Township's Hoy Park Earns Community Greening Award

Presented by PA Horticultural Society

LOWER PROVIDENCE TOWNSHIP - Lower Providence Township's Hoy Park was recognized by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society (PHS), receiving a 2012 Community Greening Award. The award recognizes the Township's greening and beautification efforts at the park. Additional recipients were celebrated

for improving their communities across Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware.

This year, 67 winners were chosen from entries throughout the tristate area. The list of winning sites includes entries from many diverse areas. Past award recipients include individuals and groups who have maintained streets, public parks, traffic islands, train stations, churches, schoolyards, libraries, and businesses. Municipalities that have led tree planting initiatives, battled stormwater runoff, or pursued other ecological projects were also encouraged to apply. Judges evaluated the sites in July and August based on plant variety, design, use of space, and horticultural practices.

Hoy Park is located off Arcola Road at the confluence of the Perkiomen and Skippack. It features a handicap accessible fishing pier, boat ramp, and picnic area. There is also a large display providing park visitors with information on birds they're likely to spot in the area.
