The department consists of thirty-one police officers, an executive assistant to the Chief of Police, a civilian dispatcher, and a part-time evidence clerk.

Department Structure

Patrol Division - is the largest unit and is responsible for the primary police services provided to the Township. The Patrol Division is composed of four platoons that are each supervised by a Sergeant. Patrol cars are equipped with Mobile Data Computers (MDC) which are computer terminals that provide officers with instantaneous information on driver's license information, vehicle registration information, stolen vehicle information, wanted person information and confidential messaging between vehicles and the Police Dispatch Center. Officers are also able to prepare accident reports and incident reports in their vehicles and transmit them electronically to the records management system server in the police station. All the patrol cars are equipped with Mobile Video and Audio Recorders (MVAR) that are utilized to digitally record vehicle stops, DUI enforcement, suspicious activity, and crime scenes. Within the Patrol Division, specialized units include officers assigned to the Traffic Safety Unit, with responsibility for coordinating traffic enforcement/safety, and the Bicycle Patrol Unit.

Detective Division - is responsible for the investigation of all criminal offenses that occur within the Township. A Detective Sergeant supervises the division.

In 2020, Lower Providence Detectives investigated 419 criminal cases. These cases ranged from misdemeanor-level crimes to major felony crimes. Cases our detectives investigated this year and were able to arrest and charge suspects consisted of a string of burglaries that involved months of surveillance, multiple search warrants, and numerous follow-ups. They also arrested and charged a suspect in the murder of his infant daughter as well as a suspect who delivered heroin to a victim, who then died from a lethal dose of fentanyl.



Police Dispatch/ Civilian Employees – are responsible for monitoring the radio, accepting incoming emergency and non-emergency phone calls, case folder preparation, evidence maintenance, and numerous other administrative duties.

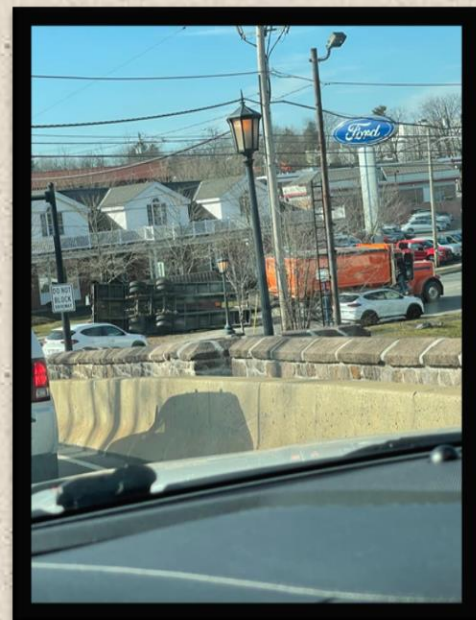
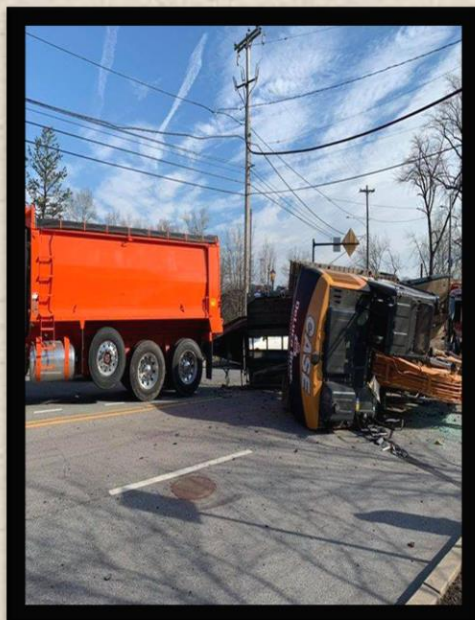
Montgomery County SWAT Central Region Team (MSWAT-CR) – Lower Providence Township is an active member of this regional team. This team is responsible for high-risk search / arrest warrants, hostage-taking situations, barricaded subjects, active shooters, and other incidents of a high-risk nature. Corporal Rob Heim is the MSWAT Team Leader and Officer Ryan Gill is a member of entry element.



