recreational facility use;

Suggest ways to enhance existing and planned trails with additional connections to area recreational, employment, residential, shopping, and other destinations;

Develop a phased implementation and funding strategy to make the plan a reality; and

Create a diverse list of recommendations that promote social, economic and environmental sustainability.




# Township Profile


Lower Providence Township is in south-central Montgomery County, at the western border with Chester County. The Township is located approximately 17 miles west/northwest of Philadelphia, and includes areas of Audubon, Collegeville, Eagleville, Evansburg, Trooper, and Yerkes, encompassing 14.77 square miles. Present-day Lower Providence was established on land originally inhabited by the Lenni-Lenape tribe. It then became part of the original lands granted to William Penn and in 1729, the Township of Providence, which included Upper Providence, Lower Providence and the Boroughs of Collegeville and Trappe, was established. Providence Township was split into Upper Providence and Lower Providence in 1805. Today, Lower Providence Township is a growing suburb close to many economic centers and the regional highway network.

Lower Providence is served by the award winning Methacton School District. Schools within Lower Providence Township include Arrowhead Elementary, Eagleville Elementary, Woodland Elementary, and Arcola Middle School.

Lower Providence is governed by a five-member Board of Supervisors. Members are elected at large for six-year staggered terms; positions include Chairman/woman, Vice Chairman/woman, three Supervisors, and one Student Representative. The Board is responsible for appointing the Township Manager, as well as all advisory and regulatory boards.

Residents of Lower Providence Township enjoy a great number of outdoor recreational facilities which include Township parks such as Eagleville Park, Dell Angelo Park, and Francesco A. Mascaro Memorial Field and Community Park; County parks such as the Audubon Wildlife Sanctuary and the Central Perkiomen Valley Park, as well as Evansburg State Park and Valley Forge National Historical Park. Two of Pennsylvania's most significant trails, the Schuylkill River Trail and the Perkiomen Trail, converge in the southwest corner of the Township.





## Regional Context

The regional context map shows the relationship between Lower Providence Township, Montgomery County, and the State of Pennsylvania. The Township is bordered by Collegeville Borough, Perkiomen and Skippack Townships to the north; Worcester and East Norriton Townships to the east; West Norriton and Upper Merion Townships to the South; and Schuylkill Township (Chester County) and Upper Providence Township to the west.

Route 422 runs through the southern portion and immediately to the west of the Township, I-76 runs south of the Township, SR-202 south and west of the Township, and I-476 runs west of the Township.

Lower Providence is in the Schuylkill River Watershed. The Schuylkill River runs along the southern border, and the Perkiomen Creek runs along the western border; the two intersect in the southwest corner of the Township. Skippack Creek runs through the northern portion on the Township, with Eagleville Run and Rock Run serving as tributaries, and outlets into the Perkiomen Creek. Mine Run, another tributary of the Perkiomen, runs though the south-central portion of the Township. A small portion of Stony Creek, which feeds into the Schuylkill River approximately four miles downstream from the Lower Providence, is in the eastern corner of the Township.



# Lower Providence Township Demographics

The following information focuses on demographics and population information in Lower Providence Township and surrounding municipalities. Demographic and Census data were gathered from the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) and U.S. Census Bureau.

#### Population and Projections

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey (ACS) five-year estimates, Lower Providence Township had a population of 26,187 in 2015, which was an increase of 17.0% from the 2000 Census count. The population in 2020, as projected by DVRPC, is 26,679, which is an increase of 1.9% over the 2015 population estimate. In comparison, Montgomery County experienced a population increase of 9.2% from 2000 to 2015 and is projected to have increased by 2.6% between 2015 and 2020.


Using the 2018 population estimate of 26,418, and with 14.77 total square miles in the Township, Lower Providence has a population density of 1,789 people per square mile.


The population of Lower Providence is projected by DVRPC to reach 28,448 by 2040. This reflects a 7.7% increase from the 2018 population. In comparison, Montgomery County's population is projected to grow by 11.9 % to 918,918, with the largest numerical increases in population to occur in Lower Merion, Upper Providence, Horsham, Upper Merion, New Hanover, and Limerick Townships.

#### Age

The largest age group in the Township is 45-54 year-olds, followed by the 25-34 age cohort. The largest increase of population by age from 2000 to 2018 was in people who are 85 and older, which increased by a notable 632%, most likely due to the development of the continuing care retirement community at Shannondell. Every age cohort from age 45 to 84 increased between 27 and 94%. The population of people aged 35 to 44 decreased by 29%, 25 to 34 increased by 15%, 20 to 24 increased by 87%, 15 to 19 increased by 16%, 10 to 14 decreased by 10%, 5 to 9 decreased by 20%, and under 5 increased by 3%. In 2018, the median age was 39.7, which is lower than the County's median age of 41.3. This demographic information suggests that the population is aging and that this plan needs to account for recreational needs of both older and younger residents.



#### Race

Both Lower Providence Township and Montgomery County are predominantly White. Within Lower Providence Township, 74.12% of the population identifies as White. 13.7% identifies as Asian, 5.7% as Black or African American, 5.1% as Hispanic or Latino, and less than 0.1% as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander. 0.1% identifies as Some Other Race, and 1.2% of the population identifies as "Two or More Races."

In Montgomery County, 76.1% identify as White, 8.9% as Black or African American, 7.4% as Asian, 5.0% as Hispanic or Latino, 0.1% as American Indian or Alaska Native, less than 0.1% as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, 0.2% as Some other Race, and 2.2% as Two or More Races.


#### Income

The median household income in Lower Providence was \$94,020 in 2018. This is roughly 6.6% more than the Montgomery County median household income of \$88,166. Montgomery County's median household income is considerably higher than the state average of \$59,445 and national average of \$60,293.

4.0 % of the population in Lower Providence lives below the poverty rate, which is defined as lacking enough income or material possessions to meet one's needs. This is below the percentage in Montgomery County (6.2%) and less than one third of Pennsylvania as a whole (12.8%).


The income demographic information suggests that Township residents are likely to have disposable incomes for recreational purposes and related purchases.

# **Poverty Rates 2018**





#### Education & School Enrollment

The majority of the population within Lower Providence has received some college education, at 68.1%, with 47.1% of the population obtaining a bachelor's degree or higher; these are on with educational attainment rates in surrounding areas. In Montgomery County, 70.4% of the population has had some college education, and 48.8% obtained a bachelor's degree or higher; in Pennsylvania as a whole, 55.0% has had some college education and 30.7% has obtained a bachelor's degree or higher.


In 2018, of the 25,440 residents age 3 or older, 6,093 were enrolled in school. Of those enrolled in school, 9.0% were in nursery or preschool; 3.6% were in kindergarten; 17.3% were grades 1-4; 19.8% were in grades 5-8; 28.1% were in high school; and 14.3% were in college, undergraduate; and 7.8% were in graduate or professional school. According to the PA Department of Education, the Methacton School District is projected to go from 4,764 students in 2018-2019 to 4,242 students by 2028-2029; this is an 11% drop.

# Data Collection & Methodology

In 2020, Lower Providence Township selected the team of Simone Collins Landscape Architecture (SC); Certified Park and Recreational Professional, Patrick Stasio; and engineering, environmental, and surveying firm Spotts, Stevens & McCoy (SSM) as the consultants to guide the planning process. The project team also included a Project Committee, comprised of residents, professionals, stakeholders, and Township staff and one (1) member from the Board of Supervisors.

Data found within this report was compiled using the best available information. This included Geographic Information System (GIS) data from Lower Providence Township, Montgomery County, Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) and Pennsylvania Spatial Data Access (PASDA), which was used to prepare field maps and planning documents consisting of the base aerial photography, municipal boundaries, roadways, parcels, contour lines, and other identifying land features. Other information included previous planning studies, field reconnaissance data, steering committee and public meetings, key person interviews, focus groups, WikiMapping, and an online public opinion survey.

#### Site Reconnaissance

The consultants performed an initial field reconnaissance in July 2020 to inventory, analyze, and document existing conditions of parks, trails, and open space. Additional field reconnaissance was completed as needed to gather further insight for the plan. Field data was recorded by the consultants onto the field maps and photographs were taken for use in the Plan. This information was then used in evaluating planning alternatives in the development of the Plan.

#### **Public Participation**

The project was guided by a project study committee that provided critical insight and direction to the consultants in the development of the Plan. The consultants worked with the project committee to review the public participation process, gain clarification of data gathered, and guide the planning process before presenting to the public.

Community input is a critical component of a successful comprehensive plan, so it was important for the project team to hear citizens' observations, needs, and visions, and to incorporate what was learned into the Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan. The Township placed meeting dates, information from prior meetings, and other relevant information and links on their website and Facebook page.

The public participation process included four public meetings, six committee meetings, four focus group meetings, ten key person interviews, and an online public opinion survey accompanied by WikiMapping, an online interactive mapping tool. Meeting notes and attendance sheets for each meeting, as well as survey results, can be found in the Appendix of this report.

Brainstorming Exercise - Public Meeting 1, 10.26.2020

#### Public meeting 1 – Monday, October 26, 2020

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, this meeting was held through a virtual format. The consultants began the meeting by introducing the project team and committee. They noted their experience and reviewed the importance of having a plan. The consultants discussed the project schedule, scope, and purpose. The consultants explained that the online survey and WikiMapping would be available after the public meeting and that public involvement is extremely crucial in the planning process to ensure the plan reflects the needs of the community. The attendees were led through an interactive discussion. The meeting was recorded and placed on the Township's web site.

#### Public Meeting 2 – Tuesday, January 26, 2021

This meeting was held through a virtual format. The consultants began the meeting by providing survey results and discussing existing information that will be used for the plan. The consultant team then reviewed up to date analysis and introduced concepts for the plan. The meeting was recorded and placed on the Township's website.

#### Public Meeting 3 – Thursday, April 15, 2021

This meeting was held during a regularly scheduled meeting of the Township Board of Supervisors through a hybrid in-person/virtual format. The consultants reviewed and explained the recommendations of the draft plan. They presented draft plans for the greenways, trails, and proposed open space acquisition. They also discussed recommendations for programming and recreation enhancements to the existing facilities. The plan then was posted on the Township's website for a 30-day public review period.

#### Public Meeting 4 - Thursday, June 24, 2021

The final plans were presented to the public at the final public meeting.

## Key Person Interviews

The consultants interviewed ten people to discuss the plan and ideas moving forward. The interviews provided some detailed information reflected in the plan. Key takeaways from the interviews are noted below:

Lower Providence Board of Supervisors (x5)- Key Takeaway(s):

- Support for Evansburg connection / Perkiomen Crossing.
- Consider future DCNR/ Evansburg partnership for additional ballfields.
- Consider open space acquisition connecting Dell Angelo Park to Ridge Pike.
- Consider open space acquisition of open area across from Eagleville Park.
- Safe on-road bicycle connections to parks are essential.
- Important to engage all diverse members of the Lower Providence community.
- Skippack Creek Watershed Alliance is an important organization. Lower Providence is one of 7 participating municipalities reducing sediment loading into Skippack.

# Valley Forge / National Park Service - Key Takeaway(s):

- Open to further discussion of potential future trail development in Valley Forge parcel north of Route 422.
- There is need for additional river access, potentially at Pawlings Road parking area.

#### Montgomery County - Key Takeaway(s):

- County-owned open space to remain passive. Not in favor of active recreation on County-owned land.
- County supportive of Evansburg connection / Perkiomen crossing.

#### Perkiomen Valley Watershed - Key Takeaway(s):

• Supportive of the following trail: conceptual Central Perkiomen trail, Evansburg connection / Perkiomen crossing, Valley Forge connector.

#### John James Audubon Center - Key Takeaway(s):

- Meadows & birding habitat should be a Township priority in areas that can be converted from mown lawn.
- Consider ADA accessible bird viewing locations.

#### Evansburg State Park - Key Takeaway(s):

• Open to further discussion of potential future trails through Evansburg.

#### **Focus Groups**

Four focus groups were created to allow persons to discuss the plan through interest groups. The groups were divided into active recreation, passive recreation, schools and social, religious and senior organizations. These groups discussions were beneficial to the consultants and ensured that the plan was taking into consideration various user groups within the Township. Key takeaways from the focus groups are noted below:

Active Recreation Focus Group (4 attendees) Key Takeaways:

- Improve existing Lower Providence facilities (i.e. fields) before building or adding new facilities.
- Consider converting Eagleville / Evansburg Point Park ballfields to turf.
- Help reduce organization costs and help generate revenue.
- Sports organizations should have quarterly collaborative meetings.

Passive Recreation, Nature, Trails Focus Group (9 attendees) Key Takeaways:

- Evansburg / Hoy Park Perkiomen multi-modal crossing preferred to Yerkes Road bridge crossing.
- Trails should serve recreation and commuter populations.
- County-owned open space to remain passive.
- Consider sidewalks along Arcola Road from Hoy Park to Perkiomen bridge crossing.

Schools Focus Group (4 attendees) Key Takeaways:

- There are no crossing guards in MSD. (Perceived safety concerns)
- Every school student is assigned a designated bus stop.
- Redtail Park is used by student population. Restroom in this location would be beneficial.
- MSD School Board is discussing the future of the Audubon Elementary School property and building.

Social, Community, Seniors Focus Group (9 attendees) Key Takeaways:

- There is limited indoor recreation space, more needed for senior population programming.
- St. Gabriel's should be a priority for partial open space acquisition.
- ADA access at all parks is essential.
- Important to get more kids walking to recreation facilities and school.

# Online Public Opinion Survey


A 66-question public opinion survey was created by the consultant team with Project Committee and Township input to gather important user information related to Lower Providence Township parks, recreation, open space, and trails.

- Priorities for open space


A total of 648 responses were received during the planning process. A sample of survey results are presented in this chapter. Complete survey results can be found in the report Appendix.







Are your household's recreation and open space needs being met in or around Lower Providence?

If you live in Lower Providence, how long have you lived in the Township?







Which parks, natural areas, trails, or facilities do you visit for recreation purposes? (Please check all that apply)




How often do you bike or walk for recreational purposes?




What would encourage you to walk more?




From a traffic safety perspective, how comfortable do you feel biking or walking in Lower Providence?




What would encourage you to bike more?












The consultant team established an online mapping platform in which residents were able to identify important existing conditions (such as destinations, existing trails, sidewalk gaps, etc.) as well as desired improvements (park improvements, trails, etc.) A total of 102 map comments were received during the project process.

The WikiMapping showed that residents were generally interested in new trail and sidewalk connections and bike routes. Few pointed to having new parks.

# **Relevant Planning Documents**

# Lower Providence Township Comprehensive Plan, 2002

#### Relevant Objectives:

Promote the retention and character of the historic villages in the township through the establishment of clear boundaries and zoning that enforces their distinct characteristics while allowing for appropriate new development.

Establish a dialogue with neighboring municipalities regarding land use, zoning, and development issues.

Establish a dialogue with governmental bodies and institutional uses that own large landholdings in the township to discuss the future planning of these sites.

Ensure the preservation of open space parcels in designated areas of the township by using innovative zoning techniques.

#### Land Use

 Goal: To promote an orderly pattern of land use that balances the need to utilize land for development with the need to preserve it for recreational and environmental needs.

#### Transportation

 Goal: To promote solutions to existing road and traffic problems and to encourage transportation alternatives to the automobile.

#### Natural Features and Cultural Resources

 Goal: To promote the preservation and enhancement of significant natural features and cultural resources that defines and distinguishes the township's unique environment and history.

#### Objectives

- Enact a riparian buffer ordinance for stream corridor and wetland preservation.
- Adopt stormwater best management practices to promote stream water quality and groundwater recharge.
- Require open space preservation for developments using the Alternative Development Plan in the R-2 District.

#### Parkland & Recreation

 Goal: To maintain livability in the township, parkland suitable for active and passive recreation should be obtained.

#### Objectives:

- Implement policies of the 2000 update of the township's recreation plan.
- Work with the county on the establishment of the Schuylkill River Trail.
- Revise the existing (OSRD) Open Space Residential District to require that a percentage of the designated open space be designed for active recreation.

# Selective Update of the Lower Providence Recreation Plan, 2002

A selective update of the Township's 1993 Lower Providence Recreation Plan, this plan updated parkland inventory and needs, and it amended the original recommendations, where appropriate. The five Park Zones of the Township (A through E) are described, and park, recreation, and open space resources are inventoried in each Zone. Parkland deficiencies at buildout are listed for each, according to NRPA recommendations which were, at the time, 10.5 acres of parkland for every 1,000 residents. This Plan discusses neighborhood vs. community parks, recommending that 76% of be neighborhood parkland and 24% community parkland. Eagleville Park was the Township's sole community park at the time that this plan was published.

The update concludes with a series of recommendations designed to alleviate parkland deficiencies. It also includes recommended policy decisions designed to increase township recreational opportunities, preserve open space and natural amenities, and ensure that future land developments contribute to township park and recreation needs. Also, where appropriate, recommendations from the 1993 Open Space Plan are included, among which is the recommendation that an Official Township Map be created.

# Lower Providence Township Open Space Preservation Plan, 2005

This document was an update to the Open Space Preservation Plan, 1995, and followed the Green Fields/Green Towns Open Space Task Force program established in 2003. The purposes of this plan included:

- Providing recreation opportunities including trails.
- Conserving natural features.
- Preserving historic or cultural landscapes.
- Maintaining scenic quality.
- Protecting water resources.
- Stimulating the revitalization of developed communities with green infrastructure.
- Shaping the form of land use and development.
- Preserving agricultural land.

#### Goals and Objectives:

Active Recreation – Provide public parks for a variety of active recreational uses, within reasonable travel time for every Township resident and worker.

- Create a hierarchy of parks: neighborhood greens (small neighborhood parks with tot-lots and fields, walking distance) to community-wide parks (larger parks serving the entire Township with fields and courts, accessible by car)
- Provide active recreation based on park type and facility needs of area to be served; provision of park sites through either outright purchase or development process.
- Preserve open space/natural amenities based on criteria specific to each part of the Township: preserve remaining open tracts in heavily developed areas (ie. Trooper and Audobon) for open space and active recreation; and preserve tracts in less developed areas (ie. Along Skippack and Perkiomen Creeks and Schuylkill River) for environmental preservation and passive recreation.

Pedestrian and Bicycle Mobility – Improve pedestrian and bicycle mobility access for all residents from residential areas to parks, open space, commercial and employment centers.

- Connect parks using multi-purpose trails: walking, bicycling, cross-country skiing, personal mobility; provision through purchase of fee simple titles/easements or development process.
- Connect residential areas, commercial and employment centers with pedestrian/bicycle facilities and recreational trails. Pedestrian/bicycle facilities to be provided along roads as sidewalks or wide, paved shoulders. A comprehensive sidewalk/trail system is a critical component of the Open Space Plan.
- Establish a system of bike routes and bike lanes on roadways.

Natural Features – Promote the preservation and enhancement of significant natural features and cultural resources that define and distinguish the Township's unique environment and history.

- Enact a riparian buffer ordinance for stream corridor/ wetland preservation.
- Adopt stormwater best management practices (BMPs) to promote stream water quality and groundwater recharge.

Parkland and Recreation – Parkland suitable for active and passive recreation should be obtained to maintain Township livability.

- Revise the existing OSR Open Space Residential District to require that a percentage of designated open space be designed for active recreation.
- If Methacton School District should dispose of school sites, the Township should be granted first right to acquire park and recreation assets for permanent preservation.

Agriculture – Preserve agriculture as part of the heritage and rural charm of Lower Providence, and as a valuable resource that be forever lost to development.

The following areas or parcels were identified as significant in Lower Providence Township. Those properties greater than ten (10) acres are areas that are recommended to be overlaid with OSR Open Space Residential cluster zoning to ensure that if they are developed that a significant percentage of the site would be preserved as open space:

- St. Gabriel's Protectorate. [recommendation still relevant]
- Heyser Property. [recommendation still relevant]
- Eagleville Hospital Open Space [recommendation still relevant]
- IBEW / Pechins Mill Road Area. [recommendation still relevant]
- Camp Hideaway. [recommendation still relevant]
- Lower Providence Rod and Gun Club. [recommendation still relevant]
- Park Avenue, between Woodland Avenue and Shannondell. [recommendation still relevant]
- Cicchiello Agricultural Property [recommendation still relevant]
- KeyBank Agricultural Property [recommendation still relevant]

#### Additional 2005 Plan Recommendations:

Indoor Recreation Facility. Notwithstanding the ability to use school facilities, the Township should conduct a feasibility study to see if such a center is warranted or if the school buildings will fulfill the need. [recommendation still relevant]

Official Map. A useful planning tool that delineates on a map land that the Township wishes to purchase for public purposes. [recommendation still relevant]

School District Agreement. The Township should negotiate an agreement with the Methacton School District to secure permanent public access to the District's indoor and outdoor facilities. [recommendation still relevant]

# Montco 2040: A Shared Vision The Comprehensive Plan for Montgomery County, 2015

This Comprehensive Plan lays out visions for the County that include management of the County's built and natural environment. It is structured around three interrelated themes and their associated goals, as follows:

Connected Communities – Help people connect to a broader community beyond local municipal boundaries.

- Collaboration among stakeholders
- Improved transportation choices
- Trails and greenways connecting multiple places
- Vibrant downtowns and destinations accessible by everyone

Sustainable Places – Effectively enhance and sustain neighborhoods and communities long term.

- Modernized infrastructure network
- Improved stormwater management
- Protected natural resources
- Opportunities for healthy lifestyles
- Diverse housing choices
- Enhanced community character

#### Land Use Vision

- Attractive, prosperous, and accessible residential neighborhoods designed for neighborly interaction
- Traditional rural landscapes with preserved farms, wooded valleys, and country homes
- Modern, walkable, green, connected and mixed use commercial and community cores
- Vibrant downtowns and village centers
- Interconnected greenways, trails, and parks

- An extensive county trail system that connects with local municipal trails and regional trails
- Improved bikeability of roads and bicycle facilities

# Natural Areas Inventory Update, Montgomery County PA, 2008

This report inventories important areas of open space and core habitats within them that should be conserved to sustain habitat biodiversity and reduce stress upon threatened species that require more sensitive environments. The report makes recommendations regarding the management of these conservation landscapes and natural areas. Three conservation landscapes relevant to Lower Providence Township are identified: Middle Schuylkill River Conservation Landscape, Pawling Ponds, Skippack Creek Conservation Landscape, and Middle Perkiomen Creek Corridor. The 1995 NAI named Eagleville Woods a high priority site of local significance.

Identification of these core habitat areas, as they exist within or adjacent to Lower Providence Township, provides insight into areas needing special or enhanced protections.

# Connections 2045, DVRPC, 2017

This plan's vision for the Greater Philadelphia Region is a prosperous, innovative, equitable, resilient, and sustainable region that increases mobility choices by investing in a safe and modern transportation system; that protects and preserves our natural resources while creating healthy communities; and that fosters greater opportunities for all. The mission is to achieve this vision by convening the widest array of partners to inform and facilitate data-driven decision-making. DVRPC is engaged across the region, and strives to a leader and innovator, exploring new ideas and creating best practices.