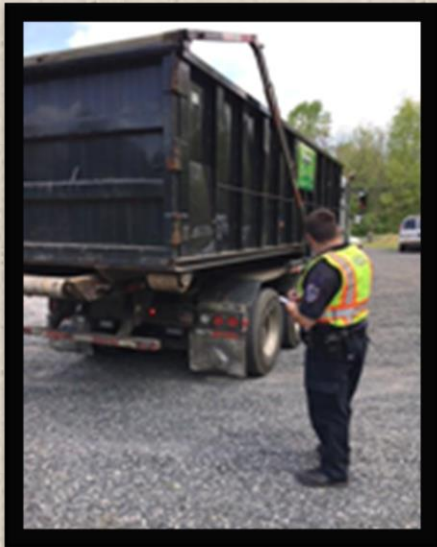
Bicycle Patrol - Eight members of the Lower Providence Township Police Department have been certified by the International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA) for police bicycle patrol. The department currently utilizes police patrol bicycles at special events, shopping centers, apartment complexes and neighborhood patrols.



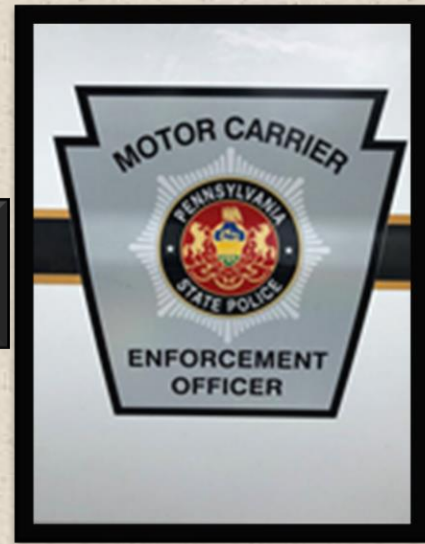
Accident Reconstruction – Two members of the Lower Providence Township Police Department, Corporal Ryan Singleton and Officer Timothy Arthur, are certified accident reconstructionist. The reconstructionist is in charge of determining the causation of all serious and fatal automobile accidents.



Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP) Certified Officer - Throughout Pennsylvania, more than 700 specially trained state and local officers inspect commercial vehicles and their drivers for compliance with state and federal motor carrier safety regulations. Inspections are conducted along all roadways within the township. The goal of MCSAP is to reduce commercial motor-vehicle involved crashes, fatalities, and injuries through consistent, uniform, and effective commercial motor-vehicle programs. The department has one MCSAP certified police officer, Corporal Ryan Singleton.

DUI Enforcement - The Lower Providence Township Police Department is a member of the Valley Forge Area DUI Task Force which is comprised of several area police departments that combine their efforts and resources in addressing the issue of Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol and Controlled Substances. The Task Force conducts sobriety checkpoints and specific patrol details for DUI offenders.

Montgomery County Drug Task Force - The Police Department participates in the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office Local Drug Task Force to investigate drug offenses within our own jurisdiction and throughout Montgomery County. We currently have nine Police Officers who are assigned to the drug task force and have been sworn in as Special County Detectives for the purpose of investigating drug offenses throughout the County.



Professional Standards



The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, 375 agencies have enrolled and 117 agencies currently have maintained accredited status.

Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The cornerstone of this strategy lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives. Participating administrators then conduct a thorough analysis to determine how existing operations can be adapted to meet these objectives. When the procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals are assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.

The Lower Providence Township Police Department was accredited by the PA Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission in 2006 and has received reaccreditation every three years since that time. Accredited status has been awarded to less than 10% of the 1200 law enforcement agencies in the commonwealth.

Excellence in Policing

Citizen Complaints - The Lower Providence Township Police Departments procedures for handling citizen complaints are consistent with national standards to assure a prompt and thorough investigation and response to all allegations. This process ensures that these issues are brought to the proper level of departmental management, and appropriately addressed to maintain a high level of integrity and instill public trust. In 2020, the department received **just one** formal citizen complaint against any member of the department.

Commendations - The Police Department received numerous letters of commendation from the public about exemplary police services. Chief Jackson awarded the department with an additional 10 letters of commendation, 9 Unit Citations, 3 Commendations of Merit, and 2 Life Saving Commendations.