The Plan was developed around five integrated core principles:

- 1. Sustain the Environment
- 2. Develop Livable Communities
- 3. Expand the Economy
- 4. Advance Equity and Foster Diversity
- 5. Create an Integrated, Multimodal Transportation Network

#### Bike Montco, 2018

The Vision: "In Montgomery County, bicycling will be a fundamental part of daily life where all bicyclists can enjoy a safe, convenient ride every time they put their foot on a pedal." It imagines a Montgomery County where every citizen has the freedom to choose bicycling without fear of danger or difficulty

and where bicycling is equal to any other transportation or recreational choice. It is intentionally ambitious and inclusive. Bike Montco is designed around six themes: Connected Communities, Equity, Safety, Education and Enforcement, Health and Environmental Sustainability, and Vibrant Economy. These themes provide a framework for the recommendations contained within the plan and, like the vision, were identified through public outreach, extensive research, and input from a volunteer steering committee.

# Municipal Facilities Study, 2018

At the outset of this study, KCBA Architects and their team were tasked with evaluating the existing township building to support the goals of improving township services; identifying and addressing safety, security, technological, and special needs; modernization and replacement of aging and inefficient building systems; and improving layout and overall functionality.

The township building is centrally located on an active campus that also houses a public library and recreational amenities. Hence, it was noted early in the study process that any proposed improvements must address not only the building's interior operations but also consider impact to overall campus circulation and the day-to-day experience of all community users.

This report culminates with a series of illustrations that demonstrate the evolution of the proposed master plan. This entailed the identification and vetting of several potential alternatives, ultimately leading to the recommended scenario to renovate the existing administration building and construct a new stand-alone police facility.

# Neighboring Townships' Plans

The consultants reviewed Open Space and/or Comprehensive Plans of the following neighboring areas: Collegeville Township, East Norriton Township, Perkiomen Township, Skippack Township, Upper Providence Township, West Norriton Township, and Worcester Township. These plans give valuable insight as to how open space in Lower Providence Township connects with open space in its neighboring municipalities and creates connections for residents across municipal lines. These plans helped identify common goals and objectives across the municipalities within the region.


# **Zoning and SALDO Summary**

What is Zoning & SALDO?

In Pennsylvania, a zoning ordinance is a law that may permit, prohibit, regulate, restrict and determine land use, size & height of buildings, density and intensity of land use and protection of natural & historic resources.

SALDO is an acronym that stands for Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance. The SALDO contains the design standards, procedures and other requirements for Subdivision Plans and Land Development Plans within Lower Providence Township

The following is a review of relevant sections of existing Township ordinances that relate to parks, recreation, open space, multimodal connections, and natural resource protection.



# **Zoning Definitions**

BUFFER — An area designed to separate the uses of land which abut it and which functions to ease the transition between them. Unless otherwise specified, buffers may be included as part of the required setbacks and yard areas. Buffers may be comprised of natural and/or man-made materials, depending upon the purpose they are intended to serve.

BUFFER AREA — A strip of land which is planted and maintained in shrubs, bushes, trees, grass or other ground cover material and within which no structure or building is permitted except a wall or fence which meets Township requirements.

CONSERVATION EASEMENT — A legal agreement granted by a property owner that strictly limits the types and amounts of development that may take place on such property. Such easement shall restrict the original and all subsequent property owners, lessees and all other users of the land in a manner approved by the Township Solicitor and Board of Supervisors and shall run in perpetuity.

EASEMENT — A permanent right, including a right-of-way, granted by a property owner for the limited use of his/her private land for public, quasi-public or private purposes. It can be a utility, drainage or public access easement or for other purposes. The owner of the property shall have the right to make any other use of the land which is not inconsistent with the rights of the grantee.

EROSION — The removal of surface materials by the action of natural elements.

BASE FLOOD ELEVATION — The one-hundred-year-flood elevation. Within the approximated floodplain, alluvial soils floodplain or other similarly documented areas, the one-hundred-year-flood elevation shall be established nearest to the construction site in question.

 ${\sf FLOOD}$  — A temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas.

FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT — The application of a program or activities which may consist of both corrective and preventive measures for reducing flood damages.

ONE-HUNDRED-YEAR FLOOD — A flood that has one chance in 100 or a one-percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any one year.

IMPERVIOUS COVERAGE — That percentage of the total lot area which is covered by impervious surfaces, including buildings as well as all paved areas.

IMPERVIOUS SURFACES — Those surfaces which do not absorb water. All buildings, parking areas, driveways, roads, sidewalks and any areas in concrete and asphalt shall be considered impervious surfaces within this definition.

OPEN SPACE — That portion of a tract that is set aside for the use and enjoyment of residents and the protection of sensitive natural features, farmland, scenic views and other unique features. Open space may be accessible to the residents of the development and/or Township or it may contain areas of farmland which are not accessible to the public.


RIPARIAN BUFFER AREAS — Land immediately adjoining and upgradient from any type of natural watercourse, wetland, fen, river or stream that is vegetated with a combination of trees, shrubs and other herbaceous plants. Riparian buffer areas can include floodplain and wetland areas.

STEEP SLOPE — A grade of 15% or greater as determined by the soil survey or accurate contour mapping.

SWALE — A low-lying stretch of land which gathers or carries surface water runoff.

TOPSOIL — Surface soils and subsurface soils which presumably are fertile soils and soil material, ordinarily rich in organic matter or humus debris. Topsoil is usually found in the uppermost soil layer called the "A-Horizon."

WATERCOURSE — Any natural or artificial swale, stream, channel, drain or culvert in which waters flow continuously or intermittently.



# Relevant Zoning Regulations

ARTICLE XXVI: Public Facilities and Open Space
Overlay District

(p. 301) § 143-196. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the Public Facilities and Open Space Overlay District to provide appropriate areas for public and private parks, open space and recreational, municipal and educational uses. Specifically, it is the intent of the district to provide:

Suitable areas within the Township to accommodate publicly owned and operated buildings and facilities.

Suitable areas within the Township to accommodate public and private educational facilities.

Suitable areas within the Township to accommodate public parks, recreation areas and open space in order to meet the open space and recreation needs of the Township.

Regulatory standards which will ensure the compatibility of adjacent uses and which will preserve and protect environmentally sensitive open space and recreation areas from incompatible development.

Design and regulatory standards for educational facilities which will ensure the compatibility of adjacent uses.

Public lands held for conservation and open space preservation, including open space dedicated to Lower Providence Township or Montgomery County subject to the following additional requirements:

Open space activities are limited to uses of a primarily passive or non-intensive nature, including hiking, bicycling, forest preserve, watershed protection area, bridle trails, fishing, picnicking and similar uses.

Municipal, county, state and federal parks, including, but not limited to, Audubon Wildlife Sanctuary, Evansburg State Park and Valley Forge National Historical Park, subject to the following additional requirements: Parks are limited to uses of a nonintensive nature, including picnic areas, playing fields, hiking, bicycling, fishing, ice skating, overnight camping, wildlife sanctuary, boating, playgrounds and tennis.

§ 143-202. Development standards. Any use in the Public Facilities and Open Space District shall comply with the development standards below:

A. Traffic and access. The applicant shall demonstrate to the Township Engineer and the Board of Supervisors that satisfactory provisions are made to prevent traffic congestion and hazards to the surrounding area. Provisions shall be made for safe and efficient ingress and egress to and from the development. The Board of Supervisors may require a traffic impact study for any use in this district when they determine, after consulting with the Township Engineer, that such a study is necessary to demonstrate the adequacy of the access points and streets for accommodating the traffic generated by the proposed use. Existing residential areas shall not be infringed upon by the significant volumes of traffic from the proposed use.

B. Sewer and water. On-lot sanitary systems shall only be permitted for uses under 5,000 square feet of gross floor area if approved by the Board of Supervisors. If the Board of Supervisors approves an on-site system, the sanitary system must also be approved by the Township Sewer Enforcement Office (SEO), the Montgomery County Health Department and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP). If public water is not available and if the demand is in excess of 500 gallons per day, the applicant shall demonstrate to the Board of Supervisors that a well on the site will not adversely affect existing water supply systems in the area.

C. Neighborhood impact. The impact of the proposed use on the surrounding properties and neighborhood shall be considered. The use shall not adversely affect the general welfare or orderly development of the general neighborhood in which it is proposed. The scale, form, and appearance of structures and open space should be compatible with the general character of the residential area. The applicant is encouraged to present evidence on the need for the proposed use, including data on the location of other similar uses in the Township and surrounding areas.

§ 143-204. Landscaping. All uses within the Public Facilities and Open Space Overlay District shall be landscaped in accordance with the following standards:

A. Internal landscaping of all parking areas shall be provided in compliance with the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance.29

B. Perimeter landscaping shall be provided along all road rights-of-way and property boundaries, in compliance with the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance. Existing landscape material may be used to meet these requirements when possible.

ARTICLE XXIX: Steep Slope Conservation District.

§ 143-235. Legislative intent. In expansion of the statement of community development objectives in § 143-4 of this chapter, the specific intent of the SS Steep Slope Conservation District shall be to conserve and protect those areas having steep slopes, as defined herein, from inappropriate development and excessive grading, as well as to permit and encourage the use of said areas for open space purposes so as to constitute a harmonious aspect of the continuing physical development of Lower Providence Township.

§ 143-236. District boundaries. The SS Steep Slope Conservation District is defined and established as follows: those areas having slopes of 25% or greater as defined by a field-generated topographic survey using two-foot-interval contours and which have an elevation difference of at least six feet.

§ 143-238. Uses permitted. Some of the uses permitted in the Steep Slope Conservation District without the submission of an erosion and sediment control plan include:

Wildlife sanctuaries, woodland preserves, arboretums and passive recreation areas, including parks but excluding enclosed structures.

Game farms or hunting preserves for the protection and propagation of wildlife, but excluding enclosed structures.

Recreational uses such as parks with such activities as hiking, bicycle and bridle trails, camps and picnic areas, but excluding enclosed structures.

### ARTICLE XXXIV: Riparian Buffer Overlay Zone.

§ 143-267. Relationship to other zoning regulations. The RBOZ is an overlay to the existing zoning districts within the Township. The provisions of the underlying district shall remain in full force, except where the provisions of the RBOZ differ from the provisions of the underlying district, in which case the provision which is more restrictive and less permissive shall apply. The RBOZ will work with the provisions of the underlying district, as well as other natural resource protection standards, to regulate land use and the siting and engineering of all development within the Township to ensure natural resources are preserved and protected.

§ 143-268. Establishment.

The RBOZ shall include and cover the following watercourses and other bodies of water:

- Schuylkill River and tributaries.
- · Perkiomen Creek and tributaries.
- · Skippack Creek and tributaries.
- · Stony Creek and tributaries.
- · Indian Creek and tributaries.
- Eagleville Run and tributaries.
- · French Run and tributaries.
- Miller Run and tributaries.
- Mine Run and tributaries.
- Rock Run and tributaries.
- Schatz Run and tributaries.
- All other perennial and intermittent streams.
- Lakes and ponds.
- · Wetlands.

Any other body of water identified by resolution of the Lower Providence Township Board of Supervisors as being included within the RBOZ.

- B. The width of the RBOZ shall be and is hereby established as follows:
- (1) Zone One. This zone will begin at each edge of a stream channel/waterline/wetland edge (whichever is applicable) and occupy a minimum width of 30 feet measured horizontally on a line perpendicular to the top of the bank/edge of waterline or wetland.

Where the land within 30 feet of the defined edge of a stream channel has an upland slope greater than 10%, Zone One shall include the land from the stream channel edge and the upland slope and shall further extend outward 30 feet from the edge or top of such upland slope; and

(2) Zone Two. This zone will begin at the outer edge of Zone One and occupy a minimum width of 60 feet in addition to Zone One, unless modified herein. Where the one-hundred-year floodplain extends greater than 90 feet from the waterway, Zone

One shall remain a minimum of 30 feet, and Zone Two shall extend from the outer edge of Zone One to the outer edge of the one-hundred-year floodplain.

§ 143-271. Restoration and revegetation of riparian buffers. The requirements of this section shall apply to all those uses in the RBOZ, whether permitted by right or by conditional use, and in cases where a subdivision or land development is proposed. Native vegetation approved by the Township must be used in replanting efforts. Three layers of vegetation are required when replanting the riparian corridor. These three layers include herbaceous plants that serve as ground cover, understory shrubs, and trees that form an overhead canopy. The revegetation plan shall be prepared by a qualified licensed professional, such as a landscape architect or engineer; shall comply with the following minimum requirements; and shall be subject to the approval of the Township Engineer:

A. Ground cover. Ground cover consisting of a native seed mix extending a minimum of 30 feet in width from the edge of the stream bank or waterline, whichever is wider, must be provided along the portion(s) of the RBOZ where little or no riparian vegetation exists or where such vegetation has been removed. Appropriate ground cover includes native herbs and forbs, exclusive of noxious weeds as defined by the Pennsylvania State Department of Agriculture. This thirty-foot-wide planted area shall be designated on the plan as a "no mow zone" and shall be left as natural cover except in accordance with the maintenance instructions stated on a Township-approved maintenance plan

### ARTICLE XXV: Floodplain Conservation District.

143-178. Declaration of legislative intent. The specific intent of the regulations of the Floodplain Conservation District is to protect areas of floodplain subject to and necessary for the containment of floodwaters, in order to promote the public health, safety and welfare.

§ 143-179. Definition and establishment of District. The Floodplain Conservation District is defined as those areas of the Township subject to flooding as defined in Subsections A and B of this section. Where the Flood Insurance Study does not extend along a waterway, the regulations of Subsection A shall apply.

A. Those areas subject to inundation by the waters of the onehundred year flood as delineated in the Flood Insurance Study for the Township of Lower Providence, as prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), effective December 19, 1996, or the most recent revisions thereof.

B. Alluvial soils (AS). The low area adjoining and including any water or drainage course or body of water subject to periodic flooding or overflow and delineated as alluvial soils or local alluvium by the Soil Conservation Service, United States Department of Agriculture, in the Soil Survey of Montgomery County, Pennsylvania 2008. The boundary for this floodplain must be verified using hydrologic and hydraulic engineering studies.

# Relevant SALDO Regulations

ARTICLE IV: Design Standards.

§ 123-33. Sidewalks. [Amended 1-21-2016 by Ord. No. 630] Sidewalks shall be installed along all existing or proposed public or private streets and common parking areas except when this requirement is waived at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors, upon recommendation of the Township Planning Commission and Engineer.

§ 123-50. Landscaping. For development in all multifamily, commercial and industrial districts, the applicant shall, at a minimum, provide landscaping in accordance with the following two categories as required in §§ 143-28B and 143-66 of Chapter 143, Zoning.

A. Internal landscaping. Internal landscaping shall be required for buffering and/or screening purposes. Plants in this category shall include shade trees; shrubs; ground covers, including lawn areas, earthen mounding; and/or other features in compliance with this subsection.

B. Perimeter landscaping. Each multifamily or nonresidential development shall be screened as a necessary safeguard to the character of an adjacent area. Such screening shall be permanently maintained to present an attractive appearance. Screen planting requirements shall be applicable along areas fronting on roads, areas adjacent to other properties, areas along parking lot facilities and areas along mobile home developments. Perimeter landscaping shall consist of the same types of plants and other landscape features as internal landscaping in compliance with this subsection.

C. Screen buffer design. The primary component of a screening buffer shall be a double row of evergreen trees spaced 15 feet apart on center, with the trees in one row offset 7 1/2 feet from the trees in the other row, and the rows shall be at least five

feet apart. These trees shall be not less than six feet in height at the time of planting and shall be of such species that the expected height at maturity shall be not less than 20 feet.

§ 123-51. Natural features; critical impact areas.

A. All subdivisions and land developments shall be designed to preserve and protect the natural features of the land. Natural features include existing grades and contours, bodies of water and watercourses, woodlands or large trees, street shade trees, scenic or historic points, pedestrian walks and bridle trails that have been in public use and other community assets.

B. In addition to the above, plans should be designed to minimize the disturbance of critical impact areas. Critical impact areas are environmentally sensitive features or conditions, including but not limited to stream corridors, streams, wetlands, estuaries, slopes greater than 15%, highly acidic or highly erodible soils, areas of high water table, mature stands of native vegetation and aquifer recharge and required discharge areas.

§ 123-52. Shade trees. Shade trees shall be planted along both sides of all new or existing streets at intervals of no less than 40 feet and no more than 50 feet, except where tree masses have been preserved where shade trees would otherwise be located. Trees shall be placed back of the right-of-way line of street, so as not to interfere with the installation and maintenance of sidewalks, drainage facilities and/or utilities and shall be of two-inch caliper, balled and burlapped, and guaranteed for 18 months after planting. Species selection shall be at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors or as recommended by the Planning Commission. The types of shade trees shall be such that when grown to full maturity the trees shall not impede the utilization of solar energy by neighboring structures.

ARTICLE XVII: Open Space Residential Design Standards (OSR).

§ 123-97. Open space design standards.

A. All lots shall be grouped into areas consisting of a minimum of five lots, but no more than 25 lots.

B. The maximum or minimum number of lots may be increased or decreased, with the approval of the governing body. However, the applicant must demonstrate that such an alternative plan is more appropriate for the tract in question and will meet both the general intent and design standards of this article rather than being intended solely for economic savings.

C. Housing units shall abut common open space to the greatest extent possible or provide direct access to open space for lots and privacy to individual yard areas.

D. A meandering, circuitous eight-foot wide paved macadam walking trail shall be designed and installed within the fifty-foot open space tract boundary buffer. The paved walking trail shall surround the entire development in order to provide an active recreation feature solely for the residents of the development. This walking trail is not intended for use by other residents throughout the Township.

E. Views of neighborhoods from exterior roads shall be minimized by the use of changes in topography, existing vegetation that is preserved and/or additional landscaping, including reforestation.

F. No building envelope shall contain wetlands, floodplains or slopes over 25% and all building envelopes shall be set back at least 20 feet from these sensitive areas unless a greater distance is required elsewhere in the Township's Zoning Code.

G. Active recreation areas, including, but not limited to, golf courses, playing fields, playgrounds and courts. Such active recreation areas shall be set back from the tract boundary a minimum of 100 feet. At a minimum, 15%, or one acre, whichever is greater, of the required common open space must be usable for active recreation. Any areas designed for active recreation must be generally level (finished grade not to exceed 3%), safely accessible to all of the residential lots in the OSR development and shall be designed in conformance with the regulations of § 123-140G of the Township's Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance. Active recreation areas must have frontage or direct access from a road within the proposed development. This requirement for active recreation land may be used to satisfy the prime recreation land requirements of § 123-140 of the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance, provided that the applicant can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Board of Supervisors that the active recreation land requirements contained above superseded the regulations of § 123-140.

### ARTICLE XIX: Recreation Land and Fees.

§ 123-108. Purpose; applicability; limitations; dedication; fees.

A. Purposes: to provide adequate open spaces, recreational lands and recreational facilities to serve residents and occupants/ employees of new developments, for both active and passive recreation; to recognize and work to carry out the Recreation Plan, Open Space Preservation Plan and Comprehensive Plan for Lower Providence Township.

B. Applicability. This article shall apply to any subdivision or land development for which a preliminary plan or a combined preliminary/final plan is submitted after the enactment date of this amendment. This article shall apply to any subdivision or land development that will eventually result in one or more new dwelling units or new principal commercial, office or industrial building floor area.

D. Land dedication. An owner or developer of any subdivision or land development regulated under this section shall be required to dedicate the specified amount of recreation land, unless there is agreement between the Board of Supervisors and the applicant that recreation fees shall be required in lieu of dedicated land. The land and fee requirements of this section shall be based upon the number of new dwelling units or maximum building floor area that would be allowed on the lots of a subdivision or land development after approval.

E. Fees. If the Board of Supervisors determines that a proposed subdivision or land development is required to pay fees in lieu of dedicating recreation land, this fee shall be as established by Township resolution (\$1,160/dwelling unit as of April 2021).

ARTICLE XXIII: Natural Resources Protection.

§ 123-114. Tree preservation, protection and replacement.

A. Natural resources plan: legislative intent. It is the intent of the natural resources plan to provide protection and preservation to the existing urban forestry canopy as a vital environmental natural resource of Lower Providence Township.

B. Tree protection and preservation. Preplanning conference. Prior to the preparation of formal land development and subdivision plans, the applicant/developer is encouraged to attend a preplanning conference to review the natural resources plan prepared pursuant to this subsection with Township staff.

Every tree determined by the Township Landscape Architect to be living and healthy, with a DBH of eight inches or greater and which is designated to be removed or which is destroyed, shall be replaced with one or more new shade trees of a type approved by the Township and have a trunk diameter of not less than 2.5 inches in caliper.

No heritage tree is to be removed for any reason without approval of the Board of Supervisors and after recommendation of the Township Landscape Architect. Any heritage tree removed without approval by the Board of Supervisors must be replaced with trees of equivalent value calculated by using the Truck Formula Method provided by the International Society of Arboriculture using the most recent issue.

# Additional Regulations

ARTICLE III: Stormwater Management.

§ 129-13. General requirements.

A. All applicants proposing regulated activities in the Township that do not fall under the exemption criteria shown in § 129-6B and C of this chapter shall submit a stormwater management site plan, consistent with this chapter, to the Township for review. All applicants proposing regulated activities that fall under the exemption criteria identified in § 129-6C shall submit a simplified stormwater management site plan, consistent with this chapter, to the Township for review. These criteria shall apply to the total proposed development even if development is to take place in stages. Impervious surface shall include, but not be limited to, any roof, parking or driveway areas and any new streets and sidewalks. Any areas designed to be gravel or crushed stone shall be assumed to be impervious unless designed as a BMP (e.g., pervious paver blocks, reinforced turf, gravel-filled grids, etc.).

D. For all regulated earth disturbance activities, erosion and sediment (E&S) control best management practices (BMPs) shall be designed, implemented, operated, and maintained during the regulated earth disturbance activities (e.g., during construction) to meet the purposes and requirements of this chapter and to meet all requirements under Title 25 of the Pennsylvania Code and the Clean Streams Law. Various BMPs and their design standards are listed in the Erosion and Sediment Pollution Control Program Manual (March 2012), as amended and updated.

N. Where a development site is traversed by watercourses, drainage easements shall be provided conforming to the line of such watercourses. The width of the easement shall be adequate to provide for the unimpeded flow of stormwater runoff from the one-hundred-year storm event. Terms of the easement shall prohibit excavation, the placing of fill or structures, and any alterations that may adversely affect the flow of stormwater within any portion of the easement. Periodic maintenance of the easement shall be required by the landowner to ensure proper runoff conveyance, as defined by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

P. Any stormwater management facilities regulated by this chapter that will be located in or adjacent to waters of the commonwealth or wetlands shall be subject to approval by PADEP through the Chapter 105 permit process, or, where deemed appropriate by PADEP, the general permit process. When there is a question as to whether wetlands may be involved, it is the responsibility of the applicant to show that the land in question cannot be classified as wetlands; otherwise, approval to work in the area must be obtained from PADEP.



# **Inventory & Analysis Mapping**

# Geology

Bedrock geology is rarely visible and its influence on natural features may often be overlooked. Bedrock geology is the foundation of an area and along with local hydrology, is responsible for the changes in elevation, steep slopes and location of waterways.

Bedrock geology also influences plant communities and soils. Bedrock or parent material has a great influence on the type of soil formed. Igneous bedrock leads to soils with a high stone and boulder content. Montgomery County is located in the Triassic Lowland and Piedmont Upland section of the Piedmont Physiographic Provence. The Triassic Lowlands are primarily red shales and sandstones, with intrusions of diabase. Four formations, Stockton Sandstone/Conglomerate/Shale, Lockatong Argillite/Shale, Brunswick Shale/Sandstone, and diabase, make up the Triassic Lowlands. The Piedmont Upland is comprised of metamorphic and igneous rock (granite and schist), although there is a band of carbonate rock which stretches east from Chester County to Abington Township. Wissahickon Schist/Granite Gneiss/Hornblende Gneiss, Chickies Quartzite, and Leger/Dolomite/ Elbrook/Conestoga Lime-stone, are the formation found in the Piedmont Upland.

### Geologic Formations

### Brunswick Formation

• Reddish-brown mudstone, siltstone, and shale, containing a few green and brown shale interbeds; red and dark-gray, interbedded argillites near base.

### Lockatong Formation


• Dark-gray to black, thick-bedded argillite containing a few zones of thin-bedded black shale; locally has thin layers of impure limestone and calcareous shale.

#### Stockton Formation

• Light-gray to buff, coarse-grained, arkosic sandstone; includes reddish-brown to grayish-purple sandstone, siltstone, and mudstone.

#### Ledger Formation

• Light-gray, locally mottled, massive, pure, coarsely crystalline dolomite.





# Topography & Steep Slopes


Topography and steep slopes are naturally occurring, and are results of geology, hydrology, as well as manmade development. Topography limits development and steep slopes (slopes over 15%) are classified as environmentally sensitive.

The Soil Conservation Service's Soil Survey for Montgomery County has four classifications for slopes:

- 0 to 3 percent,
- 3 to 8 percent,
- 8 to 15 percent,
- 15 to 35 percent.

As slope increases, the depth of topsoil and the ability of the soil to support structures decreases. Steep slopes have a combination of vegetation, climate, soil and underlying geology which will differs from the surrounding area. Environmental sensitivity of the steep slope is different from lowland areas. especially If vegetation is removed from steep slope areas, sediment erosion is a likely result which will lead to increased stormwater runoff.

Lower Providence Township has several steep slope area. Steep slopes are located in all parts of the Township, but are more specifically located along several water bodies: Skippack Creek, Mine Run, Perkiomen Creek, and the Schuylkill River, and tributaries.



# **SOILS**

## Prime and Important Agricultural Soils

Agricultural soils are measured based on fertility, depth to bedrock and groundwater, texture, erodibility, and slope. Based on these characteristics' soils are classified as farmland of statewide importance. Prime farmland includes deep, well-drained, and moderately sloped soils that can support high yields of crops with little management. Lower Providence Township has soils considered to be prime farmland or farmland of statewide importance. One area of prime farmland is the southern part of the Township, south of Sunnyside Avenue and Ridge Pike all the way to the Schuylkill River. Another is the far northwestern part of the Township, between the Perkiomen and Skippack Creeks. Most of the remainder of the Township has soils considered to be farmland of statewide significance.


### Hydric Soils

Hydric soils are periodically wet soils in an undrained condition that often support the growth of wetland vegetation. Some hydric soils are found in drained conditions; these will not exhibit wetland vegetation. Hydric soils that have been drained for agricultural use are one example of this situation. Soils with major hydric components are a conservative indicator of wetlands. Other soils have hydric components in limited settings, such as depressions, bottom lands, swales, drainage ways, and alluvial soils. These soils have a high water table and frequently pond.

Lower Providence Township has several areas of hydric soils. For the most part, they correspond to the water bodies in the Township: Schuylkill River, Eagleville Run, some parts of the Mine Run, Schatz Run, Miller Run, French Run, Rock Run, and the West Branch of the Stony Creek. Interestingly, most of the land along the Skippack Creek is not hydric soils. There is one large area of hydric soil not associated with a creek. It is on the northwest side of Sunnyside Avenue, from Farmhouse Drive nearly to Highley Road.

#### Alluvial Soils

Related to hydric soils, alluvial soils are frequently, but not always, located within a floodplain. These soils have been deposited by flowing water and are not stable as a result of their texture and composition. The presence of alluvial soils is only one indicator of a floodplain. Changes in the tributary drainage area or slope of the adjacent stream may create a floodplain that is either larger or smaller than the area of alluvial soils. Also, alluvial soils do not indicate the probability of recurrence of a flood (for example, a 100-year flood). An important aspect of alluvial soils is that they often form aquifer recharge





# Watersheds

A watershed is an area that drains all rainfall to a common outlet, stream or conveyance channel. Surface water moves across Lower Providence Township via the following watersheds:

Flows to Schuylkill River

- Trout Creek Watershed
- Crow Creek Watershed
- · Indian Creek Watershed
- Schuylkill River Watershed

Flows to Perkiomen Creek



Stormwater water may run onto and off of impervious surfaces such as parking lots, roads, buildings, and other structures during periods of heavy rain and snowfall. Impervious surfaces are paved surfaces through which water cannot infiltrate ie: sidewalks, driveways, roadways, parking lots, buildings/rooftops, etc. These surfaces usually convey rainwater into storm drains, but can also discharge overland across lands that may be classified as pervious - that can infiltrate water.

Lower Providence Township is within the Schuylkill River watershed. Within the Perkiomen Watershed are several smaller subwatersheds. The largest is the Skippack Creek (runs through the Evansburg State Park). Mine Run drains much of the south-central part of the township, between Egypt Road and Sunnyside Avenue. Smaller creeks drain directly to the Perkiomen Creek, including Schatz Run, Miller Run and French Run. The West Branch of the Stony Creek drains the northeastern corner of the Township. The Stony Creek drains directly into the Schuylkill River at Norristown. Indian Creek drains directly into the Schuylkill River at Port Indian in West Norriton Township.



# Hydrology

**Streams -** Streams, rivers, and waterways play important historic, recreational, and environmental roles for people who live in the region. The following waterways run through or adjacent to Lower Providence Township:

- Schuylkill River and tributaries.
- · Perkiomen Creek and tributaries.
- Skippack Creek and tributaries.
- Stony Creek and tributaries.
- Indian Creek and tributaries.
- Eagleville Run and tributaries.
- French Run and tributaries.
- Miller Run and tributaries.
- Mine Run and tributaries.
- Rock Run and tributaries.
- Schatz Run and tributaries.

**Floodplains** - Floodplains are low lying areas next to streams, rivers, or waterways that are subject to periodical complete or partial flooding during rain events. Floodplains are meant to flood as part of the hydrologic cycle. The boundaries of floodplains are typically irregularly shaped and often meander through communities, unseen. Flooding under normal circumstances is not dangerous, but when development approaches these areas, risk of damages and possible loss of life increases. When these areas are naturally vegetated, it can help trap and reduce the amount of suspended sediment from upland runoff that would otherwise reduce water quality and impair aquatic habitat. Having a healthy floodplain will also create better downstream conditions while storing large amounts of water that helps replenish aquifers. Regulations protect these important areas and help to protect people from property damage and loss of life.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) produces flood zone maps to identify floodways, 100-year flood zones, and 500-year flood zones. These areas are identified on the Hydrology Map. "100-year flood" does not mean that a rain event will cause flooding that will only happen every 100 years, but

rather that there is a one percent chance that a certain amount of rain will fall in a particular location over a set amount of time in a given year. A 500-year flood has a .2% chance of happening within any given year.


The Federal Clean Water Act requires Pennsylvania to establish water quality standards for all streams and other water bodies in the state. The standards establish criteria that need to be met to protect designated water uses. That means that the streams are evaluated periodically to ensure that the water quality standards that are associated with the uses are met. The higher the standards, the higher the waterway's value for protection and propagation of aquatic life and hence the higher the stream quality.

Below is the federal government's list as it is used in Montgomery County, including a summary of what the water quality criteria are based on. The list is prioritized from the lowest designation (WWF) to the highest (EV).

- WWF Warm Water Fishes Maintenance and propagation of fish species and additional flora and fauna that are indigenous to a warm water habitat.
- CWF Cold Water Fishes Maintenance and/or propagation
  of fish species including the family Salmonidae and
  additional flora and fauna that are indigenous to a cold
  water habitat.
- TSF Trout Stocking Fishes Maintenance of stocked trout from February 15 to July 31 and maintenance and propagation of fish species and additional flora and fauna that are indegenous to a warm water habitat.
- EV Exceptional Value Water A stream or watershed that
  constitutes an outstanding national, state, regional, or local
  resource, such as waters of national, state, or county park
  or forests, or water that is used as a source of unfiltered
  potable water supply, or waters of wildlife refuges or state
  game lands, or water that has been characterized by the
  Fish Commission as "Wilderness Trout Streams," and other
  waters of substantial recreation or ecological significance.

In Lower Providence, the following waterways have been designated:

- Perkiomen Creek TSF
- Schuylkill River WWF
- Skippack Creek TSF
- Stony Creek WWF
- Mine Run TSF
- Unnamed tributary of Schuylkill WWF
- Unnamed tributary of Perkiomen TSF





# Land Use

Residential uses are the largest land use in Lower Providence. Housing types include:

- Single-family detached dwelling (most comment housing type) and Single-Family Attached (Commonly known as townhouses)
- Mobile Homes (there are three mobile home parks in the Township—Trooper, Sunnyside, and Valley Forge Crossing)
- Multifamily (Apartments) includes Audubon Court, Colony Arms, Eagle Stream, and Mill Grove.
- Continuing Care Residential includes the community of Shannondell and Providence Place Senior Living.

Commercial land uses are concentrated along major roadways (i.e. Ridge Pike) and are categorized by:

- Retail. Consists of strip commercial development, primarily located along Ridge Pike, or in the Audubon area along Egypt Road.
- Office. Located throughout the Township, high concentration of offices are located in the Valley Forge Corporate Center.
- Mixed Use. Typically these units (residential above, commercial below) are in converted older dwellings in or near the villages.

Industrial land use is most visible at Superior Tube in Evansburg. There are additional industrial uses in the Valley Forge Corporate Center.


Institutional land uses include religious facilities, the County Prison at Eagleville, Township institutions and Eagleville Hospital.

Utility land uses are public water and sewer pumping stations and the natural gas line, which runs through the southern portion of the Township.

Open Space land uses are divided into two categories—public and private.

- Public: This includes all public parkland located in the Township. Besides the federal-owned Valley Forge National Historical Park and the state-owned Evansburg State Park, it includes the county owned Mill Grove and the Township's park system.
- Private. This land is the private open space owned by homeowners associations.

Agriculture land uses were once the dominant land use in Lower Providence, and now constitutes less than 1 percent of the Township's total acreage.





# Woodlands & Greenways

#### Woodlands

Before modern times 99% of Montgomery County was once a dense forest of hardwoods: Oaks were the dominant species, but Chestnut, Tulip Poplar, Hickory, Ash, Red Maple, and Dogwoods were also present. Several hundred years of clearing and cultivation, and in more recent times the rapid development of houses and commercial facilities, have drastically reduced all woodlands. Primary remaining woodland types are:

- Red Oak Northern Red Oak is predominant, but Black, Scarlet and Chestnut Oak are also abundant.
- Eastern Red Cedar Includes this species and associated species: Gray Birch, Red Maple, Sweet Birch, and Aspen.
- Sugar Maple/Beech/Yellow Birch Associated species include Red Maple, Hemlock, Northern Red Oak, and Tulip Poplar.


Woodlands and hedgerows serve many purposes - Woodlands prevent erosion, provide habitat for wildlife, provide buffers for creeks, and offer recreational opportunities for residents. Hedgerows and wooded corridors also prevent erosion, and provide cover for wildlife movement, shelter, and migration. Different species of trees attract different types of wildlife. In general, more diversity in vegetation, the more species of animals it can support.

The map on the opposite page shows the wooded areas in Lower Providence Township based on information collected from DVRPC land use data. Portions of Township lands are wooded, especially Evansburg State Park. In addition to land along the Perkiomen Creek and Schuylkill River.

#### Greenways

Greenways are corridors of land that generally parallel creeks and streams. They often have conservation, ecological, cultural, historic and recreational value. The primary purpose to designate a "Greenway" is to foster the preservation and protection of critical habitats and protect and enhance water quality. Greenways may or may not contain a trail or allow access through them.

In Lower Providence Township they are protected under ARTICLE XXXIV (Riparian Buffer Overlay Zone) This ordinance regulates land use to ensure natural resources are preserved and protected and is described earlier in the chapter.





# **Cultural Inventory**



While buses are provided for all MSD students, it is important to consider safe walkable connections to school facility and bus stops within Lower Providence.

In 2017 Methacton School District (MSD) closed the Audubon Elementary School (F) located on Egypt Road. While the school facility is aged and requires upgrades such as air conditioning, there may be opportunity to work with MSD to consider Township indoor recreation use of this location. This is discussed further in chapter 3, recommendations.



All other roads are classified as local roads and are under the township's jurisdiction. Roadway classication and ownership is important as different reviews are required for multi-modal improvements along PennDOT roadways as compared to Township-owned roads.







# **Public Transportation**

The Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) operates public transit bus service in Lower Providence Township.


SEPTA operates four bus lines which primarily run on the township's major arterials and provide the following services:

- Route 91 This bus operates on Ridge Pike and provides service between the Norristown Transportation Center and Graterford in Perkiomen Township.
- Route 93 This bus also operates on Ridge Pike and provides service between Norristown and Pottstown.
- Route 99 This bus operates between Norristown and Pottstown, via Route 422, with a stop in Oaks. It runs on Egypt Road in the township.
- Route 131 This bus provides service to Valley Forge Corporate Center from the Norristown Transportation Center

It is important that SEPTA bus stops are connected to Township destinations (parks, recreation, businesses, etc.) via the municipal sidewalk network. This systems provides residents the option to travel without use of a car in Lower Providence.

# Sidewalks & Trails

#### Sidewalks

Sidewalks are the backbone of a walkable community. Sidewalks are largely concentrated in the residential developments of Lower Providence Township. High-volume roadways and lack of pedestrian facilities often prevent residents or visitors from walking to the trails, parks, and open space of the Township. Chapter 3 - Recommendations include improvements to fill critical sidewalk gaps.

#### Trails

Lower Providence Township contains several trails and is a hub for two important regional trails: the Perkiomen Trail and the Schuylkill River Trail. Township residents have nearby access to the trails within the Valley Forge National Historical Park, The John James Audubon Center, and others.


#### Perkiomen Trail


The Perkiomen Trail is a 19-mile-long multi-use rail trail along the Perkiomen Creek. It begins at the junction with the Schuylkill River Trail near the mouth of the Perkiomen and Valley Forge National Historical Park and ends in Green Lane Park. One of most important trails in the region, there are limited access points to this trail for Lower Providence residents.

### Schuylkill River Trail

The Schuylkill River Trail is a multi-use trail along the Schuylkill River. There are currently about 75 completed miles of the Schuylkill River Trail in sections, including 30-plus miles between Philadelphia and Parker Ford in East Coventry Township, Chester County, and the trail is ultimately planned to run about 140 miles from the river's headwaters in Schuylkill County to Fort Mifflin in Philadelphia

While used extensively for active recreation, these trail systems are increasingly used as an alternative commuter route. Advances in electronic bicycle batteries will continue to present multi-use trails as viable alternatives to automobile commuting.






# STRAVA Bicycle & Running Data


STRAVA is a popular application which utilizes GPS tracking to record routes by walkers, runners, and cyclists. STRAVA heatmapping was used to locate popular routes within and around Lower Providence Township. This mapping delineates the highest used routes within the Township. STRAVA data provides insight into the most well-traveled and potentially safest routes for future pedestrian and bicycle improvements.

There is limited running data within the interior of the Township, and it is primarily concentrated within neighborhoods. Most runners use the regional trails along the perimeter of Lower Providence. There is little to no run or bicycle usage in the center of the Township along or near Ridge Pike.

Due to limit bicycle infrastructure, there is limited bicycle data in the interior of the Township, while the most popular cycling routes are located on the edge of the Township on the regional trials.

# Stormwater Management & MS4

WHAT IS MS4?

The MS4 program is mandated under the Clean Water Act and administered by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). The goal of this program is to reduce the amount of pollution discharged into waterbodies from separate storm sewer systems (MS4s).

An MS4 is a collection of structures, like a retention basin, roadside inlet, or underground pipe, and they are designed to collect and transport stormwater and discharge it, untreated, into local waterways. MS4s are owned or operated by a city, town or other public entity and are not connected to the sanitary sewer system or wastewater treatment plant.

Through this program, local municipalities must obtain a permit to legally discharge stormwater into local streams and creeks. To meet the terms of this permit, they need to create a Stormwater Management Program (SWMP) that is designed to reduce the amount of pollution entering local waterbodies.

Every SWMP must address 6 focus area, also called Minimum Control Measures (MCMs) that are considered essential for successfully reducing stormwater pollution:

- Public Education and Outreach
- Public Participation and Involvement
- Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination
- Construction Site Runoff Control
- Post-Construction Runoff Control
- Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping for Municipal Operations" \*

The Skippack Creek watershed area within Montgomery County is within the larger Perkiomen Creek watershed. The Skippack Creek watershed covers an area of 55.8 square miles, and spans Montgomery and Bucks Counties.



Lower Providence Township has joined 7 other municipalities within the Skippack Creek watershed to jointly work together to reduce sediment loading to the Skippack Creek.

#### Pollution Reduction Plan


Lower Providence Township has submitted a Pollution Reduction Plan (PRP) to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PennDEP) and awaiting approval of that plan. The PRP includes the use of Best Management Practices (BMPs) for storm water management as part of their Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit compliance. The PRP already has earmarked some of the projects proposed within the Park and Rec Plan in the Townships Pollution Reduction Plan (PRP). Any funding that can be obtained as part of the Parks, Rec & Open Space Plan that can be used for BMPs will help offset MS4 costs. The Township PRP is not yet approved, and the Eskie Park and MARA Fields (Audubon) basins have previously gone through naturalization. The PRP is trying to take credit for them. Woodrow and Associates prepared the PRP and therefore they should be informed of all of the projects proposed as part of the Parks and Rec Plan.



# <u>Valley Forge National Historic Park: (Approximately 900 acres within Lower Providence Township)</u>

- Valley Forge National Historical Park is the site of the third winter encampment of the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. The National Park Service ts the site and interprets the history of the Valley Forge encampment. The park contains historical buildings, recreated encampment structures, memorials, museums, and recreation facilities.
- The park is 3,500 acres in total and is visited by over 1.2 million people each year. The park also provides 26 miles (42 km) of hiking and biking trails, which are connected to a robust regional trails system. Wildlife watching, fishing, and boating on the nearby Schuylkill River also are popular.
- The approximately 230 acres of park north of Route 422 in the Township have relatively few connections or trails.

# <u>Evansburg State Park (Approximately 1,060 acres within Lower Providence Township)</u>


- Evansburg State Park is a 3,349-acre Pennsylvania state park operated by DCNR and host municipalities include Lower Providence, Lower Salford, Skippack, Towamencin, and Worcester Townships. The park has a variety of habitats including forests, meadows, old fields, and farmland. Recreational opportunities include picnicking, golf, ball fields, biking, hiking, hunting, horseback riding, and fishing.
- Evansburg State Park has 26 miles of trails that are open to hiking, horseback riding, cross-country skiing, and mountain biking. There are minimal trail connections between the trails of host municipalities / regional trails and Evansburg State Park.

# <u>Central Perkiomen Valley Park (Approximately 55 acres in Lower Providence Township)</u>

• Central Perkiomen Valley Park is situated along the Perkiomen Creek. This 800-acre park extends over 10 municipalities, with 55 acres in Lower Providence. The Lower Providence section north of Ridge Pike along River Road is largely undeveloped lowland floodplain area.

#### Gabriel's Field / Knight's Cricket Field (31 acres)

 Gabriel's Field / Knight's Cricket Field is an open multipurpose field area with access to the Pawlings Road trailhead.

#### John James Audubon Center at Mill Grove (175 acres)

- Built in 1762 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Mill Grove was the first American home of renowned artist, author, and naturalist John James Audubon.
- The 175-acre estate serves as an educational center of the National Audubon Society. A haven for birds and wildlife, the property includes more than seven miles of trails.

#### MARA Baseball/Softball Fields (18 acres)

• This County-owned facility is used extensively for local ballgames by the Audubon Recreation Association who, in Fall 2020, merged with the Methacton Baseball Association to become the Methacton Audubon Recreation Association (MARA).

## Community Benchmarking

Community benchmarking was completed to evaluate the park system of Lower Providence Township with similarly sized communities that have populations similar to Lower Providence's projected 2040 population of 28,448 to determine future recreational needs. A comparison analyzed both the amount of recreational space and amenities provided and used National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) Metrics as a guide. Recreational facilities from six municipalities were used to determine the extent of either deficit or surplus of amenities:

- Upper Merion Township, Montgomery County, PA 2019 Population: 33,027
- Lower Makefield Township, Bucks County, PA 2019 Population: 32,802
- Radnor Township, Delaware County, PA 2019 Population: 31.875
- Cranberry Township, Butler County, PA 2019 Population: 31,632
- Tredyffrin Township, Chester County, PA 2019 Population: 29,396
- York Township, York County, PA 2019 Population: 28,776

#### 2020 NRPA Park Metrics

The National Recreation and Park Association compiles park and recreation agency information from across the country. NRPA understands that there is no single set of standards for parks and recreation to address the uniqueness of a community. The organization creates averages for total acres of parkland, total number of parks, facility type totals and average operating expenses to assist planners with addressing parks and recreation needs within a community. According to these metrics, for agencies serving jurisdictions of 20,000 – 49,999 residents:

There are typically 9.6 acres of parkland per 1000 residents (NRPA).

Lower Providence has 202.6 acres of Township-owned parkland. Using this number:

Based on the 2018 population estimate of 26,418 residents, Lower Providence has 7.6 acres of parkland per 1000 residents and would need an additional 51 total acres to meet this metric.

Based on the projected 2040 population of 28,448 residents, Lower Providence would need to add an additional 70.5 total acres to meet this metric.

Combining all Federal, State, County, and Township parkland, there are 2471.4 acres within the boundaries of Lower Providence. Using this number:

Based on the 2018 population estimate of 26,418 residents, Lower Providence exceeds this metric by 2,217.8 acres.

Based on the projected 2040 population, Lower Providence exceeds this metric by 2,198.3 acres.

There is typically one playground for every 3,157 residents (NRPA).

Based on the current population, Lower Providence exceeds this metric by 2-3 playgrounds.

Based on the projected 2040 population, Lower Providence exceeds this metric by 2 playgrounds.

There is typically one community center for every 26,280 residents.

The population threshold generally used as a baseline to consider the development of a community center is 15,000 residents. Lower Providence meets this threshold.

The Township currently has one community center at the Level Road Schoolhouse. At the 2018 population of 26,418, there are 138 more residents per community center than the NRPA metric. Based on the 2020 projection, there will be 399 more residents per community center; and based on the 2040 projection, there will be 2,168 more residents per community center than the NRPA metric. A second community center is recommended.