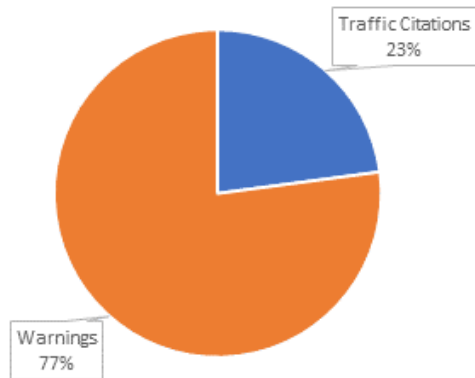

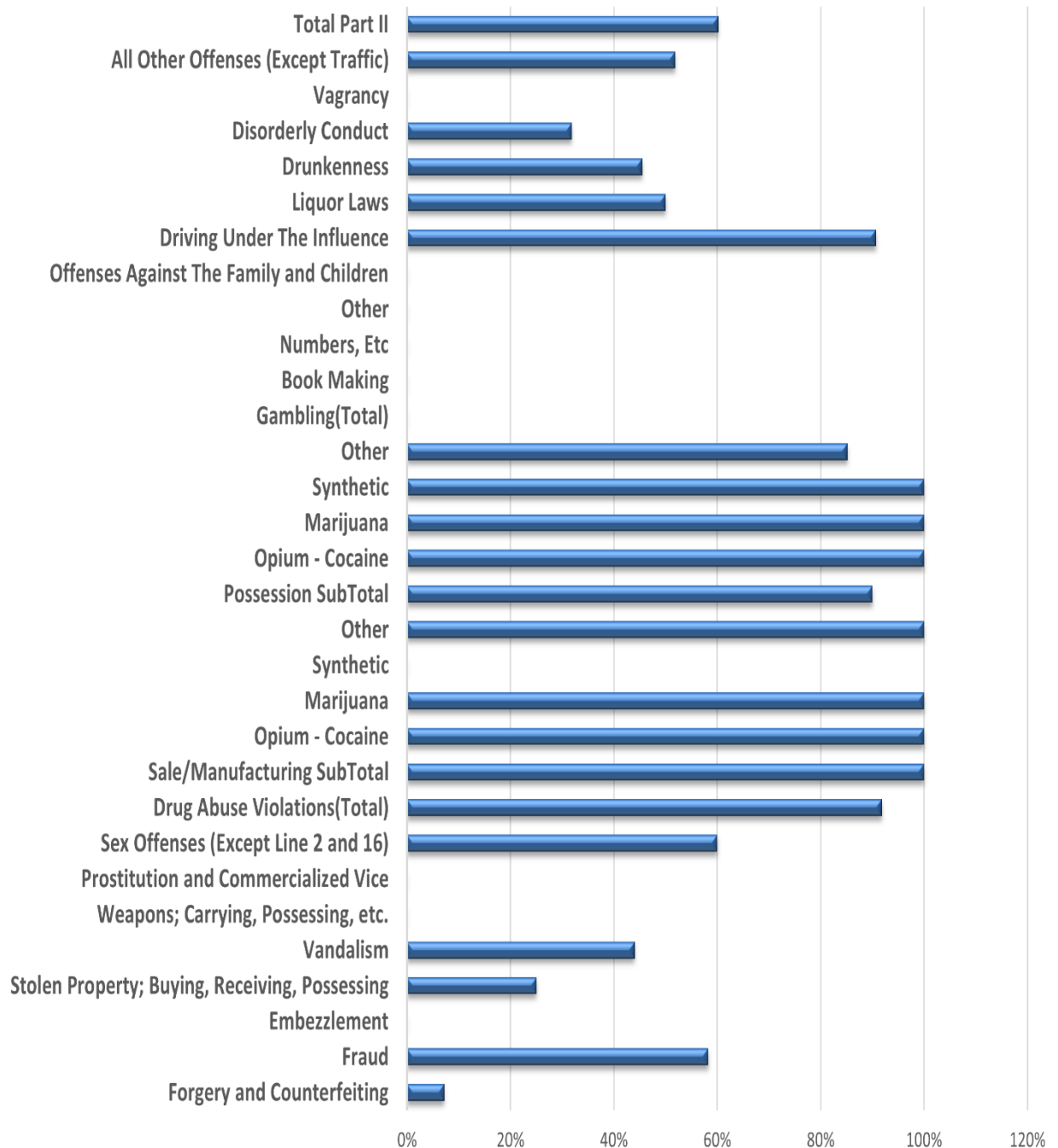

3,654 Total Traffic Stops in 2020



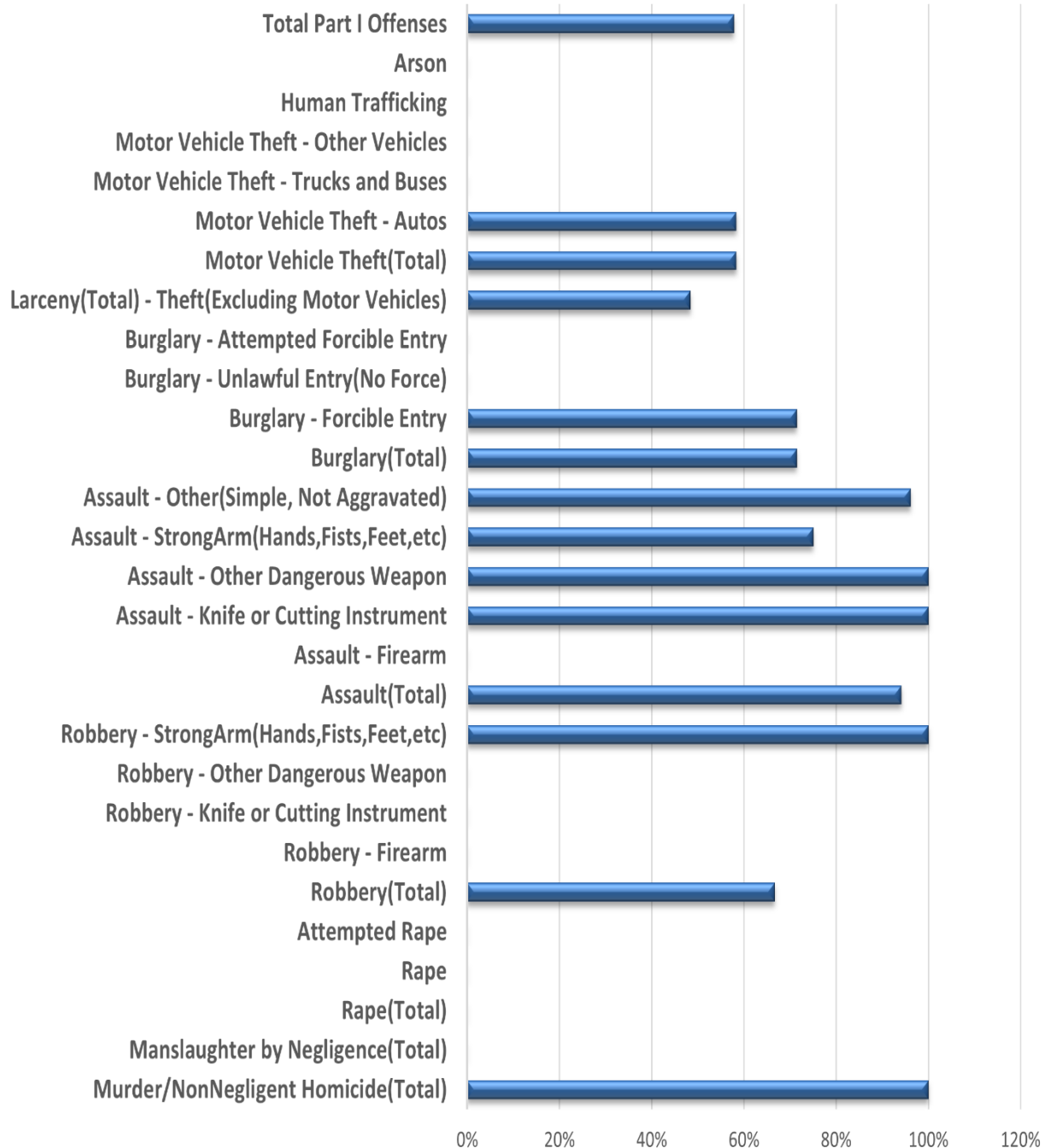

Youth Aid Panel Program

Lower Providence Police participate in Montgomery County's Youth Aid Panel and referred 20 juveniles to the program in 2020.

The Youth Aid Panel (YAP) Program has been giving juveniles a second chance to have a clean criminal record since 2000. In its 20-year history, the program has helped more than 10,000 juveniles, ages 10 to 17 (or age 18 if a current high school senior), avoid a criminal record by going before a panel of local, trained volunteers and taking responsibility for their actions. Through the involvement and support of local community volunteers and assigned interventions, community Youth Aid Panels hold juveniles accountable for their actions with conditions that focus on community responsibility while facilitating positive outcomes.

The YAP Program is an alternative to having a juvenile charged with their criminal infraction and having the matter handled in Juvenile Court. Successfully completing YAP means the child will not have a criminal record that can be found through background checks routinely done by colleges and employers. The program is also designed to help juvenile offenders avoid future contact with the juvenile justice system through the involvement and support of local community volunteers, who serve on the more than 40 active Youth Aid Panels across Montgomery County.

Drug Education and Abuse Prevention Program (D.E.A.P.)

Lower Providence Police also established and participates in D.E.A.P, which is a voluntary program for 18 to 26 -year-olds who are charged with minor drug possession crimes and it provides an opportunity for youthful offenders to stay out of the criminal justice system. During the year 2020, LPPD referred 10 individuals to the program. D.E.A.P has five key steps for participants:

- Introductory meeting with local police, the District Attorney's Office, and the Magisterial District Judge.**
- Drug and alcohol assessment and a presentation on addiction by former addicts and experts.**
- Presentation on medical consequences of addiction by Coroner's Office.**
- Presentation on serious consequences of addiction and tour of the Montgomery County Correctional Facility.**
- Observation sessions at Montgomery County Drug Court.**

After successful completion of the program, offenders will not face criminal prosecution and hopefully learn ways to better cope with the influences that lead to illegal drug use.