There is typically one recreation center for every 25,716 residents (NRPA).

There is typically one performance amphitheater for every 30,577 residents.

Based on the 2018 estimate and 2020/2040 projections, Lower Providence meets this metric with the Township's one existing amphitheater.

However, in consideration of current and foreseeable future social distancing measures, it would be wise to consider the addition of at least one outdoor performance space to accommodate an increased demand for outdoor family and community events.

# **Maintenance**

# Township Maintenance and Responsibilities

Lower Providence utilizes the Public Works Department which has three staff dedicated to parks maintenance. The Township performs most park maintenance and the Department organizes the work schedules, in partnership with the Director of Parks and Recreation to accomplish maintenance within the Township. Maintenance efforts include full time, part time, and contracted workers to fulfill maintenance needs.

The maintenance department functions at a high level. Equipment care, vehicle maintenance, record keeping, and community response to needs all function well within the Township. Workers perform many of the tasks required for success. Contracted services assist to provide high level maintenance for all Township property. The maintenance staff performs several maintenance tasks that other communities outsource such as aerating, over seeding, fertilization, tree care, etc. Some typical examples of contracted services include: basin care, large tree removal, concrete work, and other tasks that cannot be performed in-house due to resources, work-hours, equipment needs, or technical skill.

A thorough review of the local parks in Lower Providence was conducted over weekdays and weekends during the summer, fall and spring seasons 2020/21. The review evaluated current conditions, maintenance practices, possible future uses, recreational program opportunities, and a risk analysis of each location. All comments for maintenance and accessibility are derived from information provided by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) Guidelines for playground safety and from the American with Disabilities Act handbooks. The CPSC guidelines are guideline and not laws; however, courts have held that failure to comply with the guidelines usually results in a judgment for the plaintiff. The ADA regulations are law and must be followed.






In every visit, parks and other Township property maintenance has been excellent. Trash, safety surfaces, downed branches, lawn care - all received passing evaluations. Staff takes pride in their efforts to provide safe, usable, and visually pleasing parks. Informative signage, sightlines, field playing conditions, hardcourt surfaces all meet the guidelines and requirements and received passing evaluations.

A review of the tasks performed and the work-hours necessary to complete the assignments reveals additional seasonal employees, dedicated to park maintenance and directly reporting to the Parks and Recreation Director, would increase the work output and provide some direct control over daily maintenance to the Parks and Recreation Director. Adding seasonal employees would increase the maintenance output while not presenting a financial hardship to the Township. Park maintenance operations perform the necessary work to provide safe and clean parks. However, the extra care necessary to meet the needs of the community, as reflected through surveys and interviews would help to upgrade current sports fields and open space areas.

Lower Providence offers continued learning opportunities for staff members. Training seminars, workshops, and conferences afford staff the opportunity to learn, observe, and share knowledge with other professionals and industry leaders; and, in turn, those who attend the training sessions share information learned with other staff members and the public. Seminars provide new information concerning storm water management and other environmental issues. Additionally, workshops offer employees to be well informed on current best management practices facing the community. Opportunities also provided information related to human resource materials, anti harassment efforts, and safe work environment concerns.

Lower Providence encourages and provides the opportunity for staff to attend a variety of professional seminars, workshops, and knowledge-based programs in a continued effort to support the workforce and to provide them with tools necessary to be successful.



## Equipment

The care and maintenance of all equipment is a high priority for the community. The high level of service to equipment extends the life of the equipment and helps keep budgetary concerns lower. The maintenance department and the Parks and Recreation Director routinely inspect playgrounds for dangerous conditions and prepares work orders to alleviate any dangerous issues and other park related work.

## Risk Management

Written policies exist for equipment and Township policies are available and reviewed to assist staff. An in-house safety committee meets regularly to review issues and to discuss new trends for the safety of workers and the community. Proper park signage is installed to make all patrons aware of proper playground use and other park rules and regulations.

## Adequacy of Maintenance

Current maintenance practices are performed at a high level. The concern will be moving forward as new parks and open space facilities or additional facilities within the current park system are brought on-line. All staff are currently utilized to their full ability that maximizes staff efficiency. As new parks are developed or additions are made to current parks, staff will have substantial time constraints to maintain current high levels of maintenance. A review of staffing levels should be undertaken if, and when, new parks and park amenities are developed. The National Park and Recreation Association has level of service standards which outline benchmarks for number of parks, park acreage and staffing levels.

## Recreation Programming Analysis

The Township provides scores of recreational programs for residents and non-residents alike. Passive opportunities for spontaneous recreation pursuits abound within the Township. Limited opportunities for organized recreation programs exist, due to a lack of indoor facilities. The addition of indoor facilities or new and expanded partnerships for indoor facility use offer Lower providence opportunities to provide year round recreational programming. The current staff has the capacity and is capable to provide additional year round programs. With the abilities of the current staff, increasing to year round

programming will not increase staff costs to provide such services. Increased costs will be realized in possible partnership agreements, equipment, instructor payments, all of which are recovered through program registration fees. The residents are being undeserved during the late fall, winter, and early spring seasons when it relates to recreation programs offered by the Township.

Opportunities are plentiful for Lower Providence to provide some simple programs which will serve residents. The programs may take the form of employee instructors, third party providers, and partnerships with private organizations.

The Township regularly interacts with the residents concerning programs wanted, program evaluations, and to glean other information. This is accomplished through program participation, surveys, and social media opportunities. At present, the results from the recently completed survey and remarks provided from public meetings indicate that the residents of the Township do feel recreational programs are important and are desired in the Township. The recent public survey will provide information for the immediate future; however, additional and ongoing information needs to be obtained from the public to address the changing needs of the community.

The Township must evaluate the needs and wants of the community as compared to the budgetary constraints. The Township may wish to review the DCNR model, financing municipal recreation and parks, as a guide for determining program fees and sponsorships.

## Administration Analysis

Administrative Analysis of Providers and Relationships

The Parks and Recreation administrative offices serve as the central contact point for the residents, sport groups, community events, and other community groups of Lower Providence. The Administration accepts facility reservations, provides programming administration, partners with the Public Works Department to provide park work orders, handles the daily activities of the Township, and responds to requests from community members.




While reviewing the current formal partnerships related to recreational opportunities, we found few partnerships. Limited partnerships have shown success; however, few recreational programs are offered by the Township or community groups during the cooler or colder months due to a lack of indoor facilities. The creation of written procedures would outline who is responsible for what and how future programs would be advertised, held, and evaluated. Lower Providence Township has a wonderful partnership with the school district for summer programs and that partnership should be revisited to determine if the Township can gain access during the cooler months of the year to provide additional organized recreational opportunities.

Some cooperative verbal partnerships exist to assist the Township; youth sport organizations, and civic organizations. Partnerships are essential to the success of the Lower Providence Township. Enhanced written partnerships with the school district and other recreational providers will benefit the community and allow the Township to offer several new programs to meet community requests. Additionally, the partnership will outline each parties responsibility and any fees associated with the partnership.

## Marketing Efforts

The current level of public relations and marketing efforts the Township performs to promote services is adequate. The Township utilizes their website, Facebook, flyers, brochures, newsletters, newspapers, posters and signage, and other means to promote the Township recreational facilities and programs. These public relation efforts are placed throughout Township owned facilities, in some local businesses, posted on signs, promoted via social media, and are available at other community outlets.

A goal of this plan and the department is to increase program participation in two ways: encourage participation from those not currently enrolled in programs; and, to increase participation from those already enrolled. This is difficult since the Township provides programming primarily during the warmer weather months. By providing for additional indoor facilities, an increase in both of these goals can be realized. This will also increase the program revenue stream which helps offset the costs of providing a recreation department.





# Policies for Parks and Recreation Operation


The Township does provide program information and policies and procedure for reservations of park amenities to the community, as well as other community events. Policies and available information include pavilion rentals, ballfield reservations, and other park amenities within Lower Providence, as well as all the program offerings, including special events. The procedures and policies that govern the use of those facilities are readily available for residents and outline the procedure for registration, rentals, and other park use. The policies should be reviewed and updated as to the process for reservations and fees for rentals and programs.

Other policies should be reviewed to determine if the fees being charged are appropriate for program participation, field uses, and pavilion reservations. Additionally, some of the policies do not provide for facility use priorities. For instance, perhaps fields are provided to resident youth sports first, then resident teen activities, then resident adults use, followed by non-resident groups (if permitted). These written policies will assist administrative offices in making decisions when multiple requests are made for a particular field and will provide a standard to follow in explaining why a group received a field or not.

## Record Keeping

The current practice of record keeping for park maintenance, when issues are called in from residents, is adequate and is easily tracked. Work orders are prepared and forwarded to the Public Works Director for action. Once completed, the maintenance records and executed work order is retained by the Township. After the completion of the work task, the Township does reply to the person logging the comment to ensure the requested work was performed adequately.

Since not all work tasks are prepared via a work order, daily park maintenance is not recorded in an easily retrievable manner. Improvements can be made to the daily tracking of park maintenance activities. The current practice appears to be informal. The Public Works Director or Parks and Recreation Director keeps the daily activity sheets of work performed, with little technology tracking assistance. The tracking of work performed may improve work scheduling, task assignments, and daily results.



## Financing and Funding

All recreation and park maintenance activities, including payroll, are funded through the Townships General Fund Budget. Revenues which are received are derived from program participation, special event sponsorships, and facility rentals or facility use fees (such as pavilion and field rentals). Other revenue streams can be created with the addition of recreational programs for people of all ages and abilities.

Some recommendations in the report will not generate revenues associated with the various recommendations and each will need to be evaluated to determine if the existing general budget can accommodate the recommendations. Other recommendations may require capital investments to provide for the recommended improvements. And, additional recommendations will general a small revenue stream which may help to offset the recommendation.

Various funding sources are available to fund capital improvement recommendations and are outlined within the report (chapter 4). Recent capital funding for park improvements has been successful and continued support of the capital improvement fund is necessary to maintain the high level of service currently provided. Opportunities to utilize capital improvement funds as leverage for matching grants can provide for 50% to 80% of the capital cost of the improvements to be made using grant funding. However, applicable grants are competitive and the grant must be well prepared in order to achieve funding approval. The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources is one funding source which provides recreation funding for open space, park improvements, and other recreational opportunities. While each capital improvement recommendation will benefit the Township in general, singular improvements are not generally favorably received by DCNR for recreational improvements. DCNR would rather see a holistic approach to recreation when determining which projects to fund. In this case, it may be best to review all recreational opportunities at a location in order to leverage the best possible opportunity for funding. As an example, DCNR is not likely to fund sport field irrigation. The Township may take a position that the irrigation will be part of an overall improvement for a specific park which may include, handicap accessibility, stormwater management issues, a play area, among other improvements. While the improvements will still present a cost to the Township, the Township would be in a position to leverage their capital funds for additional improvements by receiving matching grant funding.

# **Park Facility Recommendations**

# Township-Wide Park Facility Recommendations

Lower Providence Park System

As noted in the previous chapter, Lower Providence has a robust park system that provides many recreational opportunities for its residents. Parks are one of the main settings for residents of Lower Providence to interact with the community. Parks are areas where residents of all ages, ethnicities, economic statuses, and abilities will interact and create community-building experiences that are a tangible reflection of the quality of life within the community. Beyond the many benefits parks provide as open space, they are also noted as important indicators of community livability and they create a sense of pride within the community. This has become more evident during the COVID-19 Pandemic where parks and trails became essential for support of both physical and mental health of the residents as was reflected in the dramatic increase of park and open space use.

## A successful park system:

Will be a catalyst for community revitalization, economic development, promote public health, create community engagement opportunities, and provide green infrastructure,

Will have diverse inventory of assets and sufficient staffing, equipment and, management to maintain safe, functional, and attractive parks, and

Will be well used, which is a sign that parks are attractive, meet user needs, and are safe.

#### Park Furnishings & Materials

Lower Providence Township Parks and Recreation should develop a set of standards for park furnishings. These park furnishing standards then should be used to start replacing existing park furnishings that do not meet these standards. Using standard elements will also facilitate common spare parts and maintenance consistency.

Choices in site materials can have the potential to affect the health of a park's environment and its life cycle. Park material and design standards should include priorities for sustainability. These can include using local sustainable products that are selected for longevity, durability, and ease of maintenance. The standards should also consider consistency in materials, colors, and aesthetics to create a sense of identity or "branding" for the park system.

#### Landscaping

Township parks should provide green infrastructure using native plant materials. Plantings can serve many purposes, including but not limited to shade, absorption of stormwater run-off, habitat, and beauty. The Township has been successful in securing several parcels along riparian zones in Lower Providence which should be planted with a mix of diverse native plant material.

In all Lower Providence park facilities, additional shade trees should be planted for their numerous benefits, including:

- Shade for park users and spectators
- Improving the overall air quality
- · Providing habitats for wildlife
- Increased property values
- Carbon dioxide reduction
- Stormwater runoff reduction

The Township should assist residents with setting up "Friends of" groups (either system-wide of for specific parks) that can provide volunteers that can assist in management of the planted areas of the parks. "Friends of" groups can also assist in other park maintenance needs.

#### ADA Access / Safety requirements


ADA Access to the parks has already been recognized by the Township as a priority improvement to the park system. ADA access includes providing paths to park amenities, bench placement, parking spaces, site furnishings, and inclusive play equipment. Some basic provisions for providing an ADA play area are:


- Providing access to one of each type of ground-level equipment,
- Providing ramps or transfer system to some elevated structures, and
- Surfacing that accommodates people using wheelchairs.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission Guidelines for public parks were established to reduce serious injury to users of play equipment. The guidelines are recommendations that address hazards that can result in playground related injuries and include:

- Potential falls from play equipment,
- Protective surfacing under and around play equipment,
- Scale of equipment related to users age,
- · Playground layout, and
- Installation and maintenance.

It is recommended that the Township perform an annual playground audit using a Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI) to identify potential hazards on playground equipment, provide information for equipment specifications and safety surfaces, and provide risk management methods. The Township should invest in playground surface edging to keep safety surfacing material in the playground fall zones. Other individual park recommendations are provided later in this chapter.














### Redtail Park







## State & Federal Partnerships

Evansburg State Park – Future Recreation Fields

If locations for future active recreation fields are required, Lower Providence Township should consider approaching DCNR and Evansburg State Park for use of fields north of Ridge Pike. This partnership for active recreation fields on DCNR property could follow a lease model like that used for Evansburg Point Park.





#### National Park Service – Valley Forge Water Access

With growing demand for boating water access to the Schuylkill River, usage, and parking downstream from Lower Providence at Betzwood Park has increased dramatically over recent years and more precipitously during the Covid-19 pandemic. Additional water access with parking is needed along the waters of Lower Providence. Lower Providence should advance a collaborative effort with the National Park Service to establish water access at the Pawlings Road Valley Forge National Historic Park River Trail Trailhead.





# Open Space Preservation Recommendations

Parcels were considered for preservation by the following criteria:

- Parcels which provide a vital link to complete a trail connection or serve as a necessary link in a future trail connection for pedestrian and bicycle mobility.
- Parcels which contain rare old growth forests, areas considered to be the most important natural habitats in a region, places of large specimens of valued vegetation. Places where rare and valued animals live and birds roost are also considered vital priorities, especially a high-quality wildlife refuge.
- Parcels which maintain scenic qualities, especially if identified in Township documents including the Comprehensive Plan or Open Spaces Plan as preserving a scenic viewscape.
- Parcels that protect natural features, including water resources, especially floodplain areas, riparian buffers, streams, creeks, and waterways.
- Parcels that preserve significant agricultural land that is threatened by development.
- Parcels that are contiguous to existing private or public open space and are significant for both active and passive recreation.

# Preservation Strategy: Acquisition

Key Bank Parcels (Parcel 1: 15 acres & Parcel 2: 12 acres)

Character: Agriculture

Option A: Preserve Agriculture Fields

Lower Providence Township has minimal preserved agricultural lands, in this option the Township should pursue the acquisition of these parcels to permanently preserve this agriculture area.

If the northern 12-acre parcel is desired for permanent open space Lower Providence should work with Worcester Township In a coordinated effort to acquire this open space. A coordinated multi-municipal effort may be more attractive to funding agencies when pursuing grant funding.

Option B: Develop for active recreation facilities.

These parcels can be used to accommodate future Township recreational facility needs and expand upon and connect to existing Eskie Park facilities.

In either option A or B, a .65-mile loop trail should be considered around the perimeter of these parcels. This concept is discussed in the multi-modal trail recommendations section.



Cicchiello Parcel (37 Acres)

Character: Agriculture

As one of only a handful agricultural parcels remaining in Lower Providence, the Township should consider acquisition or work with local conservation organizations such as Natural Lands to permanently preserve the Cicchiello parcel for agriculture.





Heyser Parcel (36 acres) & BooBoo Realty Parcel (10 acres)

#### Character: Wooded

Both parcels are north of Eagleville Park and are densely forested. If acquired, these parcels should become part of Eagleville Park and remain wooded. They contain a tributary to the Skippack Creek – acquisition of these parcels could ensure long term stormwater management for this hydrologic resource.

Conceptual park elements within these parcels could include:

- Low-impact earth hiking trails (3-5' width)
- Educational interpretation signage
- Forested / stormwater best management practices (BMPs)

## Philadelphia Protectory For Boys / St. Gabriel's (Parcel 9.61 acres)

Lower Providence Township should work with the Archdiocese of Philadelphia and consider acquisition / suggest Montgomery County to acquire the St. Gabriel's 9.61-acre parcel north of Pawlings Road.

Montgomery County could merge this 9.61-acre parcel with Mill Grove lands which could add value to existing County facilities. This parcel could potentially include areas for: recreational programming & sports courts, community gardens, watershed native plant production or small-scale farming.

## Philadelphia Protectory For Boys / St. Gabriel's (Parcel: 46.69 acres)

Lower Providence Township should work with the Archdiocese and consider partial acquisition of, or easement on the former St. Gabriel's property (south of Pawlings Road). The Valley Forge Connector Trail detailed later in this chapter has a conceptual alignment which runs north of Route 422 along this property.



While it is not financially feasible or prudent for Lower Providence Township to pursue acquisition for all of the parcels noted for preservation – each parcel noted is worthy of long-term conservation. The parcels below should be maintained / improved as open space, and the Township may consider acquisition, work with local conservation organizations, or future owners to ensure long term open space preservation.

## Preservation Strategy: Official Map

What is an official map?

As permitted by the PA Municipal Planning Code, the Official Map is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals and community vision set forth in the Comprehensive Plan.

The Official Map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space.

The Official Map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes at some future time. The Official Map process does not mandate any action by the Township. However, if a

parcel designated as future open space is planned for development or subdivision of a land development or subdivision application, it gives the Township an opportunity to discuss preserving at least part of the parcel as open space, in addition to whatever provisions may exist in the zoning ordinance for open space preservation or providing residents with public trails.

An official map may include but need not be limited to:

- Existing and proposed public streets, watercourses, and public grounds, including widenings, narrowings, extensions, reductions, openings or closing of same.
- Existing and proposed public parks, playgrounds, and open space reservations.
- Existing and proposed pedestrian ways (trails) and easements.
- Flood control areas, floodways and floodplains, stormwater management areas and drainage easements.

#### Benefits of an official map

Adoption of an official map was a recommendation in the 2005 Lower Providence Open Space Plan and this plan builds on that recommendation. Benefits of an official map are:


- Helps to focus limited financial resources on projects that meet and advance community goals.
- Helps to make improvements such as the street network improvements, intersection improvements, protecting natural areas, providing more green space, recreation facilities, trails, and sidewalks.
- Saves time and money by informing property owners and developers of municipal goals and intentions in advance of land development plans.
- Effective negotiation tool for municipalities, helping to ensure development is compatible with and supportive of public goals.
- Gives municipalities advantage in securing grants.

Lower Providence should place select parcels on the official map as 'open space' to ensure they remain open space in the future. Such actions can also be the first step towards Township acquisition.

#### Greenways

The primary purpose to designate a "Greenway" is to:

- Foster the preservation and protection of critical habitats;
   and
- Protect and enhance the water quality.

Greenways may or may not contain a trail or allow access through them.

Additional Greenways should be considered along hydrologic resources and extend from existing Township-owned parcels.

In Lower Providence Township greenways are protected under ARTICLE XXXIV (Riparian Buffer Overlay Zone – Zones 1 & 2) This ordinance regulates land use to ensure natural resources are preserved and protected. The extent of the riparian buffer is described below:

(1) Zone One. This zone will begin at each edge of a stream channel/waterline/wetland edge (whichever is applicable) and occupy a minimum width of 30 feet measured horizontally on a line perpendicular to the top of the bank/edge of waterline or wetland.

Where the land within 30 feet of the defined edge of a stream channel has an upland slope greater than 10%, Zone One shall include the land from the stream channel edge and the upland slope and shall further extend outward 30 feet from the edge or top of such upland slope; and

(2) Zone Two. This zone will begin at the outer edge of Zone One and occupy a minimum width of 60 feet in addition to Zone One, unless modified herein. Where the one-hundred-year floodplain extends greater than 90 feet from the waterway, Zone One shall remain a minimum of 30 feet, and Zone Two shall extend from the outer edge of Zone One to the outer edge of the one-hundred-year floodplain.

Lower Providence Township has done well to acquire parcels along important riparian and greenway corridors. Gaps in existing greenways should be filled starting from existing Townshipowned parcels.

The following parcels can become part of the Lower Providence greenway network through acquisition, protection through placement on the official map and conservation easements:

- Gorski Property (12 acres)
- Kunda Property (30 acres)
- Parris Property (7 acres)
- McKay Property (12 acres)
- Camp Hideaway Property (67 acres)
- Webster Property (7 acres)

Successful greenway expansion & improved water quality will require action by local government and private citizens. The Township has done a great job of acquiring key greenway parcels, and will need the help of private citizens, as the Township is largely built-out.

Article XXXIV (Riparian Buffer Overlay Zone) of the Zoning Ordinance includes provisions for the restoration and revegetation of riparian buffers. The Township should institute a program to revegetate any greenway cover gaps in order to provide for continuous ribbons of land that protect natural habitats and enhance the water quality of the Townships creeks, streams and tributaries. Any program should follow the established regulations in Article XXXIV that call for the installation of three layers of vegetation consisting of native material when replanting the riparian buffer: a ground cover, understory shrubs and trees that form an overhead canopy.

In addition, the Township can work with existing private landowners to institute retroactive improvements to greenways on their land. Article XXXIV outlines the improvements that can be installed in the different zones of the riparian buffer subject to specific requirements. In both zones, they include unpaved hiking, biking or bridle trails, fishing areas, and natural resource preserves. Additional improvements are permitted in Zone Two by conditional use when authorized by the Board of Supervisors and include paved trails, sports and ball fields and courts, parklands, camps, picnic areas, golf courses and playgrounds. The Township can set a vision for greenways improvements, such as recognizing these spaces on an official map, and partner with landowners to implement these improvements. Such an arrangement can benefit both sides as landowners can be encouraged to build trails and other improvements through measures like tax incentives, and new recreational amenities that benefit Township residents can be introduced before any land development applications that may trigger the requirement of such improvements are filed. Installation of improvements that also preserve natural resources and protect water quality may also help to address the Township's MS4 requirements.

#### Stormwater Management

Projects with over 1 acre of disturbance require a Pennsylvania Chapter 102 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. These projects are required to implement BMPs. It is also recommended that BMPs be implemented for any project that requires them in accordance with the Township's stormwater ordinance. However, the standards for the MS4 program exceed those for the NPDES permit by at least 10%. Therefore it is recommended to plan ahead by over designing new projects to meet MS4 requirements and not just NPDES requirements. An example of this would be the Eskie Park proposed parking lot. By exceeding the NPDES permit requirements, the Township will avoid adding to their MS4 stream loading.

Tree plantings only provide a small amount of credit for pollution reduction. However, it should be done as much as possible and the Township should take credit for it wherever they can. It's simple to keep track of. Lineal BMPs such as bio-swales, infiltration trenches and even lineal rain gardens should be considered along trails. It is important to coordinate with Township engineer, Woodrow and Associates, so that they are located within the Township sewersheds. Maintaining records of when BMPs are installed and records of routine maintenance is crucial to the Township's MS4 program. Keeping track of maintenance of BMPs not only provides records for authorities such as PA Department of Environmental Protection (PennDEP) and the EPA but also extends the life of the BMP through regularly scheduled maintenance.

Lower Providence Township participates in the Skippack Creek Watershed Alliance, a group of municipalities that has committed to work together to address the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) set by PennDEP for the Skippack Creek. By implementing BMPs, the Alliance will collectively meet its requirements to reduce sediments and nutrients within the watershed. It is recommended that the Township continue to pursue BMPs as noted above within the Skippack Creek and coordinate those efforts with the Alliance.

#### Additional Recommendations

School District Agreement.

The Township should negotiate an agreement with the Methacton School District to secure permanent public access to the District's indoor and outdoor facilities. While reasonable restrictions on access are to be expected, such an agreement could address the need for indoor recreation facilities. School District properties contain valuable outdoor recreation facilities for organized sports and youth programs at numerous locations throughout the Township. These facilities should not be disposed of.

#### Indoor Recreation Facility.

The public opinion survey delineated a desire and need for indoor recreation opportunities. Currently in the Township, the only municipal indoor facility is the small Level Road Schoolhouse.

Lower Providence Township should conduct a feasibility study to determine if an indoor recreation facility is warranted or if the school buildings (such as a lease agreement with MSD at the closed Audubon Elementary) will fulfill the need adequately.

# Recreation and Program Recommendations

Recommendations and comments below were formulated through discussions at public meetings, discussions with staff, survey results, and other communications. All comments were evaluated and researched to determine what may be possible for Lower Providence when considering budget constraints, staffing levels, resident expectations, and future opportunities.

Currently, Lower Providence offers scores of recreational programs for people of all ages and abilities. Programs are well received by the community. Most programs are offered during the late spring, summer, and early fall. The opportunity to augment programming is available for the fall, winter, and early spring seasons. Adding programs during these seasons will require indoor facilities to house the program.

Adding year round indoor programming can be accomplished through a variety of options. Firstly, through a capital improvement the Township can construct an indoor facility to permit indoor programming. This option will require a large capital investment and ongoing maintenance and staff investments for the Township. If this option is considered, it

is recommended that the Township perform a feasibility study to determine if an indoor facility is a viable option. Secondly, expanded agreements with the school district to permit year round access into the school buildings should be evaluated. This option is a no cost, or low cost option that provides the Township indoor facilities to offer year round programs. And, thirdly, year round programming could be offered through public / private partnerships with various facilities within Lower Providence Township. Pending the agreement, this is a low cost option as well. This option requires programs to be offered at private facilities. Options two and three provide for indoor space at no or low costs to the Township.

Year round or seasonal organized recreation programs instructors may include in-house instructors (current staff), seasonal Township employees, hired contracted instructors, or third-party recreation agencies. Current programs include summer camps, short term (4-8 week) educational offerings, health and wellness opportunities, sport camps, special events, to name a few. Expanding current programs, and offering new programs into the cooler months, provides additional revenues for the Township. Current staff is able to offer these additional programs; therefore, no additional full-time staff is required. Additionally, year round programming and one-day special





events, if offered, help promote a sense of community. Special events may include pop-up events such as farmers markets, community flea markets, brew pub events, holiday events, to name a few.

Additional programs will increase the budgetary expense; however, all programs should provide a positive revenue for the Township. All program expenses are recovered through registration fees and provide for a modest net profit. It should be noted, new programs offered may require a season or two before the program is established. Programs are often provided at a net loss for the first offering in order to allow the program to gain momentum. The Parks and Recreation Department has qualified staff to make determinations as to which programs should continue and which should be discontinued.

Successful departments have firm policies and procedure in place to assist the department. Such documentation provides support to the department, or director, and are necessary for decision making. Necessary policies include registration and refund policies, fees scheduling, rental procedures and policies, hiring practices, and others. These policies and procedures provide

detailed documentation for the director, the administration, participants, and community groups. Lower Providence Parks and Recreation has such policies and documents, all of which are well publicized. It is recommended that the Township charge the Parks and Recreation Board to review all current policies, fees structures for programs and rentals, and sponsorship fees to determine if the charges and fees are appropriate for Lower Providence as compared to neighboring communities. For example, resident versus non-resident program rate. It is not uncommon for a community to charge 30-50% more for non-residents to participate in a program offered.

Develop a mechanism to recruit and retain program instructors and third-party recreation providers. Instructors and third-party providers will play a large role in the success of the Department to offer year-round or seasonal programs. New Child Protective Services laws exist, adherence to these laws is mandatory. Develop a procedure to identify which instructors or third-party providers need clearances, and most importantly, develop a system to ensure all clearances are provided as outlined in the law.

Enlist the Parks and Recreation Board to review all current policies used for field reservations, pavilion rentals, and other current policies. The review should address facility rental procedures, fees structures, rules and policy, maintenance issues or concerns, and who is eligible to use the facility. The Board should also develop a fee structure philosophy regarding program costs. For example, a resident rate verses a non-resident rate for programs and facility rentals. A typical fee philosophy may be non-residents are charged 30% more than residents. However, the philosophy must provide an opportunity for programs offered to run. If non-residents are charged additional fees the y may not register for a particular program, hence the program may be cancelled. A well-defined set of policies provides the Director with the tools necessary to provide information to the community with the support of the Parks and Recreation Board and the Board of Supervisors.

## Recreation and Program Recommendations

- Increase programs offered by expanding current programs and providing an indoor facility for year round programming through new construction or partnerships.
- Develop or enhance written agreements with the school district or private facilities to permit sustainable indoor use for programs.
- Develop a mechanism to recruit instructors to teach a variety of year round classes, camps, or other programs.
   This includes contracted service providers and third-party organization providers.
- Provide a policy for background checks for all participant recreation providers who offer recreational programs in the Township.
- Develop a policy for attracting recreational providers, advertising recreational programs, and program evaluation

#### Maintenance Recommendations

Maintenance personnel should be augmented to include two to three dedicated seasonal parks maintenance workers to assist the Public Works Department's three full time staff dedicated to park maintenance. Dedicated workers (mid-March – October) will provide additional staff-hours required to perform the many tasks associated with park work. In 2021, the Township will be performing all grass cutting in-house and not outsourcing that service. Grass cutting requires additional staff hours. One seasonal Maintenance worker, working 40 hours per week for 25 week equals 1,000 hours. This cost could exceed \$13,000 per worker per seasonal maintenance worker; however, the cost is offset by increased in-house work performed, better maintenance practices, an enhance experienced for park patrons, and increased safety of the park facility. All of which enhance risk management measures.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) guidelines for park and playgrounds should be reviewed during daily maintenance to ensure no risk management issues. A Certified Parks Safety Inspector, through the Delaware Valley Insurance Trust, does perform an annual audit to reduce risk exposure for the Township. That playground report is used to make modifications to maintenance practices or to remove or replace play equipment pieces or structures that no longer conform to CPSC guidelines.

The American with Disabilities Act (ADA) outlines laws that govern access for all persons. Adherence to these laws is required and should be reviewed at each park location to ensure the laws are being met. This may include small items such as a bench location in proximity to a walking path or access to play equipment. Additionally, ADA requires a certain percentage of play equipment be available for persons with disabilities.

Best Management Practices should be incorporated to a greater level. While much of the maintenance work is more than adequate, there are areas for improvement. Continue to offer maintenance staff the opportunity to attend best management practices seminars and environmental workshops. Additional worthwhile workshops include playground certification and ballfield maintenance seminars. These seminars and workshops are minimal in cost and provide a wealth of knowledge on the investment.

 Consider adding two seasonal maintenance workers dedicated to park maintenance (the Township is scheduled up to three seasonal maintenance workers in 2021).

- Develop a program and / or brochure that provides information concerning best management practices for environmental concerns, land stewardship, and sustainability that is distributed to residents.
- Supplement seminar and workshop training for all maintenance staff.

# Administrative / Operational Recommendations

The Lower Providence administrative offices serve as the central contact point for residents, businesses, and community groups of Lower Providence. Administration services are well received by the community and function at a high-level providing services, responsiveness, and communication with the residents.


- Charge the Parks and Recreation Board to develop or review current policies for facility uses which can be enacted by the Board of Supervisors.
- Charge the Parks and Recreation Board to develop a policy for program resident and non-resident fees, which can be enacted by the Board of Supervisors. Several models of various fees structures exist through the PA Recreation and Park Society or the National Recreation and Park Association. Policies will assist the administration when determining fees for future programs and will also provide written documentation should questions arise.
- Continue to utilize the Parks and Recreation Board to provide outreach and as serve as the eyes and ears for the Township and recreational needs.



## **Multimodal Recommendations**

#### Design Guidelines

Various national and locally recognized organizations have developed bicycle and pedestrian design standards. The following guides were referenced extensively throughout the design process.



AASHTO - Guide for the Development of Bicycle Facilities

AASHTO provides federally accepted standards for the development of bicycle facilities including information on: Bicycle Planning, Bicycle Operation and Safety, Design of On-Road Facilities, Design of Shared Use Paths, Bicycle Parking Facilities, and Maintenance and Operations. All improvements should adhere to these standards.



MUTCD - Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices

The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices provides standards for the design and implementation of traffic control devices that provide for safe and efficient transportation. Part 9 of the manual includes traffic control for bicycle facilities. The section includes signs, pavement markings and highway traffic signals for both on-road and off-road trail facilities. All guidance in this document should be adhered to when implementing the alignment alternatives.

#### NACTO - Urban Bikeway Design Guide

The NACTO Urban Bikeway Design Guide provides cities with state-of-the-practice solutions that can help create complete streets that are safe and enjoyable for bicyclists. Bike Lanes, intersection treatments, bicycle signals, bikeway signage & marking, and the practice of designing for all ages & abilities are all covered within this guide.



#### NACTO - Urban Street Design Guide

The NACTO Urban Street Design Guide provides innovative solutions to design for and around the special characteristics of the urban environment. Street Design Elements, Interim Design Strategies, Intersections Improvements & Design Elements and Design Controls are all discussed in detail



#### FHWA - Small Town and Rural Multimodal Networks

The FHWA - Small town and Rural Multimodal Networks provides design guidance for pedestrian and bicycle safety in areas of smaller scale. This document focuses on establishing safe multi-modal connections within and automobile-dominated landscape. Illustrations, technical diagrams, and photographs detail proposed improvements to roadways, sidewalks, intersections, and more.





Bike Lanes

#### **Connectivity Improvements**

#### Bicycle Lanes

Bicyclists operate within a designated portion of the roadway that is separate from motor vehicle traffic:

Bike lanes should be provided on both sides of two-way streets.

<u>Bike Lane Widths without Parking:</u> 4' minimum (not adjacent to curb) and 5' minimum (adjacent to curb or another obstacle)

Bike Lane Widths with Parallel Parking: 5' minimum to 7' (wider bike lanes are recommended adjacent to parking areas to reduce conflict with opening vehicle doors) Bike lanes should be placed between the parking lane and travel lane (this applies to diagonal and parallel parking)

<u>Storm Drains and Utility Covers:</u> Bike lanes should be wide enough to accommodate bicyclists swerving to avoid obstructions.

<u>Bike Lane Striping:</u> 4" to 6" solid white line (dotted lines are optional at major driveways and intersections, solid lines should be continued at all minor driveways)

Pavement Marking: Bike Lane Symbols (MUTCD 9C - 3)

<u>Bike Lane Signage:</u> Bike Lane (R3-17) placed at periodic intervals with either Ahead (R3-17aP) or Ends (R3-17bP) where appropriate.



Shared Use Paths

#### Shared Use Paths

Shared use paths are bikeways that are physically separated from the vehicular cartway by a physical barrier or open space. Shared use paths also include side paths. Design of these facilities should comply with current ADA requirements. Path users include:

- Bicyclists of all types
- Inline & roller skaters, and skateboarders
- Kick scooter users
- Pedestrians

#### Design Requirements

<u>Trail width:</u> 10' minimum to 14' (8' is permitted under rare circumstances) Trail Shoulder width: 2' minimum shoulder free of vertical obstructions (fence, sign, wall, etc.), 3' to 5' is preferred.

<u>Trail Shoulder slope:</u> 1 vertical to 6 horizontal (1:6) maximum

Adjacent to a body of water or slope: 1 vertical to 3 horizontal (1:3) or greater vertical distance between the trail and nuisance should be minimum 5' (physical barrier or rail is recommended and may be placed at a minimum 1' from the edge of trail)

Vertical Clearance: 8' minimum, 10' preferred.

<u>Separation between Trail and roadway:</u> 5' minimum from edge of pavement (if less than 5' a physical barrier is needed)

<u>Trail cross slope:</u> Not to exceed 2%, 1% is recommended.

<u>Trail grade slope:</u> Maximum grade should be 5% or match that of the adjacent roadway. For an off-road trail grade may go up to 8% for not more than 200 lineal feet.

### Connectivity Improvements

**Signage** - Signage can be provided along the road with no cartway (pavement) improvements. Signage informs motorists to watch out for bicyclists on the roadway.

MUTCD standards: Share the Road (W11- and W16-1P) signs and Bicyclist May Use Full Lane (R4-11) signs; Place signs at the beginning of the bike route, roadway intersections, and throughout the segment where deemed required, and at the end of the bike route.









**Marked Shared Lanes** - Bicyclists operate on the roadways with motor vehicles (Not to be used on roads with posted speed limits in excess of 25 mph):

<u>Shared-Lane Striping:</u> (MUTCD 9C - 9) placed at intersections and at intervals not greater than 250'

<u>Striping position on cartway with Parallel Parking:</u> Place center of sharrow 11' from face of curb or edge of travel way

<u>Striping position on cartway with no Parking:</u> 4' from face of curb or edge of travel way

Signage (noted previously) is still required

**Paved Shoulders** - Bicyclists operate on the shoulders of roadways, typically on rural roadways:

Paved Shoulders should be located on both sides of the road

<u>Shoulder width with no vertical obstruction:</u> 4' shoulder width minimum

Shoulder width with vertical obstruction (curb, guide rail, etc.): 5' shoulder width minimum



### **Asphalt Surfaces**


Asphalt surfaces provide for the widest variety of trail users including bicyclist, walkers, joggers, wheelchair users, and in-line skaters. Initial installation costs are relatively high (lower than Portland cement concrete however) compared to other trail surface types. However, long term maintenance costs will remain lower than others if properly installed and maintained. Asphalt trails are preferred in flood prone areas. Porous asphalt can also be used in situations where stormwater infiltration or a pervious surface is required. Porous asphalt should not be used in flood prone areas where silt will clog the voids in the pavement.



#### Concrete Surfaces


Portland cement concrete pavement is the most durable material for trail surfaces but is the costliest. Concrete trails are commonly used in urban environments. Advantages of concrete include longer service life, reduced susceptibility to cracking and deformation from roots and weeds, and a more consistent riding surface after years of use and exposure to the elements. The joints in concrete trail treads can degrade the experience of using the path for some wheeled users. In addition, users can see pavement markings more easily on asphalt than on concrete, particularly at night. Concrete's light color on a trail reflects the sunlight.

### Compacted Aggregate Surfaces

Compacted aggregate surfaces, or stone dust trails, can accommodate all trail user types except for in-line skaters. Initial installation costs for this trail surface are relatively low, however long-term maintenance costs increase due to this surface's higher susceptibility to erosion, especially if not properly installed with swales and cross drains. Crushed limestone or sandstone or "Trail Surface Aggregate (TSA) Mix" are typical aggregates used in this situation. A compacted aggregate surface can also serve as base material for an asphalt surface if trail use increases or funds become available for a surfacing upgrade. Compacted aggregate surfaces should be avoided in flood prone areas or on slopes over 3%.



#### **Pavers**

Pavers, composed of clay or concrete, may be a suitable pavement material where the context, such as in Bloomsburg, is of a historic nature. As evidenced by the many brick sidewalks in the town. This material is highly aesthetically pleasing and durable. However, this material is the most expensive type of trail or sidewalk surface and is typically used only in areas of high visibility or in areas of historic significance.






### Proposed Improvements Plan

The proposed improvements plan on the opposite page note's approximate locations of pedestrian and bicycle improvements in Lower Providence Township. Based upon site analysis, field reconnaissance, and information gathered at committee meetings, several guiding principles were established.

- Connect to parks and open space of Lower Providence and the surrounding area.
- Connect to local and regional trails via on-road infrastructure and multi-use trails.
- Establish safe connections across barriers such as high-volume roadways.
- Connect to the amenities and services of Lower Providence as well as adjacent municipalities.
- Establish cross-Township connections (north/south & east/west) on low-stress or low-traffic volume routes.






## **Sidewalk Gaps**

Sidewalks are basic transportation infrastructure in any village or town. Sidewalks allow pedestrians to safely move between destinations, from home to work, to places of worship and to parks, to trails and civic spaces. Sidewalks are clustered in residential developments and are lacking connectivity to local destinations within Lower Providence Township.

While not financially feasible to propose sidewalks in all gaps, this plan takes a critical look at filling priority sidewalk gaps. Priority sidewalk gaps were determined by the following criteria:

- Can the sidewalk gap provide:
- Connection to existing sidewalk infrastructure
- Connection to MSD school facility
- Connection to Township park and recreation facilities
- Connection to local commercial and civic destinations





## **Proposed Sidewalks**

Sidewalks are proposed along routes that will serve the largest number of Township residents and improve accessibility to Town destinations such as parks, trails, open space, and commercial areas. Approximate locations of new sidewalks are based on site reconnaissance, a Township sidewalk inventory completed by DVRPC, and input from Township staff and the steering committee.


The backbone of the sidewalk recommendations plan contains 59,000 linear feet (LF) of sidewalks in priority gap locations.




## **Multi-Use Trails**

Multi-Use Trails are generally a minimum of 10 feet in width and may be designed at widths of up to 14 feet for high-volume trails. In rare instances where space is limited, trails may be installed at an 8-foot width. Such trails can be paved with asphalt or stone dust / stone screenings. Users include cyclists, roller-bladers, skateboarders, runners, joggers, and pedestrians. Motorized wheelchairs for handicapped users are also permitted.

Where possible, trails have been proposed to connect to existing trails in order to close any trail gaps and create a uniform local multi-modal network.

Multi-use trails provide a convenient means for different user types to enjoy a common amenity and shared infrastructure. The width of these trails allows walkers, joggers, cyclists and other users the ability to recreate safely from one another. Multi-use trails also allow these different user groups a chance to interact with each and foster a sense of community in a space they share and may want to help maintain. Multi-use trails also require less resources and expenses than single use trails as they require fewer signs and less staff to maintain.






# Cranberry Park / Central Perkiomen Park Trail


Cranberry Park and the Central Perkiomen Park are both located within the 100-year floodplain in lowland areas at times inundated by floodwaters if the Perkiomen Creek.

Due to this context, it is recommended that the proposed 1.30-mile trail at this location be an earthen and mown trail to drastically reduce maintenance that would result from flooding damage.

A trail in this location can provide views of and access to the unique lowland habitats along the Perkiomen Creek. This trail can also connect to the new multi-use trail south of Ridge Pike which runs along Perkiomen Creek and connects to Providence Place Senior Living.








## Eskie Park Loop Trail Extension

Eskie Park is a well-used community park which includes a loop trail, ballfield, basketball court, and playground area. As described in previous sections, the Township should consider whether to acquire the agricultural parcel(s) north of Eskie Park currently owned by KeyBank.

If the 15-acre parcel north of Eskie Park is acquired, regardless of its future use (Option A: Agriculture, Option B: Develop for Active Recreation) a 0.65-miles asphalt loop trail should be implemented around the perimeter of the parcel. This would connect to the existing Eskie Park trail loop to create a trail with a new total distance of 1.15 miles.







### **Evansburg State Park Connector**

As previously noted in the description and facility inventory of Evansburg State Park, while this facility contains interior trails, there are limited multi-modal connections between the park's host municipalities and these interior trails.

As proposed within previously planning studies such as Bike Montco (2018), this plan recommends a multi-use trail that extends from the terminus of the Skippack Creek at Hoy Park (and subsequent pedestrian bridge crossing of the Perkiomen), northeast through Evansburg State Park. Such a trail could also provide needed multimodal access between the Perkiomen Trail and Evansburg State Park.


For this plan, a 0.66-mile multi-use trail is proposed from the southwest corner of Evansburg State Park to Hoy Park. A port of this proposed trail area is already owned by Lower Providence Township. As part of the Township's commitment to the Skippack Creek Watershed Alliance, any future trail improvements should also be combined with stormwater BMP areas. This combination of trail uses could allow the Township to pursue additional grant opportunities.

### Perkiomen Pedestrian Bridge

The conceptual Perkiomen pedestrian bridge could provide a pedestrian and bicycle connection between Lower Providence Township, Evansburg State Park and the Perkiomen Trail. As previously noted, there are few access points for Township residents to reach the Perkiomen Trail on foot or safely by bike.

The Township should consider a stand-alone feasibility study for this bridge alternative. The Township should pursue this bridge concept OR the Yerkes Road pedestrian bridge.








## Yerkes Road Pedestrian Bridge

Conceptually located at the terminus of Yerkes Road, this pedestrian bridge would be located in the location of the previous Yerkes Road bridge. This pedestrian bridge could provide multi-modal access to the Perkiomen Trail for Township residents.

The Township should consider a stand-alone feasibility study for this bridge alternative. The Township should pursue this bridge concept OR the Perkiomen pedestrian bridge noted above.

## Valley Forge National Park Connector

This 2.7 mile conceptual trail establishes a pedestrian and bicycle trail that would connect the Audubon Loop Trail on Pawlings Road to the underutilized area of Valley Forge National Historical Park north of Route 422 and the MARA Baseball/ Softball Fields along Pawlings and Audubon Roads. It would also merge with the Park Pointe Sidepath (described below) which connects to residential neighborhoods off Rittenhouse Road, the Club at Shannondell and the businesses off Rittenhouse Road and Egypt Road.

This trail depends on accessing the western portion of the St. Gabriel's Hall site either through acquisition or easement. This involves only the portion of the site which would contain the conceptual trail from the Audubon Loop Trail to Valley Forge and would not affect the building or the rest of the campus. The conceptual trail would also depend on a multi-level partnership between the Township, federal government (Valley Forge) and Montgomery County (MARA fields).