While in College, he played all four years on the lacrosse team and he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Sports Management with minors in Marketing and Business Administration.

Niles Luong was born in Vietnam and emigrated to the United States at the age of five. He and his family settled in Easton, PA. Niles graduated from Easton Area High School in 2011 and then went on to attend Northampton Community College and West Chester University. He holds an Associate Degree and a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice. In December 2018, Niles graduated from the Philadelphia Police Academy. He previously worked for the Northampton County Correctional Facility as a corrections officer and was most recently employed as a police officer with SEPTA Transit Police before coming to Lower Providence Police Department.



2020 Promotions

Sergeant Ryan W. Singleton received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Widener University in 2009. He was previously employed as a police officer with the Kennett Square Borough Police Department and he is a volunteer firefighter with the New Hanover Township Fire Company. He began his career with Lower Providence Township on June 3, 2013 and was assigned to the patrol division. In May of 2016 he was assigned to the traffic safety unit where he has received extensive training in crash investigations, commercial motor carrier inspections and weigh master training. On March 5, 2020, Ryan was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and assigned to a patrol squad. Ryan has received several letters of public appreciation and department commendations.



Corporal Justin J. Hubert is a 1998 graduate of Carlisle Area High School. He served in the United States Marine Corps from 1999-2003 and saw action with the First Marine Division in Iraq. Justin was formerly employed as a police officer with the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, DC and sworn in as a Lower Providence Township Police Officer on May 9, 2016. He is a certified bike patrol officer, field training officer for new patrol officers, and he was the designated officer in charge on his patrol squad. He has received several letters of commendation for his performance and numerous letters of appreciation from members of the public.

On March 6, 2020, **Detective Sergeant Terrence J. Kennedy** retired after thirty-two years of service to Lower Providence Township. Terry graduated from Norristown Area High School in 1985. While in school he participated in baseball, football, and he distinguished himself by being selected to play in the Montgomery County All-Star Game. Terry attended Montgomery County Community College taking courses in Police Science. He has served as a volunteer firefighter with the Jefferson Fire Company.

Terry was hired as a Police Dispatcher by Lower Providence Township on November 23, 1987. He graduated from the Montgomery County Police Academy in 1991. He was hired as a part-time police officer in Royersford Borough in October of 1991. He was sworn in as a police officer with Lower Providence Township on January 18, 1993 and was assigned to the Patrol Division. On July 24, 2000, he was assigned to the Detective Division, where he continued to serve until retirement. Terry was promoted to Sergeant in February of 2009 and assumed the responsibility for supervising the Detective Division. He graduated from the Federal Bureau of Investigation Inter-County Detective School in September 2000. Terry was assigned to the Montgomery County Drug Task Force in 2000 and served as the department's Task Force Coordinator. He has been certified in Wiretapping and Electronic Surveillance by the Pennsylvania State Police.

Terry has received seven Distinguished Unit Citations, a Commendation of Merit from the East Norriton Township Police Department, and numerous letters of commendation throughout his career. Terry was presented the prestigious Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office Award of Excellence in 2009. He was the recipient of the Montgomery County District Attorney's Commendation in 2011. He has been honored on two separate occasions for his DUI enforcement efforts by the Montgomery County Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

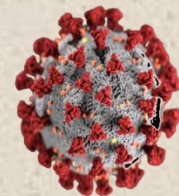
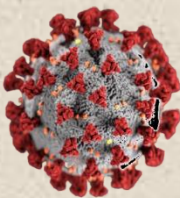

Coronavirus Pandemic (Covid-19)

2020 was a year of consistent change and numerous challenges. One of the most difficult challenges that we are still facing is the Coronavirus pandemic (Covid-19). Starting in early March, Montgomery County was placed on a two-week long quarantine, which turned to months. The Lower Providence Township Police Department was the first department in Montgomery County to get hit hard with the virus. Our department had multiple officers out sick at one time and others worked tirelessly around the clock to fill shifts. Training

There is mandatory training every officer receives on an annual basis such as lethal and less lethal weapon qualifications, use of force training, mental health training, MPOETC updates, in-service training, and numerous elective trainings officer's request. This year our department reviewed a new less lethal weapon called BolaWrap and received training to implement next year. BolaWrap is intended to immobilize and control resistance and non-compliant individuals.