In addition to providing access to the Schuylkill River Trail and Perkiomen Trail, the development of this trail would allow users to enjoy the vistas and views from the hills of the St. Gabriel's site and Valley Forge.







## Park Pointe Sidepath

A sidepath is a bidirectional shared use path located immediately adjacent and parallel to a roadway. Sidepaths can offer a high-quality experience for users of all ages and abilities as compared to on-roadway facilities in heavy traffic environments, allow for reduced roadway crossing distances, and maintain rural and small-town community character.

Sidepaths are typically 5'-8' in width and constructed with asphalt. A side path can encourage bicycling and walking in areas where high-volume traffic and/or high-speed traffic might otherwise discourage such activity.

A 1.40-mile sidepath is proposed along Rittenhouse Road and would connect to the proposed Valley Forge connector to the southwest. This sidepath could provide multi-modal access to the corporate and business centers along Rittenhouse Road. Additionally, this path would run along the currently undeveloped parcel at the intersection of Rittenhouse and Egypt Roads.







# **On-Road Bicycle Infrastructure**

Under existing conditions there is minimal safe bicycle infrastructure in the center of Lower Providence Township. While the municipality is bordered by two of the regions most robust trails (Perkiomen Trail & Schuylkill River Trail) – there are limited options for residents to bike to these transportation networks.

In the public opinion survey, when asked "From a traffic safety perspective, how comfortable do you feel biking or walking in Lower Providence Township?" – 96 % of respondents answered they feel Very Uncomfortable biking in the Township.

On-road bicycle routes can be substantially less expensive than dedicated off-road trails, and can provide Township residents the opportunity to reach local parks, trails, businesses and Township destinations by bike.

In 2018 the Montgomery County Planning Commission completed "Bike Montco, The Bicycle Plan for Montgomery County". This plan identified the following important cycling goals for the County:

- Goal #1: Connect communities with a robust network that supports bicycling as a daily transportation option.
- Goal #2: Expand bicycling opportunities for everyone.
- Goal #3: Ensure that bicycling is safe for all.
- Goal #4: Support education and enforcement efforts that increase awareness of bicycling.

- Goal #5: Promote bicycling as a healthy and environmentally sustainable way to travel.
- Goal #6: Create and nurture a county bicycling industry.


This plan delineated several key on-road bicycle routes which were organized by the following hierarchy:

- Local Rural Scenic
- Local Urban Route
- Collector Urban
- Minor Arterial
- Principal Arterial

This 2020 plan recommends the Township pursue and advance these priority on-road bicycle connections delineated in this 2018 'Bike Montco' plan. Further study will be required to determine which type of on-road infrastructure is physically and financially feasible for each location:

- Sharrows (Share the road markings)
- Bike Lanes (no buffer)
- Bike Lanes (with protected 2' buffer)

### Water Trails

he Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) has created a 'water trails' classification for waterbodies which serve as recreational corridors across the Commonwealth. Water trails provide safe access to Pennsylvania's waterways and connections to:


- Local history
- Ecology
- Geology
- Heritage
- Wildlife

Water trails offer additional benefits to local communities like Lower Providence. These trails:

- Encourage tourism and providing economic benefits
- Increase easy access to waterways
- Encourage restoration and conservation

The Schuylkill River Water Trail which runs along the western border of Lower Providence Township is a Pennsylvania DCNR water trail and is also designated as National Recreation Trail. Through this designation, locally or regionally significant trails are part of America's national system of trails and are a testament to the high quality of water recreation opportunities in Pennsylvania.

The Perkiomen Creek Water Trail is 18 miles in length green from Green Lane Park to its confluence at the Schuylkill River. Although shallower than the Schuylkill River Water Trail, the Perkiomen Creek Water Trail provides year-round activities with an existing landing at Hoy Park located at the confluence of Skippack Creek.











# **IMPLEMENTATION**

# Recommended Implementation Schedule

Implementation of all plan recommendations will require at least a decade or more. Plan recommendations are categorized by timeline priorities of immediate (1-3 years), mid-term (1-5 years), and long-term (6+ years) with relative estimated costs, potential partners, and funding sources. Costs to implement recommendations are divided into three categories:

- Low = less than \$100K,
- Medium = less than \$500K, and
- High = greater than \$500K.

This plan will need to be revisited and updated periodically, at least every decade, to address new recreational trends and other changes that may occur within the Township.

### Multimodal Bridge Crossing

As noted in chapter three, there are two Perkiomen Creek crossings identified in this report.

- Yerkes Road Pedestrian Bridge
- Perkiomen Pedestrian Bridge from Evansburg State Park Connector (at Hoy Park)

The Township, in coordination with other partners such as Montgomery County, and Upper Providence Township, Lower Providence should conduct standalone feasibility studies to pursue one of the above bridge alternatives

Due to the size and span of each conceptual crossing and numerous engineering variables, a feasibility study is required for cost estimates of these alternatives.

## Bicycle Infrastructure Alternative: Sharrows

For each of the priority bicycle routes identified on the next page, additional study is required to determine the best infrastructure for each route. This cost estimate includes assumed costs for bike lanes (\$10 per linear foot, 5' minimum width on road separated from traffic with or without a buffer). The reality is that not all roads can accommodate bicycle lanes, and in some instances sharrows will be used. The alternative costs for sharrows can be substituted where appropriate and are not included in the total estimated project costs above.

# Maintenance and Programming Costs

The recommendations provided below outline what may be necessary to provide recreation programming, maintenance practices, maintenance equipment needs, and administrative functions for Lower Providence over a five-year period.

Recreational programming was identified through survey results, key person interviews, staff discussions, and focus group interviews and reflect the desire for organized recreational opportunities year round for Lower Providence. In reviewing the opportunity for programming, the current Administrative staff performs their job functions at a high level and have the capabilities to add programming options for year round services. No additional full-time staff would be required to meet this need. However, indoor facilities are required to provide year round programs. Such facilities are not currently available to the Parks and Recreation Department. Partnerships for such additions will provide increased opportunities for year round programs. Partners may include the school district, firehouses, churches, or public / private partnerships.

Maintenance services are well provided for all parks and park visitations. Several areas were noted in this report for enhanced service and maintenance opportunities. Enhancements can be provided in maintenance staff training opportunities, minor equipment additions, seasonal park maintenance staff additions, access for persons with disabilities, and to create a brochure to provide residents educational information concerning environmental stewardship practices.

Administrative operations should review current policies and fee structures for recreation program fees, facility reservations and rentals, and other policies to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors. It is recommended to charge the Park Board with a review of these policies and current practices.

#### Year one recommendation notes:

Seasonal Maintenance Workers – should be a qualified individual in park maintenance practices. In 2021, the Township has decided to provide grass cutting services in-house and not contract out those services as in past years. This will be accomplished with Township staff. The Township has three full time maintenance workers dedicated to park maintenance; however, the addition on grass cutting creates more demand for staff hours to complete current assignments and now the added grass cutting duties. The addition of three seasonal maintenance workers allows the full time staff to continue their assignments in order to maintain the parks to their current standards, while permitting seasonal workers the ability to perform grass cutting and other minor park services.

Increase training opportunities for administrative and maintenance staff. These opportunities may include environmental concerns, best practices, playground safety training, sport field maintenance, among other opportunities.

Also recommended for year one and have no costs associated with the recommendation:

Written agreements with community organizations (schools, firehouses, churches, and private providers) will provide opportunities for programs for youngsters through adults year-round. While some programs will occur out of doors, others require an indoor facility to hold the event. Certainly, during the fall, winter, and spring indoor locations are required.

Charge the Parks and Recreation Director, with assistance from the Parks Board, to review current policies for facility uses and rental fees which can be enacted by the Board of Supervisors.

Charge the Parks and Recreation Director, with assistance from the Parks Board, to develop a policy for program resident and non-resident fees, which can be enacted by the Board of Supervisors. Several models of various fees structures exist through the PA Recreation and Park Society or the National Recreation and Park Association. Policies will assist the administration when determining fees for future programs and will also provide written documentation should questions arise.

#### Year two recommendation notes:

The Delaware Valley Insurance Trust performs and annual review of all parks and playground areas. The information provided in the report details safety concerns and ranks those concerns in priority order which provides the Township an opportunity to reduce risk exposure. Training a staff person to recognize areas of exposure throughout the year provides a best management practice for the safety of all residents and other park visitors.

A best management brochure will assist residents and should be posted on the web-site and distributed through the Township in parks and other areas. Such a brochure assists the Township to meet the MS4 community educational requirements.

It is assumed that seminars and training workshops will be included in the annual operations budget; and, as training opportunities become available, staff will consider attendance and participation in those activities.

### Year three recommendation notes:

The Township has decided to perform grass cutting services in-house and not utilize contracted service providers for this service. Air cooled riding mowers have a life expectancy of approximately 3,000 hours, pending maintenance provided for the equipment. A new air cooled zero turn riding mower may be required at this time.

### Year four recommendation notes:

As noted in this report, indoor facilities are required for additional year round recreation programs. Also noted were discussions concerning an indoor facility owned and operated by the Township. Pending how new agreements are reached and the success of year round programming and other community needs, the Township may wish to consider a feasibility study to determine if an indoor facility is warranted.

The School District, private recreation providers, sports leagues, and social and religious groups can all provide valuable insight to the Township as to recreational needs of their students and members. Partnering with the Township would ensure that recreational facilities and programs are in place and meeting the needs of the organizations and the Township. These groups can also provide volunteering opportunities to assist with management or maintenance of recreational facilities.

County, regional, and state partners can provide funding and assistance with recreation and conservation plans. DVRPC is a regional planner and offers opportunities for communities to be part of the larger regional planning network including greenways, trails, and transportation needs. State partners can provide important information to assist a municipality in successfully receiving funding for improvement projects.

# **Funding Sources**

The following is a summary of grants, programs, funds, and other potential partnerships/sources that can assist with the funding of Lower Providence Township parks, recreation, open space, and multimodal improvements. Various sources can be pursued during Preserve improvement phases, based on availability of funds aligning goals of partner agencies, and County priorities for each year.

# Pennsylvania Department of Conservation & Natural Resources (PA DCNR)

Community Conservation Partnership Program (C2P2)

The Community Recreation and Conservation Program through the PA DCNR Community Conservation Partnership Program (C2P2) provides funding to municipalities and authorized nonprofit organizations for recreation, park, trail, and conservation projects. These include planning for feasibility studies, trail studies, conservation plans, master site development plans, and comprehensive recreation park and open space and greenway plans. In addition to planning efforts, the program provides funding for land acquisition for active or passive parks, trails and conservation purposes, and construction and rehabilitation of parks, trails, and recreation facilities. Most of these projects require a 50% match, which can include a combination of cash and/or non-cash values. Following completion of a park master plan, an implementation or construction grant is the next stage grant from DCNR. Grant applications for the C2P2 program are accepted annually usually in April.

### Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) State Assistance Program, established in 1965, is a federal source of funding distributed to all states by the U.S. Department of the Interior's National Park Service.

### Wild Resources Conservation Program

Each year, these funds support the survey, research, management, and conservation of wild resources through DCNR's Wild Resource Conservation Program (WRCP).

WRCP identifies research and conservation needs on the Commonwealth's native flora and non-game wildlife. The program provides grants and facilitates the flow of information between researchers, conservationists, and educators.

### DCNR Forest Buffer Program

The Riparian Forest Buffer Program through PA DCNR provides funding for organizations implementing a variety of forest buffers including conventional riparian forest buffers and multifunctional buffers. Pennsylvania has a goal of planting 95,000 acres of riparian buffers by 2025 to improve state waterways and the Chesapeake Bay. There is no match required to be eligible for this grant. Grant applications are usually accepted October to late December.

DCNR has provided funding to County Conservation Offices. Grants awards are made by the local conservation office for the planting of multi-functional buffers.

# Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (PA DCED)

Commonwealth Financing Agency (CFA) -Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program (GTRP)

The Greenways, Trails, and Recreation Program (GTRP) provides funding for: public park and recreation area projects, greenway and trail projects, and river or creek conservation projects. The program requires a 15% local cash match of the total project cost and DCED share must not exceed \$250,000. Applications are typically due in June.

Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF)

The Multimodal Transportation Fund provides grants to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the Commonwealth. Funds may be used for the development, rehabilitation and enhancement of transportation assets to existing communities, streetscape, lighting, bike lanes, sidewalk enhancement, pedestrian safety, connectivity of transportation assets and transit-oriented development. Grants are available for projects with a total cost of \$100,000 or more and grants shall not exceed \$3,000,000 for any project. # Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)

DEP Growing Greener Watershed Protection Program

Funded through the state Growing Greener Environment Stewardship Funds, applications should be targeted toward clean-up of non-point source pollution. The grant will fund local watershed-based conservation projects with the average award totaling \$150,000 and requires a 15% match from a non-DEP fund source. Applications are typically due in January.

# DEP Non-Point Source Implementation Programs Grant

Provides funding assistance for projects aimed at implementing Pennsylvania's Non-point Source Management Program. Targeted projects include control of urban runoff, and natural channel design/stream bank stabilization projects. The grant will fund local projects with the average award being \$200,000. Applications are typically due in July.

### PennDOT

Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program (TA Set-Aside)

The Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program (TA Set-Aside) is a Federal highway and transit funds set-aside under the Surface Transportation Program (STP) for community-based "non-traditional" projects designed to strengthen the cultural, aesthetic, and environmental aspects of the nation's intermodal transportation system. The program seeks to provide funding for projects such as construction, planning, and design of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other nonmotorized forms of transportation. Nonmotorized forms of transportation include sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. Recently, these grants have been available every two years.

### Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS)

Administered through TA Set-Aside, SRTS is a national and international movement to create safe, convenient and healthy opportunities for children to walk and bicycle to school. The program encourages children to walk and bicycle to school, helping to reverse an alarming decrease in students' physical activity and an associated increase in childhood obesity. By getting more children to walk and bicycle to school, communities are also reducing fuel consumption, alleviating traffic congestion, and improving air quality. SRTS programs are built on collaborative partnerships among many stakeholders, including educators, parents, students, elected officials, engineers, city planners, business and community leaders, health officials, and bicycle and pedestrian advocates.

Eligible activities include new or reconstructed sidewalks or walkways, pedestrian and bicycle signs or signals, transportation projects that achieve ADA compliance, such as curb ramps, bike parking facilities or bus bike racks, shared use paths, side paths, trails that serve a transportation purpose, crossing improvements, and traffic realignments, road diets, or intersection changes. ### Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF)

PennDOT's Multimodal Transportation Fund provides grants to ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of this Commonwealth. The program is intended to provide financial assistance to municipalities, councils of governments, businesses, economic development organizations, public transportation agencies, rail freight, passenger rail, and ports in order to improve transportation assets that enhance communities, pedestrian safety, and transit revitalization. PennDOT will administer activities directly initiated or undertaken by it related to grants for eligible multimodal programs in accordance with these guidelines. # PennVEST (Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority)

PennVEST offers both grants and low interest loans for projects that help to manage stormwater and improve water quality. Several recommendations for Lower Providence may attract PennVEST funds, since they include stormwater BMPs.

### Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF)

The PENNVEST Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) provides affordable financing for wastewater and certain other projects throughout Pennsylvania for the construction, improvement, extension, expansion, repair or rehabilitation of wastewater collection, treatment or disposal facilities, storm water management, nonpoint source pollution controls including but not limited to agricultural best management practices and watershed and estuary management.

The program offers low interest loans with flexible terms and principal forgiveness funds where applicable and available.

PENNVEST performs similarly to a bank for the CWSRF program in Pennsylvania and manages the financial aspects of the fund, while the Department of Environmental Protection is the technical arm for the program. The seed money for the CWSRF has been distributed to states annually under Congressional authorization pursuant to the Clean Water Act of 1987. The funds and the program are administered nationally by United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

# Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission (PFBC)

State Wildlife Grants Program (SWGP)

Created in 2000 by Congress, SWG has enabled the Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission and Pennsylvania Game Commission to direct conservation efforts toward species in decline or vulnerable to decline, with the goal of preventing endangered species listings. State Wildlife Grant funding to Pennsylvania has ranged from \$1.5 to \$2.5 million per year, shared equally between the Fish & Boat Commission and Game Commission.

The State Wildlife Grants program (SWG) is the nation's core program for preventing species from becoming endangered. This program provides needed funds to states to develop and implement conservation actions identified in their State Wildlife Action Plan. These funds benefit wildlife and their habitat, including species not hunted or fished.

Since 2001, the Pennsylvania Fish & Commission has supported more than 60 fish, amphibian, reptile, and freshwater invertebrate conservation projects through State Wildlife Grant funding, including research, species surveys, habitat improvement, and other efforts.

### **Montgomery County**

Montco 2040: Implementation Grant Program

This grant program was put in place to assist municipalities in making physical improvements that achieve progress toward the goals of the Montco 2040: A Shared Vision Plan. One of the main focus categories of 2021 is Adaption and Resiliency and includes floodplain mitigation, streambank restoration, adding BMPs to municipal or School District property, Green Streets, Community Gardens, and Open Space Preservation. Open Space Preservation projects require a minimum 50% local match that can come from any combination of municipal or outside funding sources. Schuylkill River Restoration Fund

This program offers administrative assistance grants for land transaction and open space preservation projects. Matching funds of up to \$4,000 per project are available to protect lands within the Schuylkill River Watershed. ### U.S. Forest Service

National Urban and Community Forestry Advisory Council

The National Urban and Community Forestry Advisory Council (NUCFAC) is a Congressionally designated advisory council to the Secretary of Agriculture on urban forestry and related issues. The 1990 Farm Bill created NUCFAC to bring together the wide variety of voices raised about a common concern: the present health and future preservation of America's urban forests. NUCFAC was founded to synthesize the full spectrum of views into a consistent vision, as a foundation for practical policy on urban forestry and related natural resources.

NUCFAC evaluates innovative grant proposals that help to implement the Ten-Year Action Plan and recommends them for funding to the Secretary of Agriculture.'

# National Fish and Wildlife Foundation

NFWF supports conservation efforts in all 50 states and U.S. territories. More than 18,600 projects have been supported since founding – are rigorously evaluated and awarded to some of the nation's largest environmental organizations. Financial commitments since the organization's founding total \$6.1 billion.

### The Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Program

The Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Program focuses on the stewardship and restoration of coastal, wetland and riparian ecosystems across the country. Its goal is to meet the conservation needs of important species and habitats, providing measurable and meaningful conservation and educational outcomes. The program requires the establishment and/or enhancement of diverse partnerships and an education/outreach component that will help shape and sustain behavior to achieve conservation goals.

To date, the Foundation has funded over 800 projects in 50 states, including the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands, through this program. More than \$18 million in grants has leveraged more than \$67 million in other funds or donated services.

### Legislative Funding

State and federal elected officials can sometimes include items into legislation for worthy projects in their districts. A conversation between county and municipal officials and legislators is the way to begin this process. This type of funding should be targeted toward capital improvement projects.



### **Private Foundations**

There may be regional corporations and foundations that support public works such as park development. Competition for these funds is usually brisk, but opportunities should be researched. Funding is often to non-profit organizations. Foundations and institutions represent another potential source of funding for education-related site improvements and programming. Grants are available to support student field trips, provide teacher training in science, and provide other educational opportunities. Education tied to research can increase the pool of potential funds. The science community and research institutions are the logical starting points for solicitation foundation funds.

## Schools and Local Organizations

Local schools and local organizations may also be of assistance in several ways. Local scout groups and mountain bike community are two such examples. These groups might get involved with club, fundraising events, and park cleanup days. While the amount of funds raised may be relatively small, this process builds constituents and support for the parks and recreation system.

# Friends Groups & Park Nonprofits


Similar to participation by school groups, the establishment of a non-profit (501(C)3) Friends-of-the-Park groups can help raise grass roots funding for the individual parks and be a conduit for tax-deductible donations and foundation funding. The Friends can serve as additional eyes and ears for the parks, providing necessary feedback to the administration and maintenance staff.

A Friends group can be an important vehicle for park stewardship, organizing volunteers, providing environmental education.

## **Donation Opportunities**

It is recommended that the County create a list, with prices, of physical donation opportunities for the parks consistent with the plan. Rather than having physical markers in parks noting the donation (which can become cumbersome over time) a list of donors might be prominently displayed on the Township Parks website or a funders' donation wall at a central location.

### **GENERAL NOTES:**

### INTRODUCTION

- 1. At 7:00 pm, Peter Simone started the meeting with introductions. Peter discussed examples of other current SC projects.
- 2. Pankaj Jobanputra explained the importance of planning, the project schedule, the public participation process, and the project scope.
- 3. Joseph Wallace gave overviews and led discussion of the individual parks and open spaces of Lower Providence and their amenities:

### a. Eagleville Park

- i. Joseph mentioned that the possibility of a new location for the amphitheater has been brought up in conversation.
- ii. Jean Akers asked Jane Delaney to restate the events that this park supports, issues considering realignment and supporting infrastructure, and events that she would like to have here.
- iii. Jane responded:
  - Easter egg hunt, July 4th, Fall Fest, tree lighting, concerts in the park, trunk or treat, fireworks.
  - It is hard to get the elderly down to the amphitheater; it's great for shade, but a bit of a walk/hill.
  - Sports fields
  - Could use more parking and trees
- iv. Don Delamater stated that electricity has been run for the possibility of relocating the amphitheater behind the municipal building. There is a big hill there for a great view.
- v. Jean said that the recon group noted that it may be valuable to provide additional paved pathways, especially on the long hill, for more universal access. The area below the tennis courts could have a paved path. A general goal for most parks: make sure trails provided give good loop experience and if not, create realignments and new pieces of trail for loops and ADA experience.
- vi. Susan LaPenta asked if the trails lead into surrounding neighborhoods. Bill Brooke answered that, yes, there are two in his development, Wooded Glen. Beth Ann Mazza also noted that there is one from Eagleville Elementary.
- vii. Beth Ann stated that she has "amphitheater envy" for other areas, and that there could be better outdoor programming if there were better amphitheaters in the Township. She would like to see nicer spaces for outdoor performance and activities for families. Especially considering the COVID situation, much of what people will want to do may need to happen outdoors.
- viii. Colleen Eckman said that there has been discussion of someday expanding the Township building or relocating the Police Department, as they are crunched for space. Analysis was done (conceptual) of what to do with existing building. No 3<sup>rd</sup> floor addition (expense). They looked at a different connection that didn't work with the complex (conflicts). A conclusion was that the police could be their own single entity in a building near Ridge Pike, in the open green field above the football field; the sewer authority building could be removed and that department relocated into the Township building. The police department was the main drive of that analysis, because there is not enough physical space in the building. Also, the parking lot for police cars is abutting the most used park area— this is a bit of a conflict with families coming to play, police checking equipment two uses don't mesh. The area around the building might change. Peter asked if the police leaving the current two-story building would give enough room for the Township, to which Colleen replied yes, plenty for administration. Colleen agreed to share the study with SC

ix. Wilson Farm Park was cited as a park that has been able to host outdoor concerts, which has to do with the way it is set up; approachable from many angles through trails, there is parking on the outskirts of the park. Eagleville Park has limited parking only located towards upper end of park – one-ended. The park is landlocked because of the creek.

#### b. Eskie Park

- i. Jane stated that the park is used for organizations for softball. It has a nice walking trail with trees on one side, but overall is very open/lacking trees. There are some large areas to utilize in the future, and there are restrooms. There is a lack of parking, making events like the Easter egg hunt difficult to accommodate.
- ii. Joseph mentioned walking access in light of coming residential development and the question of sidewalks, this group should advocate strongly for sidewalks. Peter added that this group's role is as champion for sidewalks. People will appreciate a walking connection and it is remarkable that some governing bodies do not put in sidewalks.
- iii. Jean brought up the side entries, which present a wayfinding challenge being able to ID where you are when coming in from side entry with a sign that reads "this is provided by local government, this is where you are, etc." This is something to add the **general list**.
- iv. Peter brought up possible addition of a parking lot off of an adjacent cul-de-sac.

#### c. Audubon Recreation Fields

- i. Jean stated that on a park tour 2 years ago, the Parks Board identified the need for master plan (update). The fields provide much value for ARA/little league; but for other users, it is very disjointed needs better connections within and to neighboring areas. "Where are you and whose park is it?" There is also a parking issue it might be wise to see if the opposite side of Audubon Rd is usable for overflow parking (municipal parcel?). Parking capacity and redesign could be a good opportunity to create bubble diagrams to connect things and make the space more functional.
- ii. Joseph mentioned the idea of having restrooms open all season.
- iii. Peter pointed out that not all the fields have the correct solar orientation; DCNR will want this. He noted that we may want an aerial image on this slide for public meeting.
- iv. Beth Ann said that it is difficult for anyone with disabilities to get around the park accessibility. Also, across the street on Pawlings Rd side, there is no distinct safe crossing on this highly traveled road.
- v. Peter brought up the smash and grab issues in the parking lots, and suggested better visibility by limbing up trees and leaving no hidden areas. Jean said both lots even the visible one have the problem, so visibility is not the only issue. Peter said this could be a candidate for security cameras. Beth Ann stated that smash and grab has been prevalent in all parks (has been a victim in Perkiomen park) because the proximity to 422 makes for an easy getaway.

#### d. Gabriel's/Knight cricket field

- i. Jane said the cricket club uses it. They want to make it more playable upgraded. Only a small part of the field is currently used.
- ii. Jean said there is room for future design ideas.
- iii. Peter said it would be easy to do a quick layout: "how many fields can we put here". This area could be used as more of a sports complex DCNR money. It needs infrastructure.
- iv. Jean pointed out that Pawlings Rd trailhead for the Schuylkill River Trail is often packed and has no amenities (such as restrooms and water); maybe collaborate with the County to see what infrastructure could be put there.
- v. Colleen went over ownership: this is County-owned land (along with ARA Fields). The Township has a dollar lease agreement or something of the like, and has had it for about 12 years they maintain mowing and use as they see fit. Like ARA, they need County approval for improvements. Parks and Recreation Committee looked at possible uses: ballfields, dog park. One complication Station Ave divides this with the land that the County owns; crossing this road would be problematic as traffic is heavy.
- vi. Beth Ann stated that she likes the idea of amenities. (The Parks Board) laid out initial plans for a baseball field and 2 multipurpose fields, play structure, and comfort area. The Township was short on sports fields at the time a lot has changed in 12 years. Trails are also more used now than before. Joe said that it would be great to have access to that plan Beth told Jane that a rough drawing should be in records.

# e. Valley Forge

- i. Geoff Creary explained that the Pawlings Farm section has great access but is a hidden gem. He listed the limekiln, mountain bike trails, running trails, and the SRT. On the north side of 422 there is another portion of park that is very hard to get to; he asked if we will be able to get access. Right now it is an old nursery with lots of green space that is sitting unused, which is not necessarily bad if we want to keep it a naturalized area.
- ii. Colleen said that NPS has ideas/a master plan for land use on this side of the river. Local municipalities and federal government may have different ideas for land use; the fed supersedes us. Colleen also pointed out that, in the lower part of the farm, on the other side of 422, there are often wanderers; people using the National Park who wander into the neighborhood and knock on doors asking for a bathroom or glass of water. We need to be mindful of that interaction.

#### f. Audubon Elementary

- i. Joseph stated that this is a potential area for expansion; it was recently looked at as potential space for COVID additional bed locations, for example. He asked how we can use this space creatively.
- ii. Jane great add on to use for indoor facilities for programs. Large area of land in the back, off of the street. It could be a community center, host boys/girls scouts, basketball clinics, classes, etc.

- iii. Peter asked if anyone has contacted the School District and said that SC can initiate this conversation. Don replied that the Township is already in discussion with the School District about this site and are seeing what can be done here. Pete stated that SC would appreciate whatever information can be shared, if not confidential; "Keep us in the loop, as long as you can."
- iv. Beth Ann stated that they have been searching for a home for indoor programming for a long time, and that it would be great if something could be done to move forward.
- v. Peter cited a nearby model, Upper Merion Senior Center, a renovated building used for many purposes.

#### g. Redtail Park

- i. Joe mentioned that shade trees are generally recommended across the board, including here, to accommodate activities such as picnicking.
- ii. Jane said that the Methacton baseball organization uses the baseball field. The soccer organization uses the field. She agreed that this park needs shade.
- iii. Beth Ann added that it needs not only shade, but comfort station as well (restrooms); this was on the five year plan.
- iv. Kent Morey asked if this parking lot gets full, to which Beth answered that, in the past, if there was baseball and soccer at same time it has come close, but she is not sure if it has ever overflowed.

#### h. Pond View Park

- i. Joseph posed the question: could this park use infrastructure, play equipment?
- ii. Beth said that play structures may get push back from the neighbors. A nice wooded area with soft nature trail and nature education could be good here.

#### i. Hoy Park

- i. Beth Ann stated that this is one of her favorites because she loves water. The biggest problem is that there is not enough parking. With the boating access and fishing area, there is a problem if there are over 6-8 cars.
- ii. Jane said that this has been brought up, and lines were added to keep people from parking each other in. This helped a little but there is still a lot of parking and it gets chaotic.
- iii. Jean pointed out that the Perkiomen Water Conservancy Sojourn (50-100 kayakers) uses this park as a landing point they leave cars here and are shuttled up to Schwenksville for this one day event. There is potential for more than what the local conservancy does. At the property across Skippack creek, Indianhead Dam Association holds a fishing derby in the dam impoundment area. There is also a sewer extension on the other side of the creek.
- iv. Colleen said that everyone has found this park this year; it used to be a hidden gem. The Township owns a slightly wooded lot one lot west of Skippack Creek; may be able to do pull off gravel parking there. Colleen pointed out that there have been people swimming in the creek; this makes her nervous because there are young people who may be unfamiliar with the depth of water near the dam and that water can get bad after a storm. She suggested signage to caution swimming activity.

v. Peter proposed a handicap accessible ADA kayak launch.

# j. Evansburg Point Park

- i. Jane said this park is used for the football organization and lacrosse uses it as well (one practice and one playing field). There are bathrooms, concessions, a play area, and pavilion. The park is heavily used starting in August. There is a good amount of parking, but we could add a play area or trail.
- ii. Joseph asked if there are connections to surrounding neighborhoods, to which Beth Ann answered that, other than crossing the street, there is no real connectivity. Neighbors gave push-back on the trail through the woods. This is a State park as well, so everything goes through DCNR which takes extra time. In the main practice field, there is a drainage issue; a large patch of dirt on the aerial identifies the location.
- iii. Peter suggested that this might be good opportunity for stormwater management for MS4.
- iv. Beth pointed out a stormwater drainage area at bottom of the football field.

#### k. Evansburg State Park

- i. Beth Ann said this is a hidden gem. It takes up a huge part of Collegeville. Until recently it was not very used. There are great trails that could be better defined or cleaned up.
- ii. Peter said that it seems there is no relationship between the park and municipalities and asked if the new director is better in this regard. The park seems to keep to themselves, and there are not many trails that connect to it. There could be a much bigger benefit to communities, and this is a missed opportunity. This is the time to strike with DCNR. Peter asked what the relationship is like and if it could be improved.
- iii. Beth Ann answered that it could be improved. Jane said that there is no relationship with the director. Colleen said she thinks there is a new director, and that the last director was "anti-everything"; it seemed there was no money for maintenance.
- iv. Peter suggested that SC initiate the conversation with them. For example, in another community we have a PHMC site, Daniel Boone Homestead. We helped them to get funding for entire facility, so hopefully PHMC can go after money that the park does not typically get. Partnerships should be explored, because the mission for the state park is to have a state park within 20 min of every resident of the commonwealth, and this needs to be remembered.
- v. Jane said that she can reach out to the park, and Peter suggested that this be done together.
- vi. Susan pointed out that the pedestrian bridge in the park has some damage from the storm last week. Also, the structure further north a bridge constructed in the last 10 years at Anders road(?) one pedestrian bridge crosses Skippack Creek.
- vii. Jean said that it is good to be reminded of the desire to create more connectivity for the community this huge blob of green does not have much connectivity. At some points, people are on the road up against the shoulder

- with no guard rail. Let's make this more porous, more accommodating. We will get more people into the park if it connects safely to the neighborhoods. Let's get a conversation going.
- viii. Susan said the park used to connect to a fishing pier near the football fields, opposite Landis Mill Rd down to Skippack creek(?)
- ix. Erin Di Paolo said that several years ago, in the last open space plan, they talked about connecting Eagleville into Evansburg through a trail system.
- x. Kent asked if it makes sense to reach out to Audubon? Jean responded that Audubon has an agreement with the County for the use of Mill Grove Sanctuary. The State park and Audubon have common goals looking to preserve areas. Audubon is County land part of the County system of parks and historic sites; this is as much a conversation to have with Montgomery County Parks as with the Audubon center. This is a good point we should be talking with the County to conserve open space. Peter agreed, and said we should be making connections into those lands.
- xi. Colleen said that Jean brought up an idea that she has been thinking about: we have a huge green space with Evansburg, Valley Forge, and in the middle is County park land. The distance in between would love to see connection and preservation along the Perkiomen Creek corridor. There are steep slopes, and there is Hideaway Day Camp; maybe they can get a land preservation agreement, opening it up (but not to public use). Could bring it down to Arcola Rd and open that up, and make connections along the riparian border.

## I. Arrowhead Elementary School

i. Jane said that the Township uses School District properties for summer camps; this is one, as well as Eagleville Elementary and Woodland Elementary.

#### m. Level Road Schoolhouse

- i. Indoor rec area
- ii. Jane said this is used for smaller programs bathroom renovations, nice facility.Used for senior yoga and Zumba, and they rent it out for functions for residents.It is used very often.
- iii. Joe pointed out that there is a lot clustered in this area, giving much potential for connectivity.

#### n. IBEW Rec Fields

- i. Joseph said that maybe we can think proactively, working with existing facilities. Peter asked if there is a relationship with the brotherhood, to which Jane answered that there is none.
- ii. Colleen pointed out that this is a huge piece of property, maybe good for preservation. PennDOT has plans for a connector road with a 2<sup>nd</sup> bridge over Perkiomen; it might be valuable.
- iii. Peter asked if there is an official Township map and mentioned that we have done this other townships. It can be helpful in looking at sites like this and the camp to facilitate preservation in the future.

# o. Cranberry Park and Central Perkiomen Valley Park

i. Joe stated there is potential to connect to the neighborhood across the street.

- ii. Jean said that when the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy does their sojourn, and maybe cleanup activities, this is a stopping point preferred lunch spot for them. There is a lot of flood plain, and many tree plantings by the Conservancy.
- iii. Beth Ann said this is great opportunity to connect to waterways and connect watercraft, like Hoy Park. There is very little parking, and the floodplain could be an issue. People kayak and this is a good lunch spot; it could be good as an access area to the water.
- iv. Jean 2 years ago when the Conservancy did a water trail plan, they looked at Cranberry park to improve access to the water, but recently they've been working with Collegeville (when they were expanding their sewer). There are other locations with former homes that had improvements that went into the water/floodway; PWC is working to make this the primary launch site in this area.

# p. Sherwood Park

- i. Joseph pointed out that there is not a lot of shade over the play structure.
- ii. Jane stated that people can access this park through walking the walkability is good, but is hot because there are no trees.

#### q. Dell Angelo Park

- Joe stated that this is great example of what a park can be, and we can use this
  as a model for a successful, shaded park with many connections to residential
  areas.
- ii. Peter said that if there is pushback, we can point out that this park is well integrated into the community.
- iii. Jane said that they are hoping to add a gazebo or picnic shelter, and that this park provides of lots of access to residents.
- r. Woodland Elementary
- s. Mascaro Mem Field
  - i. Joseph pointed out the "stellar" ball fields and play area.
  - ii. Jane explained that the Township maintains the play apparatus, and that Methacton runs baseball out of here.
- 4. Geoff spoke about existing data for Lower Providence: Township, Montgomery County, State, NPS it is rare to work on a project and have all of these datasets. He discussed incorporating the two sidewalk inventories. Geoff shared the Strava maps showing running and biking patterns, which revealed corridors to investigate further. Geoff also discussed greenways. Peter noted that we will look at the Township's riparian ordinances.
- 5. Pankaj discussed the Public Engagement process, including the Public Opinion Survey, which he asked the Committee to read over and give suggestions. He also discussed WikiMapping.
- 6. The discussion turned to Next Steps:
  - a. Jean recommended setting a deadline to return comments on the survey. Peter proposed September  $4^{th}$ .
  - b. Bill brought up the selective update of the Lower Providence Open Space Plan from 2002, and asked if we had seen it. Peter said we will review it and see what goals were set and if they were met. Joseph confirmed that we do have a copy.

- c. Peter said that we will send a synopsis of an official map; we think it is a useful tool. We did a greenway plan, and as a result several trails were built with no taxpayer cost because they were on an official map.
- d. Kent pointed out that, as part of MS4, as you create impervious area you need to compensate for it. From a stormwater perspective, consideration should be given to what materials are being used. Runoff needs to be treated, but can be worked around. If parking is not being used entirely, maybe remove to put in landscape islands and create rain gardens.
- e. Pat Stasio stated that he had no comments.

# Presentation

- 1. Peter Simone:
  - a. Briefly went over Agenda and Committee/Team Introductions.
- 2. Pankaj Jobanputra (PJ):
  - a. Went over the project schedule.
  - b. Discussed takeaways from Public Meeting 1 brainstorming: goals, facts, concepts, and
  - c. Went over Public Survey and Wikimapping preliminary results

- d. Explained the role of the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), some NRPA definitions, and NRPA Benchmarking; discussed where Lower Providence stands compared to 2020 NRPA Performance Review Park Facilities metrics.
- e. Went over Community Benchmarking of parks and recreation facilities for 2019 and 2040 projected population.
- f. Jean Akers asked if **disc golf** was included in benchmarking and expressed interest in its inclusion if facilities exist. She shared that, in her experience as a planner in the Pacific Northwest, she witnessed disc golf's growth in popularity, as well as pickleball's growth into a tournament sport.
- g. Colleen Eckman noted that **bocce courts** were not listed in the benchmarking and asked that they be.

## 3. Joseph Wallace:

- a. Went over inventory and analysis, including:
  - i. Park service areas/gaps
    - Jean noted that, in the service gaps analysis of walking distance to parks and rec facilities, streets seemed to be examined more so than actual sidewalks, stating that she would not walk many of the routes. She also pointed out that this did not modify for barriers, such as lack of crosswalks.
  - ii. Potential open space and rec expansions
    - Colleen provided some background on the former landfill site, owned by Carmela Farms. It is an EPA Superfund site that was cleaned up with a cap. The site was recently purchased off the tax rolls it was delinquent by a neighbor who does not intend to use it except to make sure that he has open space behind his home. There is so much history EPA Superfund to today and she would not consider the Township buying the property, as it is a liability. They have met with the EPA and DEP, went to Washington, explored all avenues. They would like to pursue it further.
  - iii. Potential open space and rec acquisition

#### 4. Geoff Creary:

- a. Presented conceptual trail connections, discussing the relevance to Montgomery County's 2018 bicycle plan, *Bike Montco*.
  - i. Jean stated that this issue (connectivity and trail/sidewalk connections) is the highest priority it is what drove the need for this plan to be completed before the Comprehensive Plan, which will follow. One caution she has is about putting too much into sidewalks, as this will also be the responsibility of the transportation element in the comp plan. She expressed being torn between "yes we need this" and "no we don't want all of the energy to go into the transportation". However, this leads us to building priority for a regional trail that connects from Evansburg all the way down into Worcester Township and the Perkiomen Trail so if this justifies connecting into the regional system, that is a good thing, because not everyone in Lower Providence is connected to it.

ii. Peter stated that, hopefully, this will inform the comp plan. He would rather this plan be aspirational and push the comp plan toward more pedestrian connections. We can cut back later, but he thinks that, going into the study, it was clear that connectivity is important. Where is the line between transportation and recreation? There is a lot of overlap.

#### Pat Stasio:

- a. Discussed existing and potential maintenance and programming, including:
  - i. Parks and rec administration
  - ii. Recreation programs offerings
  - iii. Facilities
  - iv. Finance
- 6. Jean pointed out that St. Gabriel's Hall has closed the facility for the boys' program and does not know what they plan to do with it. She suggested that it would be nice to obtain some of that land.
  - a. PJ recalled that someone at a meeting had previously suggested creating multi-use fields
  - b. Don Delamater stated that it is zoned R-2 residential with a public facilities overlay.

#### Presentation

- 1. Peter Simone:
  - a. Welcomed the Committee.
- 2. Pankaj Jobanputra (PJ):
  - a. Reviewed the agenda, project schedule, updated public survey and WikiMapping results.
  - b. Discussed the purpose of an Official Map, which includes, and the benefits of having one.
    - Jean A. asked if the Township has considered an Official Map. Don D. noted that the Township is in the process of of a Comprehensive Plan update, so maybe an

Official Map could be completed in conjunction with the Comprehensive Plan. The plan is for the Open Space and Recreation Plan to be included in the Comprehensive Plan. Peter S. gave examples of municipalities that have adopted Official Maps and encouraged discussion of this because of the potential to propose parks and trails. Peter also noted that the Township would have a year to act on acquisitions and is not obligated to take action – it is a flexible document.

# 3. Joseph Wallace:

- a. Discussed stormwater Best Management Practices (BMPs), greenways and stormwater management,
- b. Presented projected facility needs community benchmarking, and spatial layouts for possible facilities to meet these needs:
  - Knights Cricket Field
  - Agriculture fields north of Eskie Park
  - Open space north of Mascaro Field
  - St. Gabriels Property
  - Two large parcels northeast of Eagleville Park
- c. Facilities analysis (with Redtail Park example)

# 4. Geoff Creary:

- a. Presented Sidewalk gaps, conceptual trail connections (Central Perkiomen Valley Park, Evansburg State Park Connector, Eskie Park Loop Trail Extension, and Valley Forge National Park Connector)
  - Don D. noted that, near the proposed CPV Park Trail, the assisted living facility
    has created a connection that goes under that bridge. Starting on river road, go
    left, under the bridge, and one can connect to the trails at living facility along
    Perkiomen. They are shown on their land development plans. There is an
    opening under the bridge, and they built flood walls to accommodate the trail
    here. They have the intention of connecting into the public trails.
  - Jean A. pointed out that parts of the Perkiomen Trail are under water after rains, lots of maintenance (scraping mud, draining trail) 5-6x year, and about half a dozen times that trails need to be closed.
  - Yerkes Road Crossing:
    - Don D. stated that, at the end of Yerkes Rd, people who live near that
      road have brought up the possibility of a crossing there. There used to
      be a crossing Yerkes Rd used to go up into Upper Providence. There
      has been thought of creating a pedestrian crossing there that would
      connect to County trail on other side.
    - Susan L. pointed out that Yerkes Rd connects to Route 29, and before that the Perkiomen Rrail crosses the road. She has heard that the bridge was taken out of commission during hurricane Agnes. She believes it is still all PennDOT right of way across at Yerkes rd.
    - Geoff pointed out that one advantage of the proposed Evansburg State
       Park Connector bridge is that the other side is land ownerd by the

- Lower Perkioment Valley Sewer Authority, so it is not privately held land.
- Either side of Yerkes road is residential on the Lower and Upper Providence sides, and there are pieces of sidewalk.
- Peter S. noted that, side it is residential, people who live there may
  either welcome a new connection here or may be resistant to having it.
  He asked the Committee if this was an important concept to explore.
- Jean A expressed that, considering long-range view, reconnecting a road that is no longer connected is definitely worth exploring. She acknowledged that this could change the traffic pattern for people who live there, but it could be to their benefit. Susan L has heard that the people objected to a bridge being replaced because it will change traffic patterns along Yerkes Rd. Jean noted that a pedestrian bridge only would be a different situation.
- BethAnn stated that she has heard over and over from people in that area, in the "arrowhead", that they have no safe way to connect directly to any of the trails. This old former bridge comes up a lot because if they had that one point of connection they could connect into the trail.
- Regarding the Valley Forge Park Connector:
  - Jean noted that she lives in one of those cul-de-sacs there. The challenge here is the people in the Apple Valley Ln neighborhood cannot walk safely to the Audubon Loop Trail. If a safe crossing were made at Audubon Rd and Pawlings Rd, and then sidewalks installed along the ARA side of Audubon Rd from the Audubon Loop Trail all the way down to Rittenhouse, that would make a great connection. This would also avoid needing to work with NPS or repurposing St. Gabriels. She does not want a proposal like this to take away from the need for sidewalk connections. Also, Jean noted that walking along 422 is not ideal it is noisy.
  - Geoff agreed that sidewalks need to be added here. However, sometimes an off-road route is better – Valley Forge Park and the farmstead are beautiful
  - Peter S. surmised that the sidewalk project would take priority, and hopefully the trail project would not be too far in the future. Jean agreed.
- Susan L. noted that, up by River Rd and Germantown Pk, where there is a new townhouse development, a trail is being put in along Germantown Pk. There is a portion that goes down to cross River Rd. Also, there is a crossing from that same townhouse development from their internal sidewalks to go over to Cranberry Park. Don noted that this is new, within the past year.
- Don pointed out that in the western end of the town, PennDOT is in the process of reconfiguring the road network: a connector road, a circle, Germantown Pk will turn into river road, no more "Y" intersection. They will be putting sidewalks

- in along Ridge Pk, the connector road, and Germantown Pk. He just got preliminary plans today and can send over.
- Geoff encouraged the committee to let SC know if there are any other trails that they would like to see.

#### 5. Pat Stasio:

a. Discussed programming, finance, and maintenance

#### 6. PJ

- a. Discussed **next steps**:
  - Scheduling key person interviews and focus groups end of January, early
    February. The Committee was encouraged to look over the focus group list and

#### 7. Additional Comments:

- a. Jean A suggested looking at ARA site and consider a loop trail on ARA field, which would add ½ mile and connect to the path by the Apple Valley neighborhood. It connects to ARA and gets people to Audobon Rd and Pawlings Rd intersection. The open space behind the two cul-de-sacs is partially owned by the township the HOA only owns the stormwater basin.
- b. Peter S proposed that, after SC has put together the park improvements, they will be submitted to the committee before getting into the draft plan. Jean recommending also sharing with the Park Board, with their specialized knowledge.
- c. Erin D asked how long Shannondell, a township-owned property, is being leased. Don answered that it is a long-term lease (approx. another 10-15 years). Erin asked if this property should be part of this discussion, to which Peter S replied 'yes'. Don confirmed that the property was purchased by the Township through a County open space grant, so it must remain open space.

#### Discussion and Q&A

- Jean A. noted that on the St. Gabe's Field Slide 9 the area / parcel for St. Gabe's (10 acre north of Ridge Pike or 49 acres south of Ridge Pike) should be clearly noted.
- Jane D. talked to Michelle at County about Knight's Field—they do not want cricket using parking at trailhead.
- Colleen E. noted that anywhere recommendations are proposed on County owned land, there should be a note that improvements will need to be approved by the County.
- Jean A. noted that for the Eagleville presentation slides, it would be helpful to zoom into improvement areas.

- Pete S. noted that committee needs to think about priorities, and it would be helpful if committee directed us on priorities, everyone picks 3-5 priorities.
- Jean A. noted that on Sides 43 where A is, when you add shade trees, should also naturalize basin.
- Jean A. noted that the Pechins Mill area is high value parcels and noted the realignment for Ridge Pike.
- Bill B. noted that the ideal pedestrian crossing should utilize the existing Arcola Bridge.

- Pete S. noted that the Perkiomen Creek Trail had a champion, and a bridge like this would need one as well

#### **BRAINSTORMING/Q&A**

Peter explained the "Card Technique" brainstorming and discussion process as a way for participants to contribute ideas for Plan goals, facts, concepts, and partners. The meeting then opened up for questions and comments:

- Anonymous: Are you taking into consideration in your inventory the proximity of Valley Forge
  National Park and all the trails within minutes of our townships?
   Peter: Yes. There are various important trials in this area, but chances are that you need to use a
  car to get to them, so one of the thing we want to do is connect you to those great resources
  that are very close by.
- What are the projections of population growth based on? Peter: They're based on several thigs – assembled by Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission DVRPC (the municipal planning organization for the region. The planners at DVRPC take existing population data and create models in tested programs, and the projections are based on proven formulas. They'll never be exact, but they are pretty close. One of the trends in the Township is an increase in multi-family housing, like Shannondell, and you've also has an influx of senior population, which contributed significant to Township growth. That is how these population projections are put together.
- Joe Ferraro: Can the links for the maps being used be posted online?
   Peter: Yes and no. We are just starting to develop these maps, but we have a fun tool called WikiMapping, so if you have a specific suggestion for trail/sidewalk connection, you can go online and draw it on the map with a note. As we develop these maps further they will be posted as part of these presentations online. We encourage everyone to contact us by email or phone if you have any questions.
- Anonymous: Do all these "users" live in LP? Doubtful
  Peter: Lower Providence is a sophisticated community with a good diversity of ethnic groups
  and age variation. We think a lot of the user groups do exist there, for the most part. If you look
  at any data from municipalities, counties, and the state, park and trail use has gone up amidst
  the COVID crisis. We think you have a good cross section of trails and trail users.
- Anonymous: Children walking to school? Do you live in this century?
   Peter: Good question/comment. There are many communities that are trying to go in the direction of encouraging children to walk or bike to school. The reason many of our children do not is because there are no safe routes to take. Ex. Virtual school busses, where an adult will walk with a group of children to school. One of the great problems in this country is childhood

- obesity, and one reason for this is that children don't get out and exercise enough. Data has shown that in communities with safe trails and connections, you can encourage kids to walk or ride a bike in good weather. If you are not aspirational with these things, they won't happen.
- Anonymous: Will these slides be available after this presentation?
   Peter: Yes, you can see the recording by using the same link to attend this meeting, and a PDF of the slide presentation will be provided on the Township website.
- Anonymous: This is BS. Who rides a bike to the grocery store?
   Peter: Again, no one will if you can't ride there, and not to shop for the week, but maybe for short trips to a Wawa or smaller grocery story. If safe facilities exist, people can not only ride for recreation, but for commuting. There is a small percentage of the community who do commute by bike if the distance allows and there are safe routes. Again, biking has gone way up in the last six months.
- Anonymous: Now you're talking! Preserve green space!
- Anonymous: No trails in green ways!!!
   Peter: There are some greenways that do not have any trails "no access greenways". When there are sensitive environmental resources you may not want to have a trail, or maybe not a biking trail but just a single width, earthen walking trail. There are other instances where is perfectly fine to have a trail examples are the Schuylkill River Trail or the Perkiomen Trail. There is no one correct way to approach this, but you can certainly have greenways with trails and greenways without.
- Anonymous: Are we going to ride our bike or walk in the winter months?
- Anonymous: If you are not a biker, who cares about this? Peter: Well, you might care if you're a motorist – if we can get a percentage of people out of their cars and onto bikes, it might have a slight effect on traffic. It might affect people's health. We recognize that not everyone is a biker, but there is a revolution happening in this county, and it is not political – it's about exercise, people appreciating green space, and there is a growing community of people who want to walk and people who want to bike. It's not just LP looking at this. Over the past 25 years, we have worked on well over 100 trail projects across PA; multiply that by 100 other firms doing the same type of work; PennDOT is talking about trails and connectivity.
- Anonymous: So the taxpayers of LP have to pay for a small segment of our residents who want bike paths to connect to the big trails??????
- Peter: There are a couple of ways that trails can be paid for. First of all, PA is a good environment for funding for trails, parks, and greenways. This study was partially paid for by a grant from DCNR. Every year, DCNR has somewhere between \$30-40 million that's paid for by the real estate transfer tax, that is dedicated to projects like this. The state, through Democrat and Republican administrations, has consistently done this because surveys that the state conducts show that people care about parks and recreation. If Lower Providence doesn't go after this money, if will go to another community. So, if this is important to you, it is important to make that known to your elected officials; if it is not, I encourage you to do the same thing. This is how things get done or don't get done for parks and recreation.
- Anonymous: I don't want a water park paid with tax dollars!
   Peter: We understand that comment, but there may be some of your fellow residents who would want that. Please understand that, when we referenced a spray pad, we are not talking

- about a water park; it is something that may be 15 feet across that has some water coming out of a couple of jets.
- Anonymous: Dog park? Most people who have dogs have backyard. Peter: Absolutely, but there are many people who don't. Also, another function of dogs parks is that, when you go to there, you meet other members of their community, you form friendships. We've seen that dog park users are some of the most vested people in communities in terms of parks and recreation. They contribute time and energy and become very valuable constituent groups for those parks.
- Joe Ferraro: Can we look at unusable open space as potential for renewable (solar or wind) energy generation?
   Peter: Very interesting idea. We have seen park systems where they use photovoltaic solar cells to power things like security cameras. Maybe there will be applications for solar and wind here, moving forward.
- Anonymous: People in Shannondell won't be using the trails!
   Peter: Well, I don't know if that's true. Maybe for most people there, but, as someone who is approaching 70, I like to get out and walk. I'm sure there are people at Shannondell who like to get out and walk. There are all levels of senior citizens there we'll see.
- Cara Coless: Dog Parks are a great way to bring members of the community together who love dogs and like Dog people.

Peter: That has been our experience.

- Jean Akers: Your 1 mile in 15 minutes is a bit optimistic. Few trail users walk that fast. If 1 mile walking distance is for park service area, I think it's too far. My 2 cents.
  - Peter: We will check those distances and times. Thank you for that comment.
- Laura Winslow: What is the Tyson Mill Complex?
   Peter:
- Jean: Concept = bike & pedestrian connections to regional trails & regional parks.

  Peter: I take that to mean that one of the concepts of this study is to connect neighborhoods safely to regional trails so that people can get away from needing a car to get to these trails.
- Anonymous: So we are going to build trails to get bikers to big trails....small amount of residents benefitting from a huge cost.
  - Peter: Our job, as consultants, is to give the Township, the community, you (as residents) and the governing body the information needed to make these decisions. Whether recommendations in this plan are implemented or not will depend on the feedback that the Board of Supervisors gets from you, the community.
- Anonymous: I was told Methacton doesn't want kids coming to school via bikes and walking. Peter: I'm sure that's true, and this is probably because of a lack of safe routes.
- Jean Akers: Pedestrian/bicycle bridges across Perkiomen Creek.

  Peter: The creek can be looked at as a barrier across which we can try to make connection.
- Anonymous: Who is paying for the planned projects? What is the hike in taxes for us in LP?
   Peter: As far as I know, there are no tax hikes planned. Like said before, there is grant money out there for these projects.
- Cara: Greenways can actually make great connections to the communities and spaces in town. Peter: Our charge is to do this in a safe and sustainable fashion. Some of the suggested ideas

- can happen quickly, but the bigger ideas will take many years and successive Boards of Supervisors to happen.
- Julia: This is more of a comment. Even if kids aren't necessarily walking to school, families may
  walk to the school after school hours to use the playground or ball fields.
   Geoff: This is definitely true we've seen connections and shortcuts that people are using to get
  to schools and facilities.
- Susan LaPenta: I believe Methacton buses a large percentage of students. I know that the neighborhood across from Arrowhead on Level Road were bused. Behind Arrowhead walked.
- Cara: Don't trails and sidewalks increase property values?
   Geoff: Yes, they do. There are studies that show this. Radnor Trail is a perfect example property values adjacent to the trail did go up.
- Anonymous: Is there a priority to connect Lower Providence across the Perkiomen to the county trial system especially in the upper portion of the township, the Collegeville area?
   Geoff: I agree with the idea of making that a priority. We haven't set any priorities yet, but would like to. It is a challenge there is a lot of elevation change and very few bridges available.
   We are looking at this and, if there is desire to make this a priority, we will push it to the top.
- Anonymous: There is a dog park in Oaks.
   Geoff: Yes, a great dog park it is extremely popular. It's supposed to be a trailhead, but it is starting to fill in with dogs. It has a large, regional draw.
- Joe F: This is a great way to stop over development with a strong open space plan. we don't
  need more traffic as we are built out. Good job guys!!
   Geoff: We agree, we are losing open space. The need for housing has increased and developers
  are developing a lot of properties closer to Philadelphia. It is a balance that we need to figure
  out as we proceed.
- Anonymous: It would be great to provide access for kids to safely walk to school. There is a
  movement towards getting kids outdoors and we should set ourselves up to provide this for our
  students.
  - Peter: There is a great movement called, something like, The Outdoor Child Movement, inspired by Richard Louv's *The Last Child in the Woods*. It talks about getting children away from screens and into the outdoors. This is important for Kids and adults. You already have a really good park system, and our job is to make it better.
- Anonymous: Greater access to water ways, rental equipment for water sports on the creek (kayaks, paddleboards etc).
  - Peter: Hoy park is a great park with access on the Perkiomen Creek there may be other places to get access to the water. Water trails are very important.
- Anonymous: Glad to hear about the grant money! Thank you!
   Peter: A good example: Radnor Twonship in Delaware County. Even though they are very affluent, we were able to get them \$2.25 million to build a five-mile trail system. Viability and strength of the project is looked at more than how affluent your community is.
- Anonymous: Are we connecting with William Penn Foundation on the circuit trails project. The
  circuit trails are moving rapidly and there is currently funding out there to make connections,
  some of which are within LP.
  - Peter: This circuit is the "superhighway" of trails for our region, which includes the Schuylkill

- River Trail and the Perkiomen Trail. Lower Providence is in a good position to make connections to the circuit, which will help to have an application prioritized.
- Laura: How do you count private land versus public? Camp Hideaway is a large open space but is private.
  - Peter: One of things we do is look at public, as well as private, recreation providers. Our inventory will include fitness clubs, YMCAs, gyms, and places like Camp Hideaway. We will try to understand how it is being used now and what future uses could be for it.
- Joe F: Rebuild the Yerkes bridge across the Perk as a footbridge to connect? Peter: Good suggestion.
- Anonymous: As you are planning for trails and greenways, also make sure to consider appropriate usage levels. I.e. overused parks are also a challenge.
   Peter: Yes, they are. As a community that is nearly fully built out, there is not a lot of vacant land. Also, we will meet with people at Evansburg State Park to try to create better connections to and utilization of the State Park.
- Anonymous: Like to see if there is an opportunity to bring to the twp. a YMCA facility- would benefit all ages. Currently have to leave the township for the experience.
   Peter: One of the suggestions for the closed school, Arrowhead, was to see if it could become a community center.
- Susan: Camp Hideaway is off of Arcola Road., by the Skippack Creek.
- Anonymous: There are already YMCAs within a short drive. Would prefer to see investments in high quality greenways and trails.
  - Peter: Thank you. We appreciate you bringing these things up. We depend on your input.
- Joe F: Audubon School WAS a community center that housed the Y back in the day...
- Julia: It's disappointing that the new bridge on Eagleville Rd does not accommodate walkers/bikers very well :-(
  - Peter: I don't know if there is potential reuse there, but we will look at that. Maybe there are options there for improvement.
- Anonymous: Are there also places along ridge pike that can be redeveloped, rather than take up more open space?
  - Peter: I'm not quite sure I understand the question, but we will be looking at Ridge Pike. Are you suggesting developing parks or redevelopment of old, already developed parcels? We can look at adaptive reuse of land that was already developed for a use that has since closed. Due to COVID, the whole retail environment is changing dramatically COVID has accelerated the loss of retail by maybe a number years. Many things are changing and we won't know how the patterns work out for a number of years it's a dynamic environment right now. But, I have never seen a park that had too many parks and open spaces, so this is something that we can be aspirational about.
- Anonymous: Yes, talking about adaptive reuse. There is a lot of opportunity on Ridge. At the same time, Audubon school is several acres that could be more easily converted to green space. Peter: Thank you for that comment. One concept that can happen is to take a developmed, asphalt space, and deconstruct it. It might be an expensive undertaking, but maybe one of the commercial parcels on Ridge Pike that is no longer viable could be converted into a green space, or, in an under-utilized shopping center, a civic space or plaza could be created with green space and trees. This could help retail operations. Think creatively about how we can take a "grey"

field" and turn it into a green field. Dell Angelo park is one of your most beautiful, successful parks – it has great trees, surrounded by housing, commercial nearby. We could suggest some new "Dell Angelo Parks" along some of your more developed area. You can work with the private sector in heavily developed areas. A lot of the newer shopping districts incorporate civic and green space to encourage people to spend more time there.

- Cara: I love the idea of reclaiming green space.
- Anonymous: Like to see St. Gabriel's park reviewed for potential multi-purpose fields for various sports teams.
  - Pete: We saw this as a tremendous opportunity. It's large, accessible, close to the Perkiomen Trail. It has potential for multi-purpoose fields.
- Anonymous: Would love to redevelop "grey areas" to a cultural center with places to eat, drink, walk around etc. Love.
  - Peter: Again, one of the things the Township could do, and we'd love to help with, is to work with your private sector businesses to help develop green areas.
- Susan: St. Gabes is closing for students.

  - o Pete S. noted that the cricket field can be a part of the any future recreation configurations for this site.

  - o Pete S. noted that a community garden can certainly be in this location.

  could be apartments here. These could be affordable units. Half of it could also become a park with multiuse fields.
- CC: It's important to get people to the Schuylkill River Trail (SRT) and Perkiomen Trail (PT). What about other trails? How do they happen?
- GC: You have to have public support for them, there is also grant funding available. You also have to work with the property owner of the area where the trail is proposed. Many people are expressing interest about more trails.
- CC: Can we look at trails along the creek system? This was on an older map.
- CC: I like the idea of the Evansburg connector.
- JW: You can also look at trails to address MS4 requirements.
- CC: We can use waterways as an economic driver, like kayak rentals.
  - o GC: There are also water trails connections on the SRT and PT.
  - o CC: That's another opportunity.

- CC: We need more active / adult recreation. There are less and less people with kids. We need to bring more people together.

- PJ: This would require further review.

- CC: Regarding the Yerkes Road bridge, it would be expensive but worth looking into.
- CC: Doesn't seem like it would be a benefit for a lot of people. Hoy Park seems to be a better connector.

- CE: What is a ballpark estimate on pedestrian bridge at Hoy Park to cross the Perkiomen?
  - o GC-tough to say, many different engineering factors. Cost estimate will require separate feasibility study.
- CE: Evansburg connector should absolutely happen.
  - JW: DCNR and Beth Hare seemed amenable to future discussion of connector trial through Evansburg State Park.
- CE: Sidewalks on Arcola Rd certain areas on this road are tight, sidewalk may not be best alternative here.
- CE: Sidepath on Rittenhouse Road is important for pedestrian and bike access.
- CE: Currently there is limited outdoor 4 -season recreation programming. Little to no adult rec. programming.

• CE: Important for the consultant team to make funding and grant recommendations as well as potential future partners and partnerships.

- PS noted that one of the important parts of plan is connectivity piece. Lower Providence has a good system, with 2 of best regional trails in the area. Important to make connections to these trails and to Evansburg State Park.
- PS noted that the Township should consider adopting an Official Map.
- PM noted that one of the things we lack is proper athletic fields in various locations, we need to have that as part of the open space plan.
- PM noted that trails should also include environmental education components for children.
- PM noted that for demographics there is one thing to add, that the Township is aging, as each year goes by, enrollment in schools goes down, particularly difficult revenue indicator, people who are retiring. There are a lot of seniors, so we want to make sure we have accommodation for seniors.
- PM noted that we have some opportunities to use County and State land that is available to us. Consider new partnership with DCNR for fields in Evansburg if necessary.
- PM noted that Skippack Creek is under MS4 order regarding sediment reduction. Township is part of the Skippack Creek Watershed Alliance – along with 7 municipalities total. Grant monies could be pursued for BMPs and stormwater management along with trail funding. Perhaps there is State money since the Skippack goes through Evansburg – could help DCNR build trail through the State Park.
- PM noted that SC should look at Streamlight property across from Eagleville Park.

- PM noted that for a crossing over the Perkiomen (multimodal) on Arcola bridge there could be bike facilities.
- PS noted that St. Gabe's is of tremendous interest, and is the last of large properties up for residential development. Important for the Township to figure out what it wants and start this discussion Twp can set agenda, people may love to see buildings adaptively reused. Would be good to see the exterior preserved.
- PS noted that maintenance funding is also important, not many grants that fund it, and usually the biggest long term cost, option is increases to EIT to apply to properties acquired through EIT (earned income tax).

- GC: explained concept of Evansburg connector to Perkiomen Trail. Ideally, or crushed stone. Details thought through later. Does Evansburg have any plans to expand trails?
  - o BH: Several bridges out of service. Does not think anything in the works other than trail maintenance. Heavy trail use, and this is tough on trails. Big picture long term would be good to have trail crews improve some of most well-worn trails. No current plans to expand trails.
- GC: is the Evansburg trail connector ok to include on plans going forward? BH: yes, ok
- PJ: How do you see the implementation of this conceptual trail fitting into Evansburg State Park's goals and plans? What plans does the Park have for accommodating the increased biking demand (as a result of Covid-19)?
  - BH: people have found the park during Covid and usage will remain high. Expanding trail usage and connections and lengths (beyond 5 mile use) connection to Perkiomen would be good.
     Needs to be looked at further by DCNR.
- PJ: Are there plans for new educational, trail signage, kiosks? Trails for any trail education signage?

- GN: The Evansburg connector is strategic for that connection to the state park.
- GN: The VF connector trail is consistent with my thinking.
- GN: The intersection of Pawlings and Crawford is a choke point.
- GN: You could have a trail or sidewalk along Eagleville Park, where the Township building is. You can connect the whole development here, go down to the Skippack Creek and you can connect to this trail also.
- GN: I put my bike on the car to get onto the trail system. I can go down to Arcola Road, but that's not a good road to bike on.
- GN: How much would the Yerkes Road bridge get used. On the Lower Providence side, you'd have a select number of people who would use it since it's pretty steep. For the Hoy Park bridge, the problem is being at the bottom of the hill, but you could go up Skippack. For Yerkes, you'd have to go up a significant hill. Hoy Park makes sense.
- GN: What about an internal connecting strategy, a connecting mechanism where every park had connections to other parks, you would have a linkage system.
- GN: I would love to see an overlay that takes municipal greenspace and shows how to get from one location to another.
- GN: What about sidewalks along Ridge Pike.
  - o PJ/JW: We will look at the county comprehensive plan for sidewalks.
- GN: You can also look at a loop around Shannondell golf course, you can intersect with it from the other side of Egypt Road.

- GN: Right now, you cannot safely get from Trooper Road to the trail system where the road intersects with Route 422.
- GN: The new bridge will cross the Perkiomen near where Classic Coachwork is. The approach to the bridge would go near here, cross Ridge Pike and turn 45 degrees towards the Creek. With the completion of the bridge, Ridge Pike could be an area for new development. Maybe the Perkiomen Bridge becomes a pedestrian promenade.

- CB: Our facility is 225 acres and is owned by Montgomery County. We operate with the County and have a 50 year lease with them. We have 5 miles of internal trails and 5 miles of paved trails.
- CB: We run canoes and kayaks on the Perkiomen Creek.
- CB: We have an 18,000 sf museum and we combine outdoor education and history.
- CB: For our canoe program, we go up to the Egypt Road bridge and then turn around. We don't go downstream past the dam.
- CB: We do not utilize Hoy Park. We've partnered with Take It Outdoors. We always launch our canoes from the same spot.
- CB: Thinking about Knights Field, I would like to see a managed habitat for birds. Meadow habitat is essential. The concern is that property owners of meadows mow them when it's most convenient.
- CB: Parking is congested at the ARA fields.
- CB: Eskie would be a good place for a birding trail.
- CB: It would be good to connect to the NPS trails, we do not currently have good connections.
- CB: We have an online trail map, not great, but gives a basic idea.
- CB: We also have a meadow plan.
- CB: I like the idea of the Hoy Park / Evansburg connector.

- CB: Currently, there are security concerns at the old mine shaft entrance near the old mine run, if something like this is being considered for reuse or open space.
- CB: In terms of accessibility, we have a mobility program for folks in wheelchairs, we worked with ArtReach on this. There's also a new program, a southeast birding mobility club.
- CB: We're thinking about ADA spaces, and accessibility as a whole and accessibility for birding in general.



## Q1 What is the name of the municipality you live in?







# Q2 If you live in Lower Providence, how long have you lived in the Township?





### Q3 What is your age?





### Q4 How many people currently live in your household?







# Q6 Which parks, natural areas, trails, or facilities do you visit for recreation purposes? (Please check all that apply)









### Q8 If you do use area trails, which ones do you use? (Please check all that apply)






### Q17 Do you feel that there are an adequate number of parks, natural areas, and trails available to you in or in close proximity to where you live?

# Q27 In general, how important do you feel public parks, trails, natural areas and open spaces are to the well-being and quality of life in Lower Providence Township?





### Q28 In general, how important is the conservation of natural open spaces such as wetlands and wooded areas in Lower Providence Township?





## Q29 Do you visit gymnasiums or workout centers for fitness or recreational purposes?






# Q33 Would you support a referendum in the near future to allow the Earned Income Tax to be increased to finance the acquisition of property to preserve as open space?


# Q34 The information below identifies how such funds might be allocated. Please rank the order of importance to you 1 to 3 (1 being the most important).






